

# PRS

The Data Book (previously published as the Legislative Data Book) has been compiled as a descriptive statistical resource of the services provided by the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services (PRS) to the people of the State of Texas. Information covered in this book covers the most frequently asked questions about PRS programs. Our hope is that it will be beneficial in answering some of the questions as well as being an ongoing resource document.

The Data Book provides information in several types of charts using different time intervals (on the last day of fiscal year, annual) by county, region, and statewide totals.

When comparing data from one time period to another, please keep in mind that PRS has undergone several major changes. We have had a regional re-alignment, major policy changes that have influenced the data, and moved to a new automated environment (Child and Adult Protective System, known as CAPS) in the last five years.

The mission of the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services (PRS) is to protect the unprotected.

## Agency Philosophy

The PRS Board and staff embrace the following tenets:

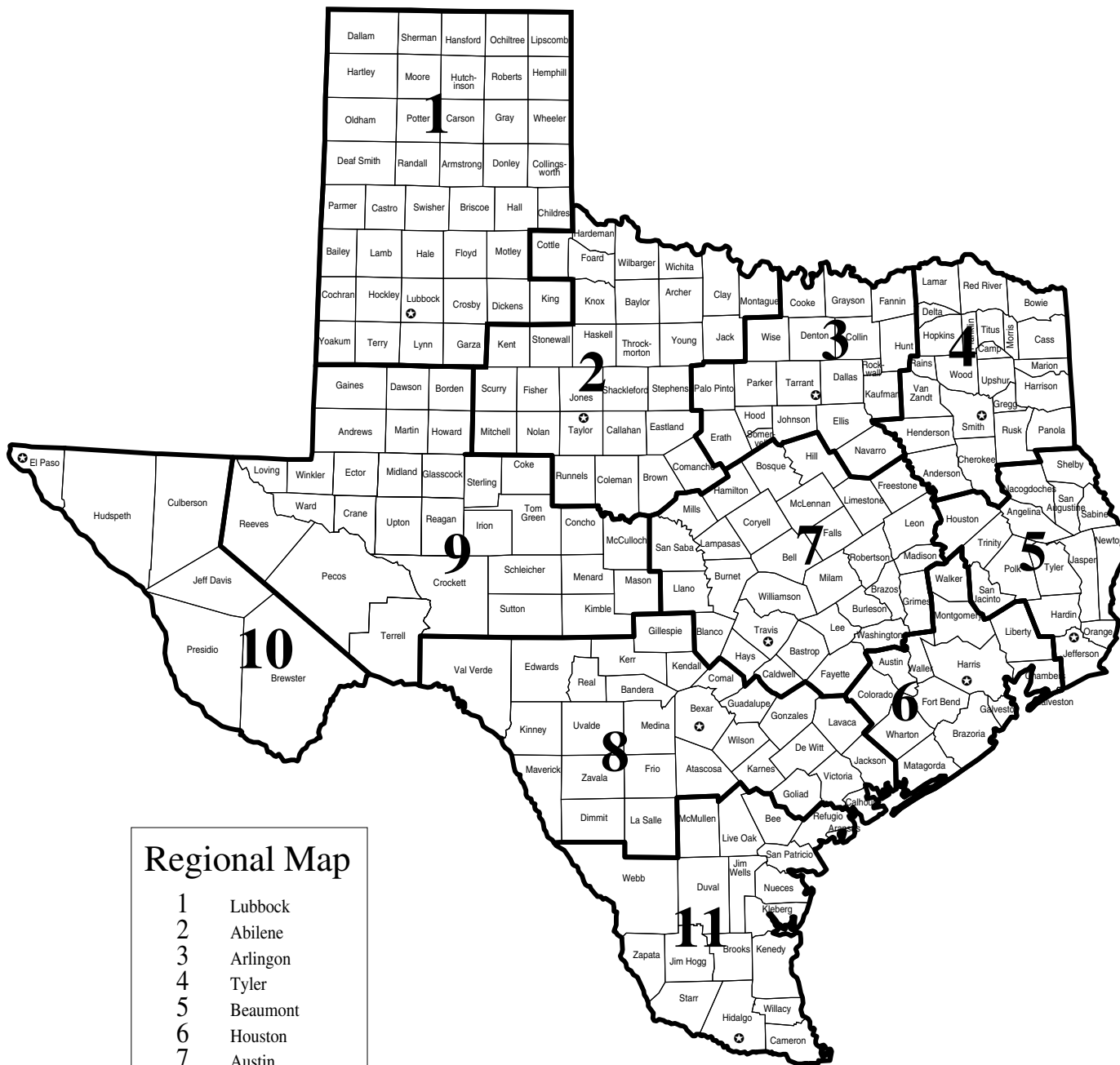
- We will provide high quality services to clients through an integrated, efficiently managed service delivery system.
- We will recruit, train, and retain a stable staff that exhibits a high degree of professionalism.
- We will stress prevention of abuse, neglect, and exploitation through planning and integration of prevention programs and strategies within and across agencies, both private and public.
- We will behave in a manner that invokes trust, encourages consistency, and promotes positive relationships and partnerships.
- We will be accountable at all levels for agency resources.
- We will accept responsibility for our actions.
- We recognize that only through involvement of all community members can the State of Texas hope to protect its children and adults who are at risk of being abused, neglected, or exploited. Strong working relationships and a strong presence within the community are essential to our carrying out our mission.
- We will work with other organizations to share responsibility for those in need of protection. Our partners will include other state agencies, local public and private agencies, churches and synagogues, legislators, law enforcement, citizens who make referrals, families, service providers, health care providers, professional service organizations, and the business community.
- We will bring forth individual concerns and suggestions in an open and honest manner, with corrective action recommendations developed where appropriate.
- All clients, complainants, alleged perpetrators, and other persons who have contact with us will receive courteous treatment, clearly communicated expectations, and timely responses.

## Program Responsibilities

- Ensure that children suspected to be at risk of abuse and/or neglect receive prompt and effective investigative services.
- Deliver quality in-home/family preservation services to all children found, by investigation, to need them.
- Ensure that all children who are found to need substitute care are provided effective services until returned to their homes or another permanent placement.
- Provide timely and quality investigations and protective services to adults in the community who are elderly or who have disabilities and who are victims of maltreatment.
- When no less-restrictive alternative is feasible, provide guardianship for persons with disabilities who have aged out of Child Protective Services conservatorship and who are unable to manage their affairs. Adult Protective Services (APS) also may provide guardianship for APS in-home clients who are incapacitated, have no one to act in their behalf, and need this service to prevent further maltreatment.
- Ensure that all allegations of abuse and/or neglect of vulnerable persons served by or through the Texas Department of Mental Health Mental Retardation (TXMHMR) are promptly and effectively investigated.
- Regulate all child care facilities as required by law, to reduce the risk of serious harm to children in these facilities by invoking minimum standards for health, safety, and well being.
- Provide community-based prevention and early intervention services to at-risk children, youth and families.
- Identify needs and provide services on the front end of the agency's continuum of services.

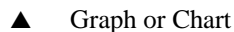

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## Direct Delivery Clerical Support

Clerical staff who support direct delivery workers, supervisors, and program directors.

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## Direct Delivery Administrative Support

Human service technicians who support direct delivery workers, supervisors, and program directors.

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## Direct Delivery Workers

Workers in all programs who provide direct services to clients.

(Worker totals do not include human service technicians who support workers.)

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## Direct Delivery Supervisors

Supervisors who supervise direct delivery workers, including program directors who supervise direct delivery supervisors.

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## Non-Direct Delivery Clerical/Administrative Support

Non-supervisory staff who support direct delivery programs, and who are paid from a program activity code.

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## Non-Direct Delivery Supervisors

Supervisors not in direct delivery services, including division / program administrators who are not executives.

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## Management Support

Staff who provide general administrative services not paid directly by program.

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## Executive

All executive level staff in the agency.

# Legal Responsibility for Adult Protective Services

## Statutory References:

Federal: Title XX, Social Security Act  
 State: Human Resources Code, Chapters 40 and 48  
 Texas Family Code, Title V  
 Health and Safety Code, Chapter 532 and Chapters 591-596

## Major Provisions:

- Mandatory reporting of abuse, neglect, and exploitation of elderly persons and adults with disabilities
- Receipt and investigation of all reports (unless patently false); initiation of investigations within 24 hours of receipt of report
- Responsibility for investigations of abuse and neglect of persons served by or through Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation (TXMHMR) facilities and community MHMR centers, and home and community-based waiver (HCS-W) programs
- Responsibility for other state agencies to investigate
- Responsibility for guardianship of persons with disabilities who age out of Child Protective Services (CPS) conservatorship and are unable to manage their own affairs
- Assessment of the adult's capacity to understand the situation and the degree of danger it presents
- Provision or arrangement of the services needed, which may include guardianship, to prevent or alleviate maltreatment
- Honoring the individual's right to self-determination and using the least restrictive alternative in the provision of protective services
- Authority to seek court orders when necessary to gain access to the individual, to prevent interference with the provision of voluntary protective services, to provide emergency protective services, to access records or documents, and to initiate emergency protective services (e.g., a removal) after hours and on holidays without a court order
- Requirement to notify law enforcement if the investigation reveals that an elderly or disabled person has been abused in a manner that constitutes a criminal offense
- Confidentiality of case records

## Factors Contributing to Maltreatment and Neglect:

- Aging population
- Growing number of younger persons with disabilities
- Alcohol and drug dependency
- Unemployment
- Lack of affordable housing
- De-institutionalization of persons who are mentally ill and/or mentally retarded when community support is not adequate
- Inadequate access to health care
- Pathological family relationships/violence as a coping mechanism in society
- Physical and mental stress of caregiving in traditionally non-violent, caring households
- Denial of benefits, such as SSI and Medicaid, to elderly and disabled immigrants and to persons with disabilities related to chemical addiction

### Challenges:

- Need for long-term therapeutic and residential services for aging-out CPS clients who will be maintained under guardianship of PRS as adults
- Resources to meet basic needs of indigent wards
- Affordable means of housing for persons who need supervision of medication only
- Waiting lists and other limitations in the availability of in-home care and home health care
- Shortage of resources to serve persons denied long-term care and other benefits under welfare reform
- Gaps in surrogate decision-making processes for incapacitated persons in hospitals, nursing homes and community-based settings
- Lack of access to affordable health care and prescription drugs
- Inadequate community services for persons discharged from state hospitals and schools
- Lack of statewide access to adult social services for elderly persons and adults with disabilities who are at risk but not yet experiencing abuse, neglect, or exploitation

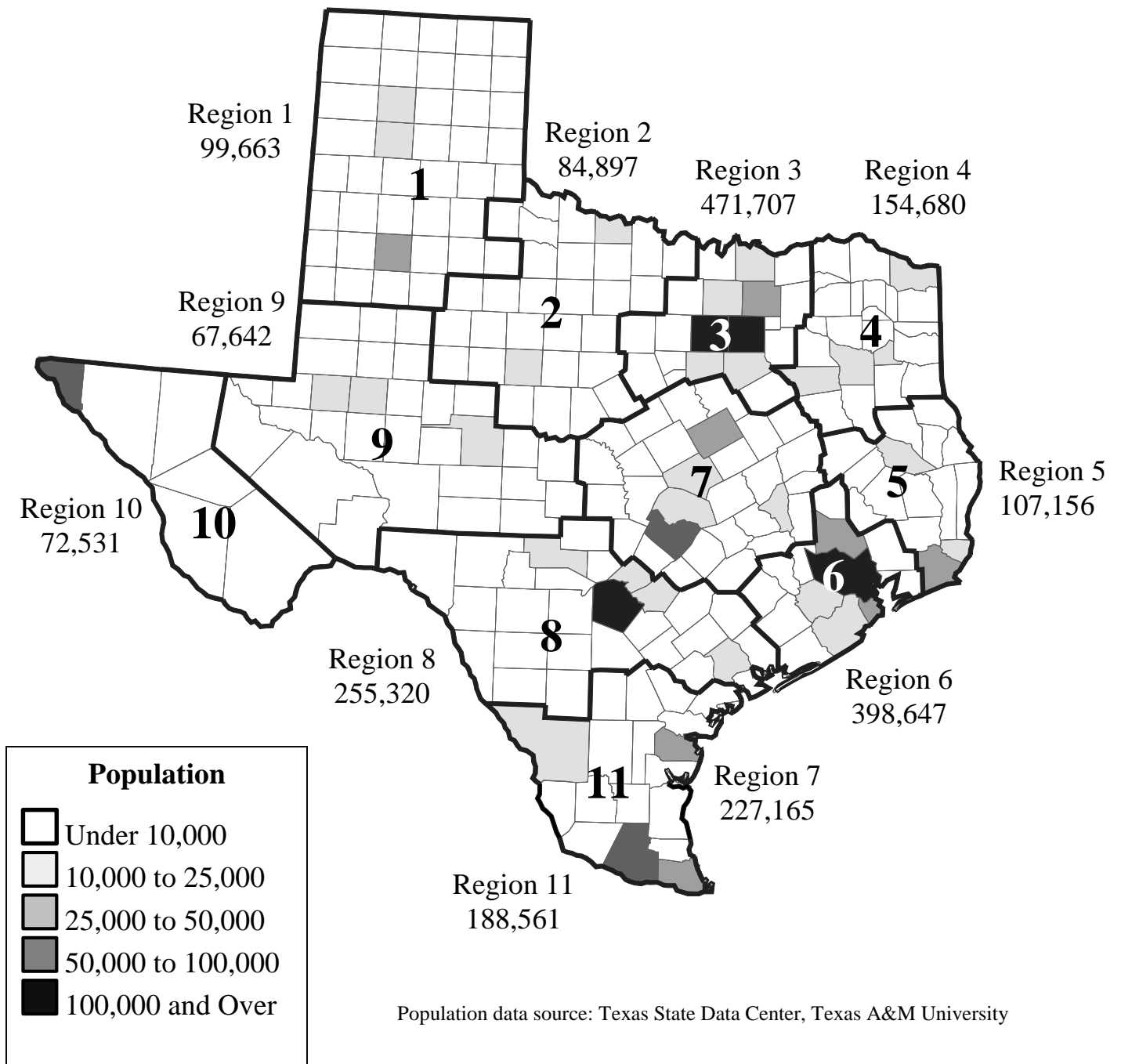

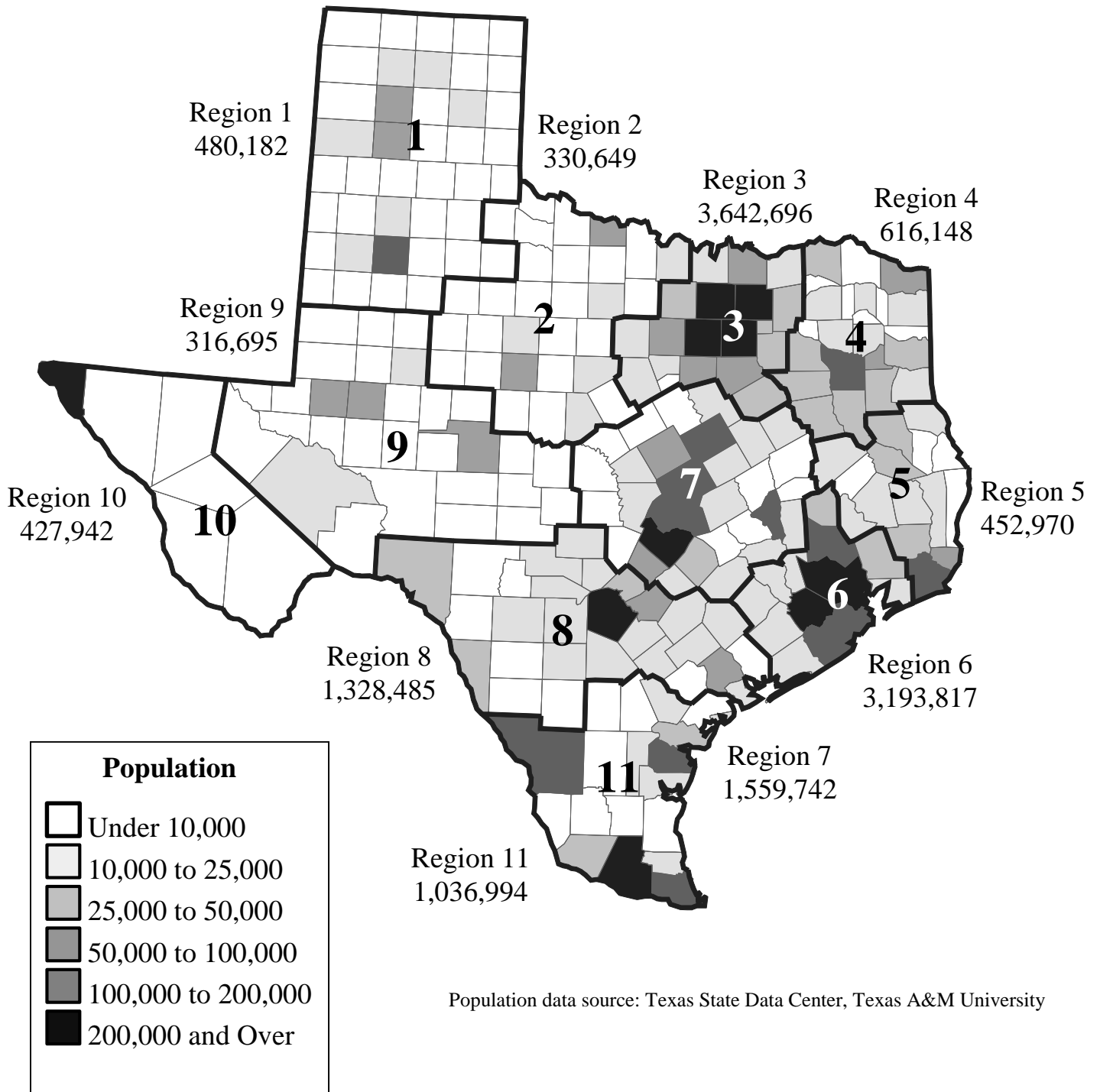
# Texas Adult Population Ages 65 and Over by County Fiscal Year 2002

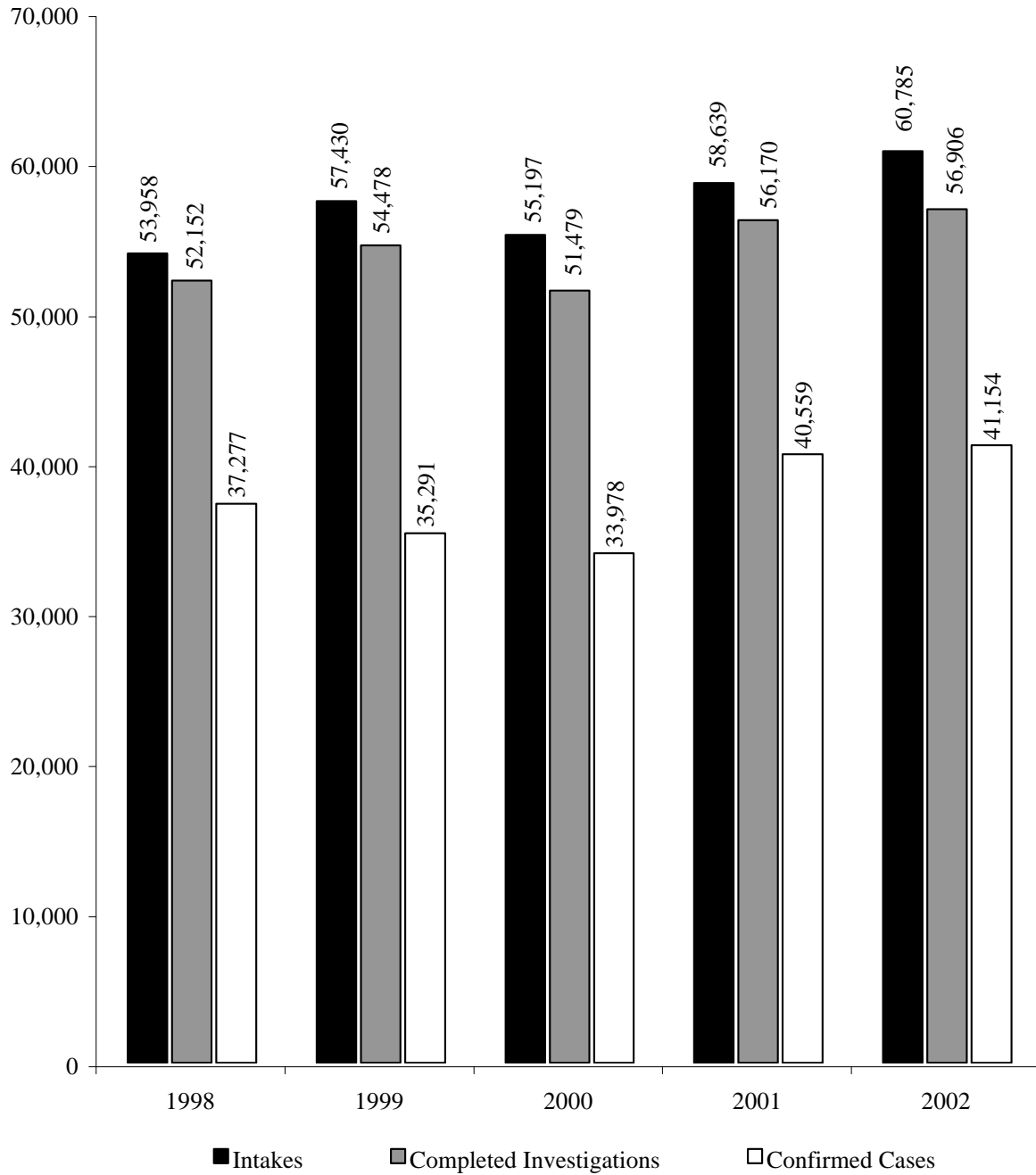


# Texas Adult Population Ages 18 to 64 by County Fiscal Year 2002

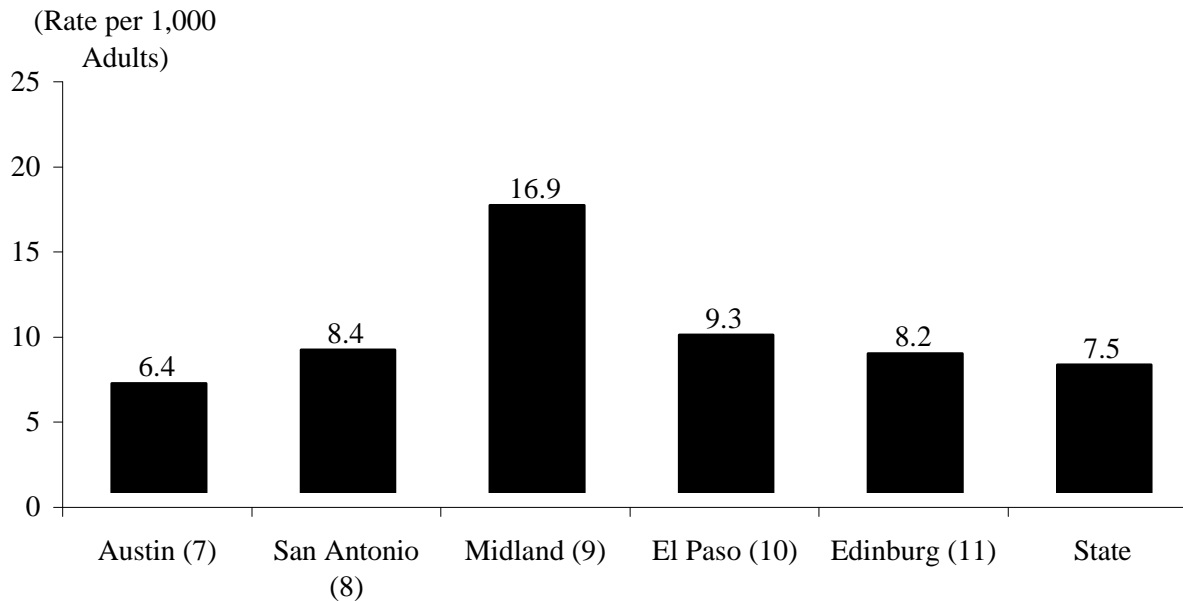
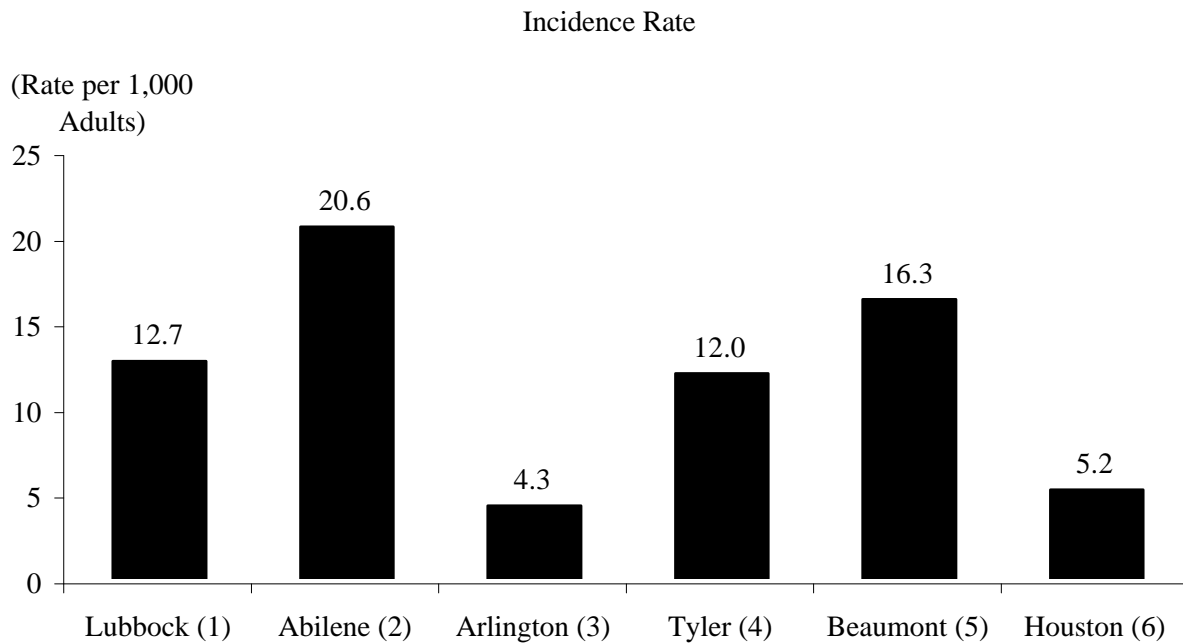

## APS In-Home Intakes, Completed Investigations and Confirmed Cases by Fiscal Year

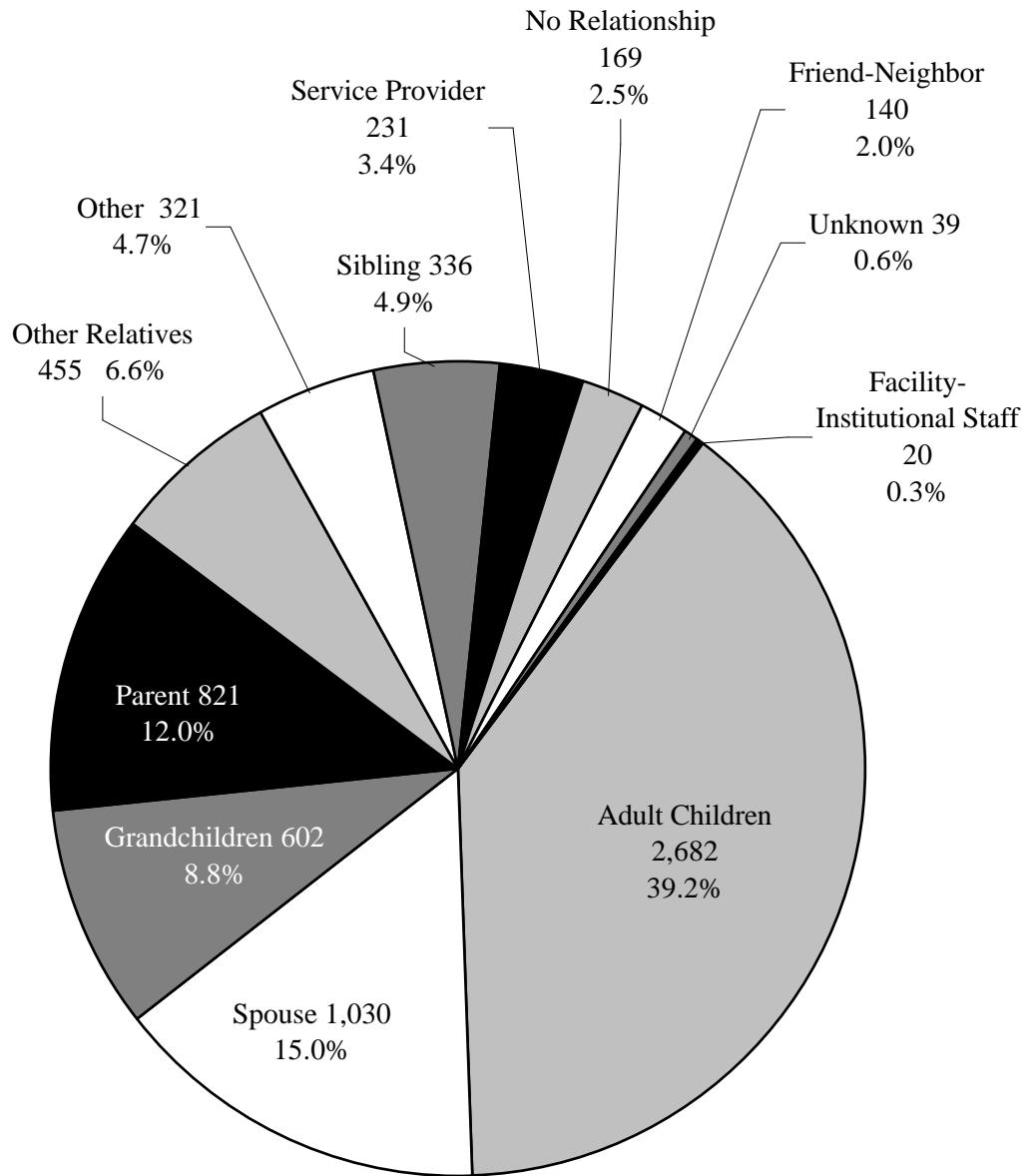


## Incidence of Maltreatment per 1,000 Adults in Texas Adult Population by Region Fiscal Year 2002

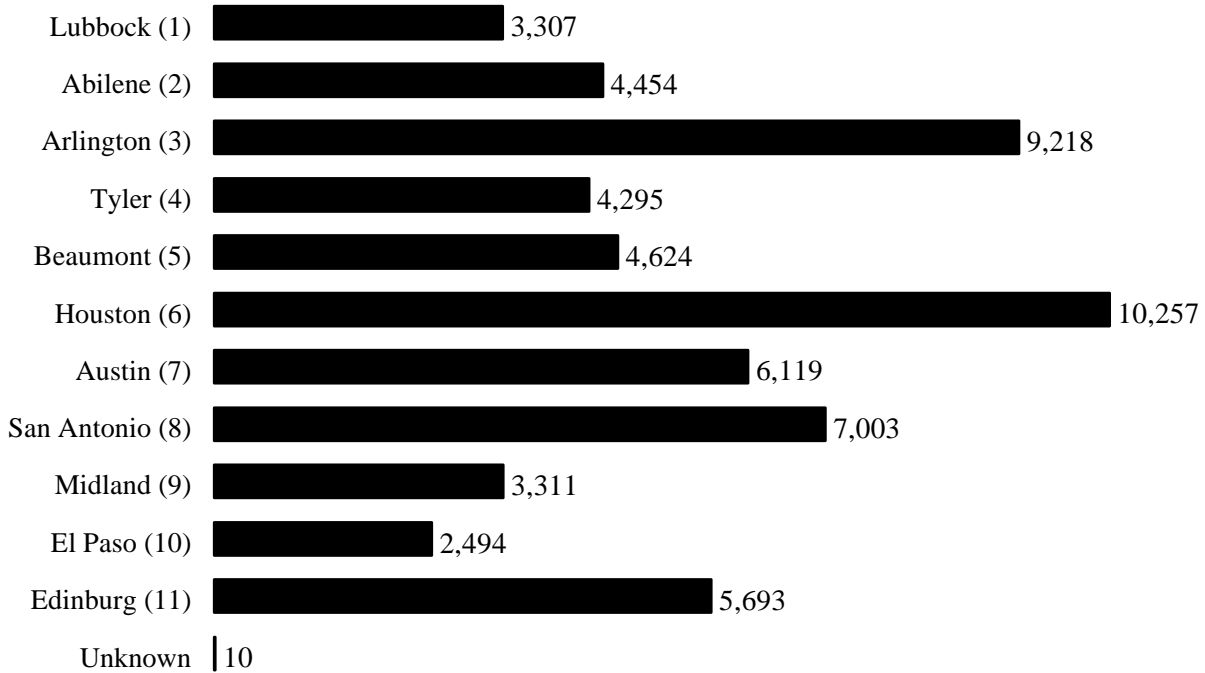
## Perpetrators in Confirmed In-Home Cases Fiscal Year 2002



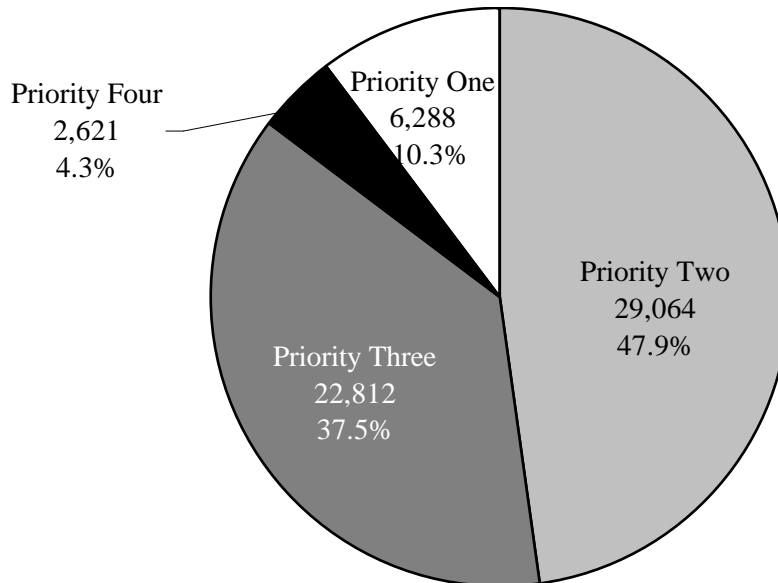

## APS In-Home Intake Reports by Region Fiscal Year 2002

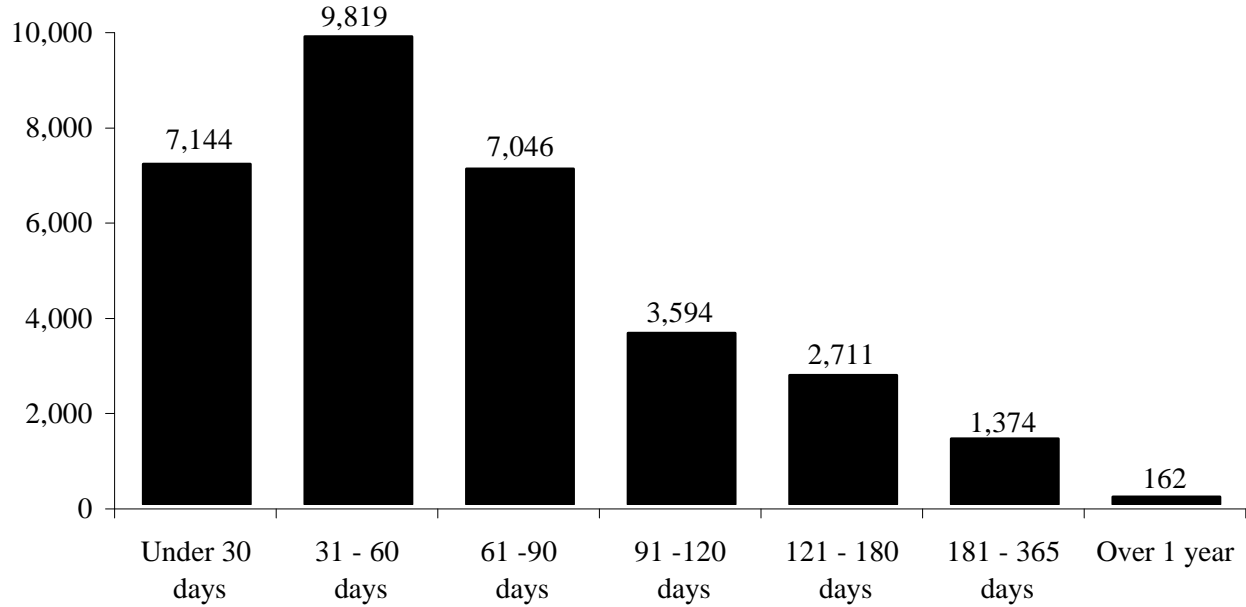

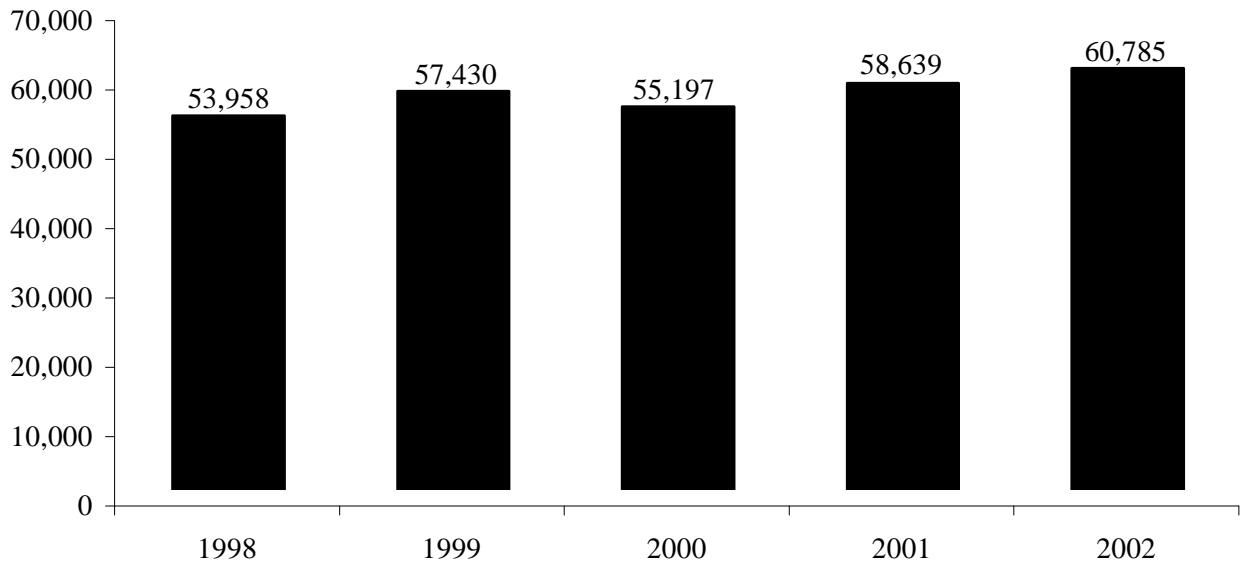
## APS Intake Reports by Priority Fiscal Year 2002



## Duration of APS In-Home Cases (Investigation and Service Delivery) Fiscal Year 2002

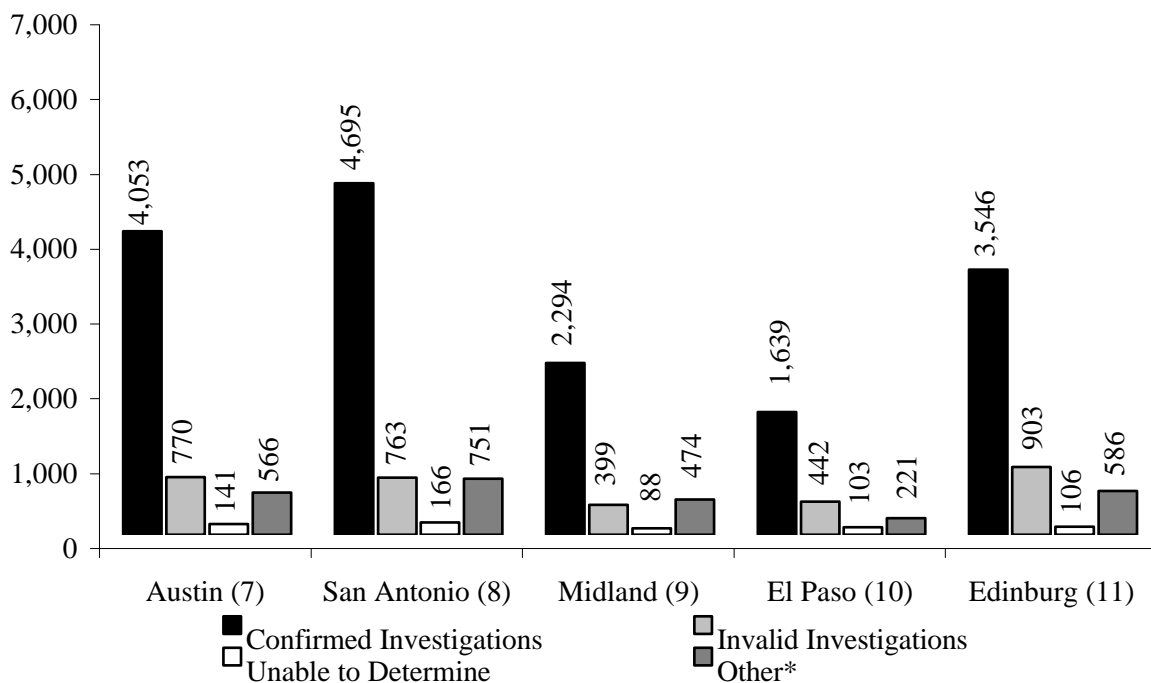
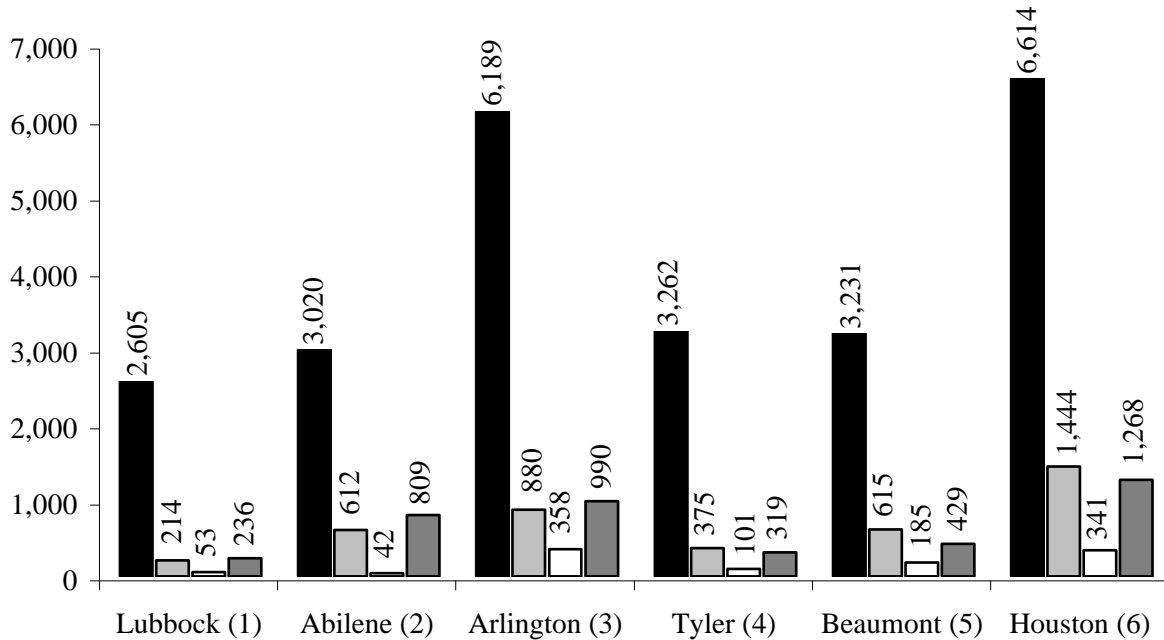


## APS In-Home Intakes by Fiscal Year

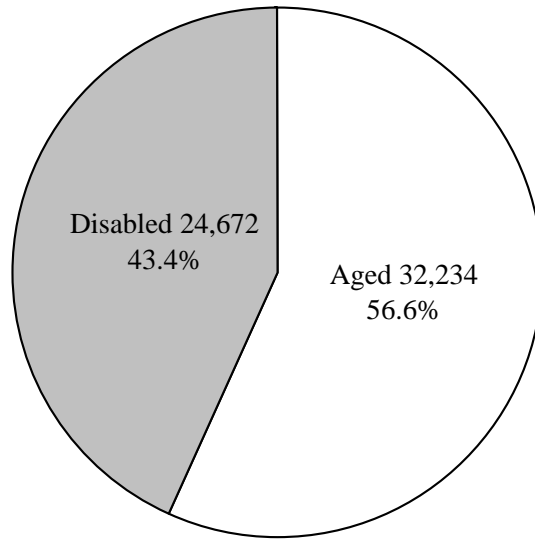

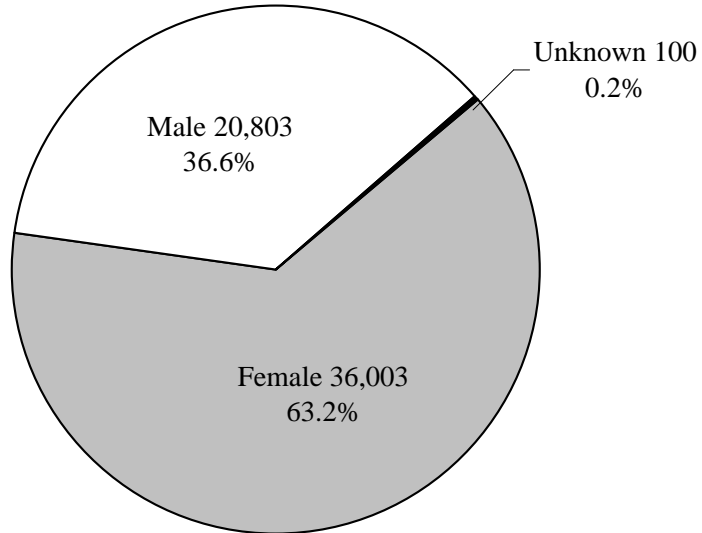


# In-Home Clients in Completed Investigations Fiscal Year 2002

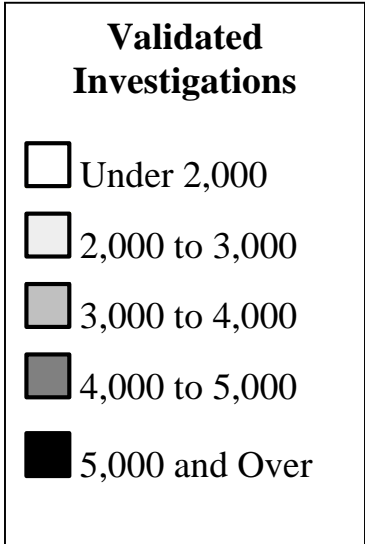
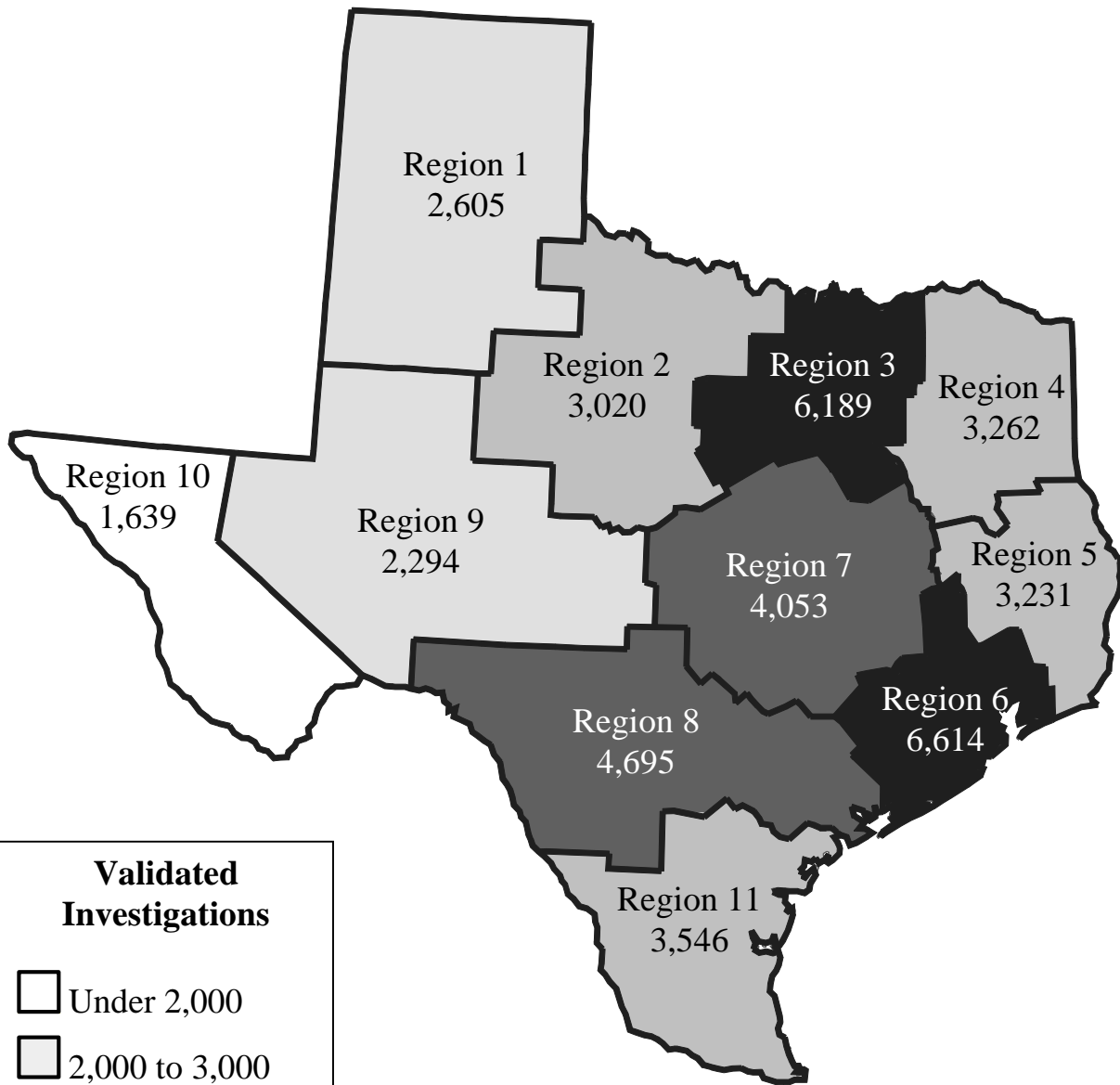

# APS Confirmed In-Home Investigations by Region Fiscal Year 2002

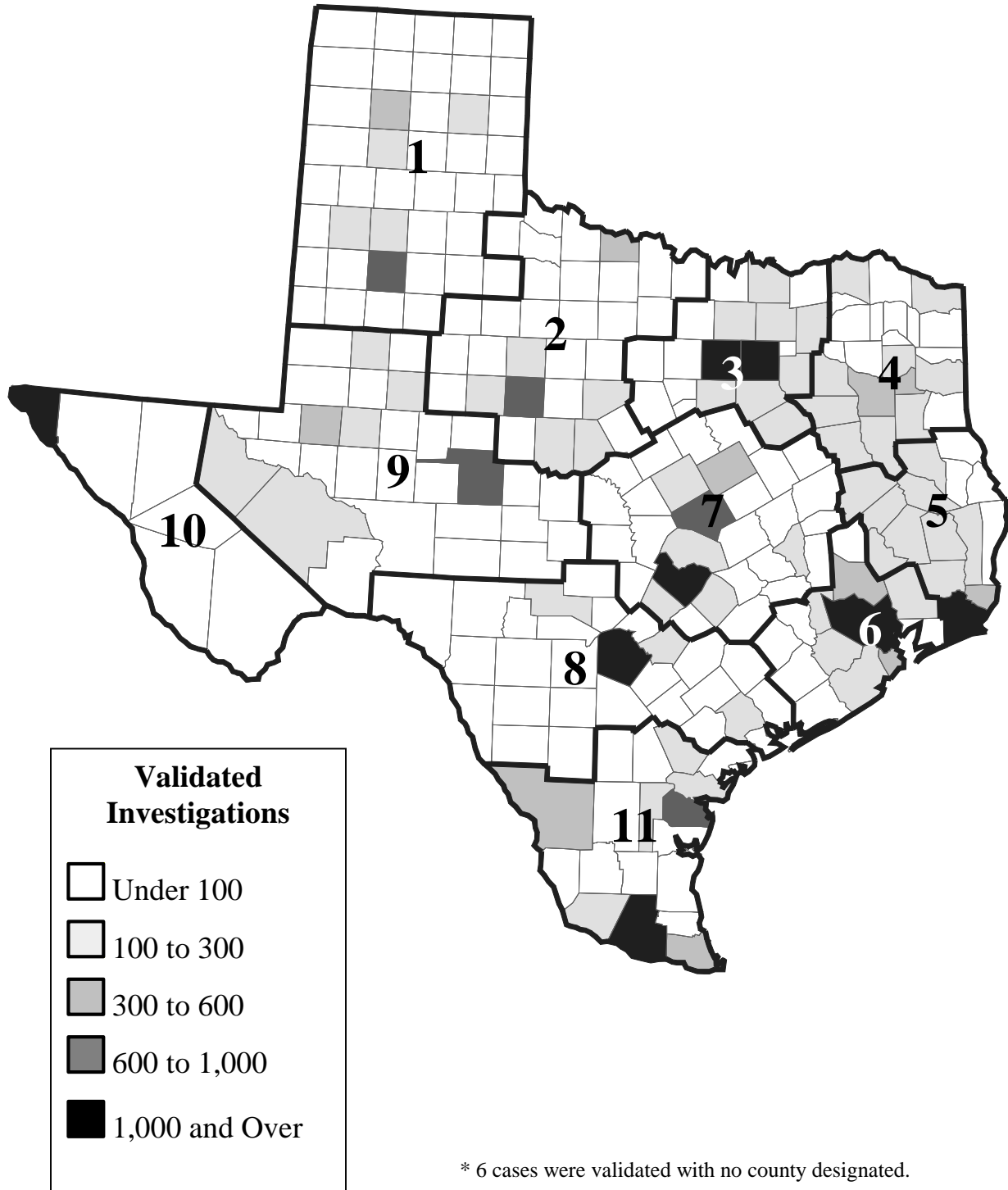

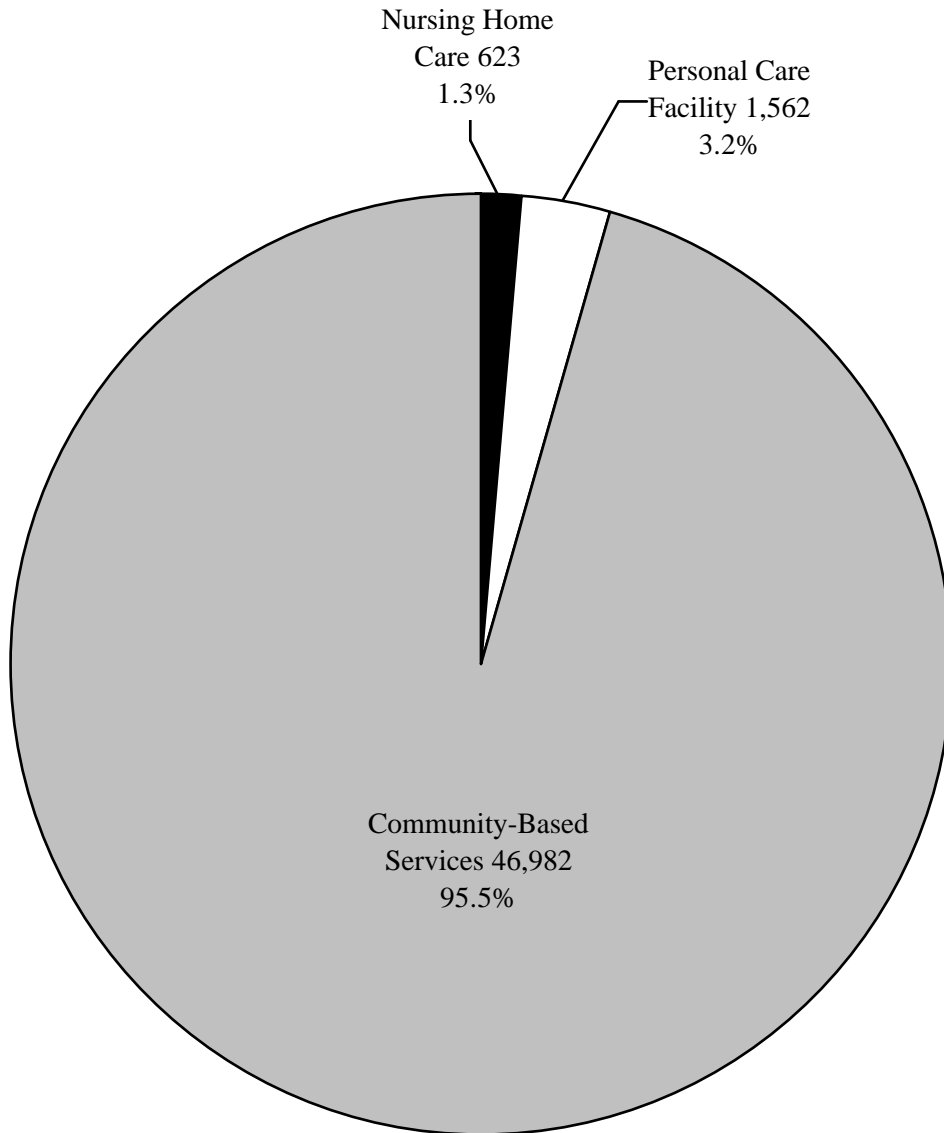

# APS Clients Receiving Nursing and Personal Care Facility Placements versus Community-Based Services Fiscal Year 2002



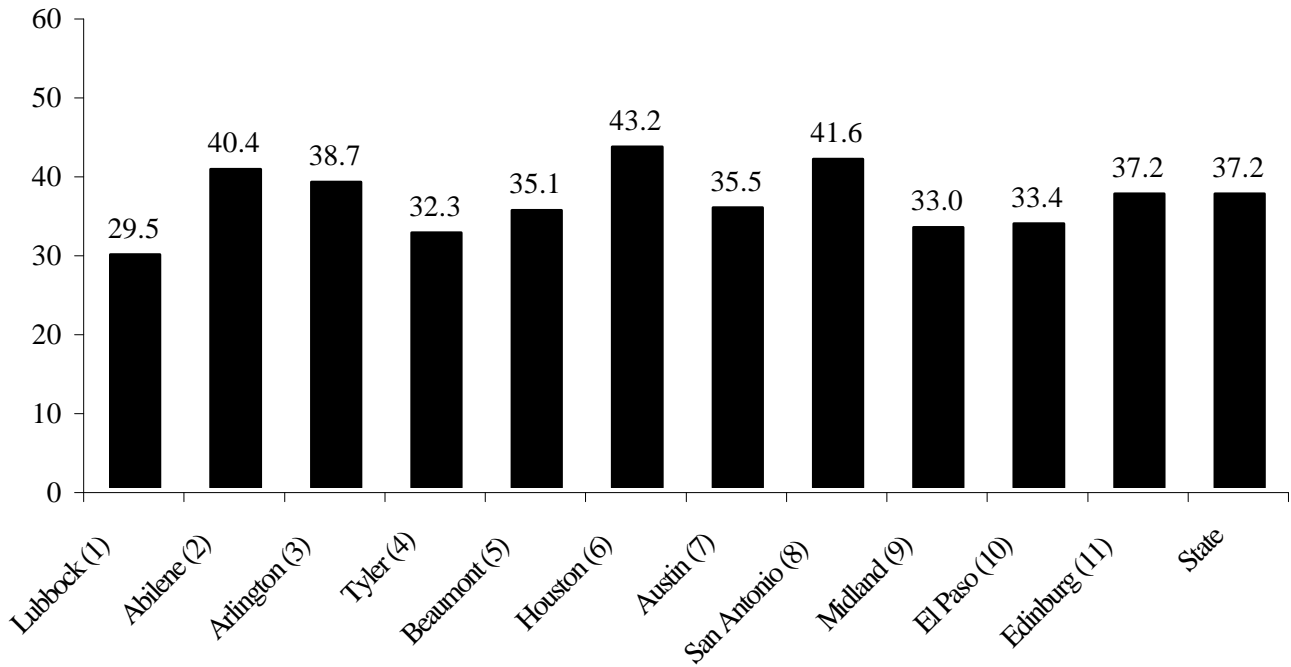

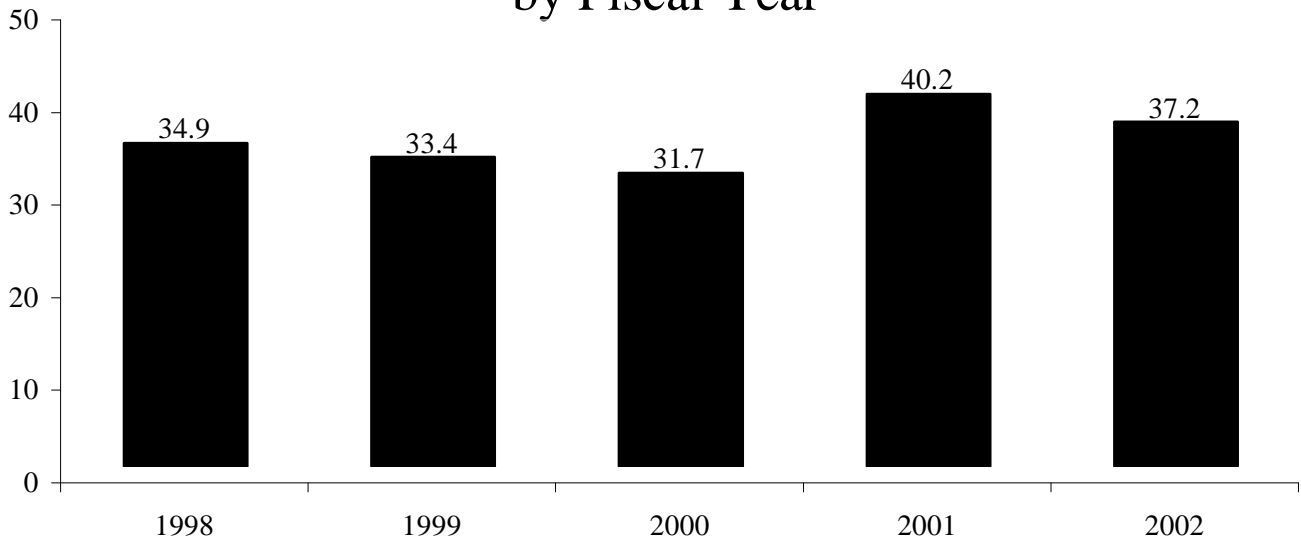

## Average APS In-Home Weighted Caseload per Worker by Region Fiscal Year 2002

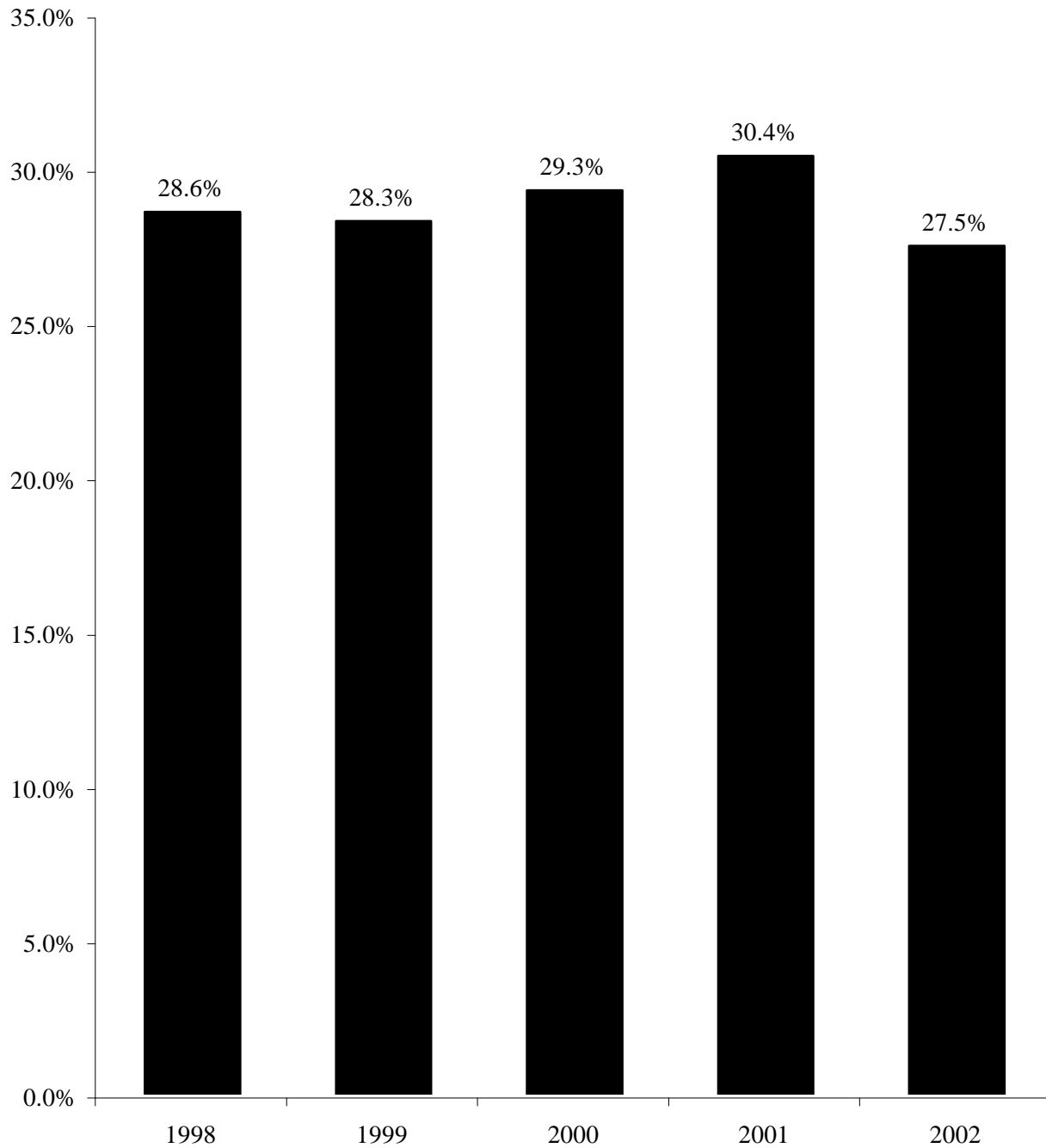


## Average APS In-Home Caseload per Worker by Fiscal Year



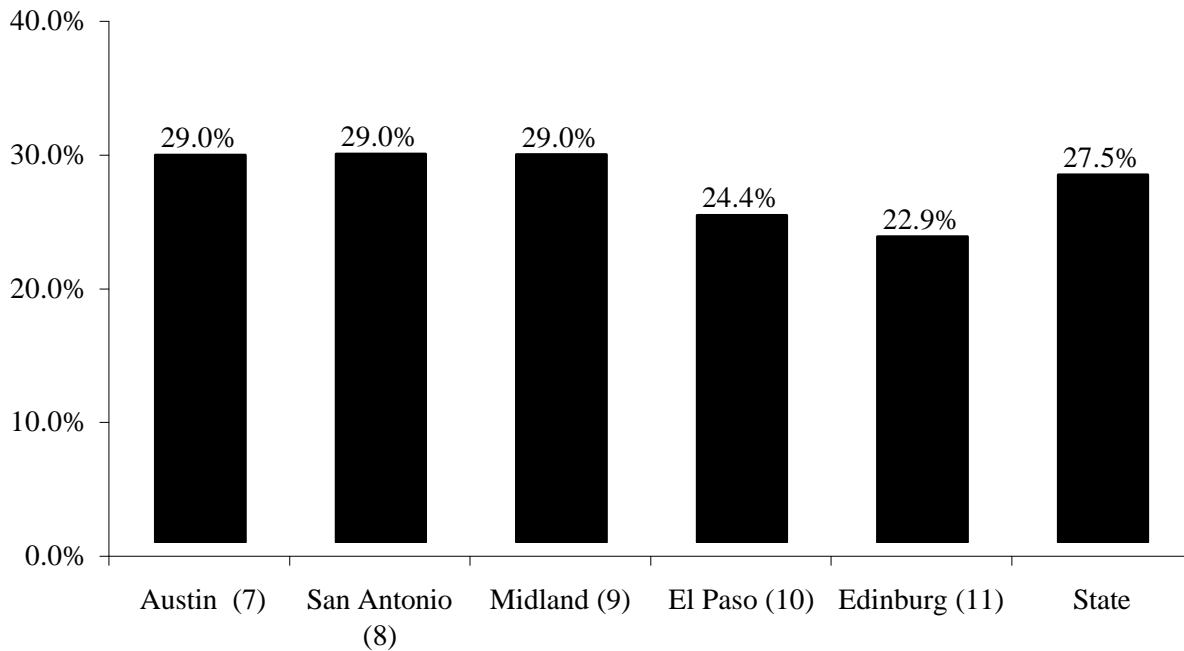
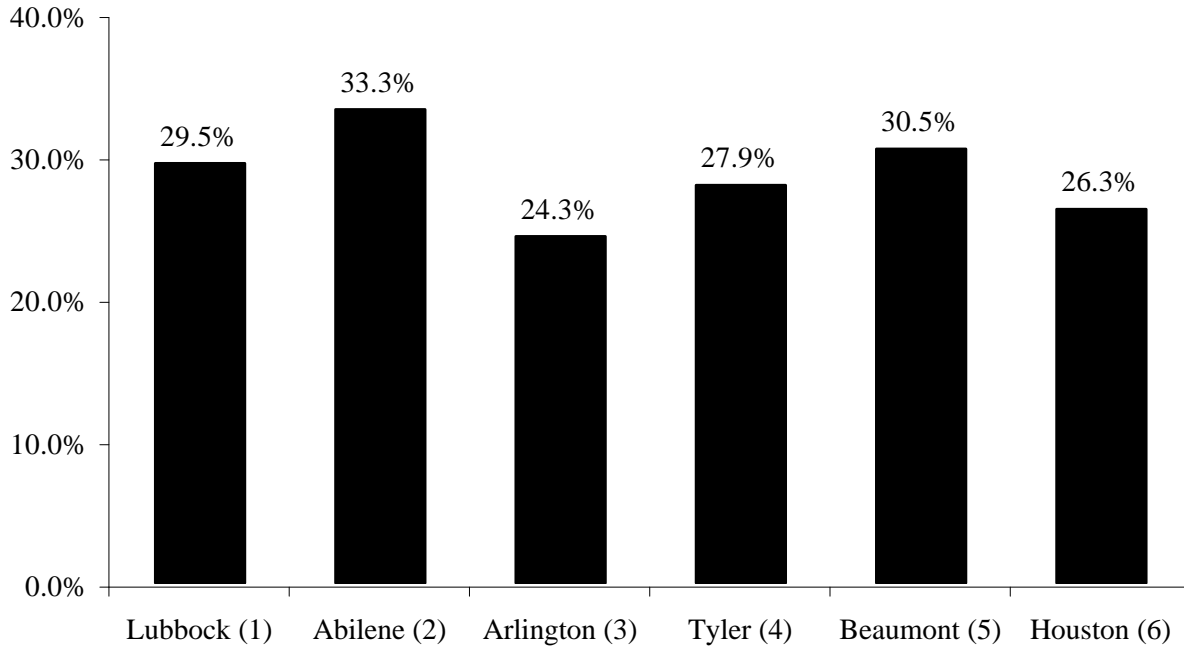


## Recidivism\* of APS In-Home Cases by Fiscal Year



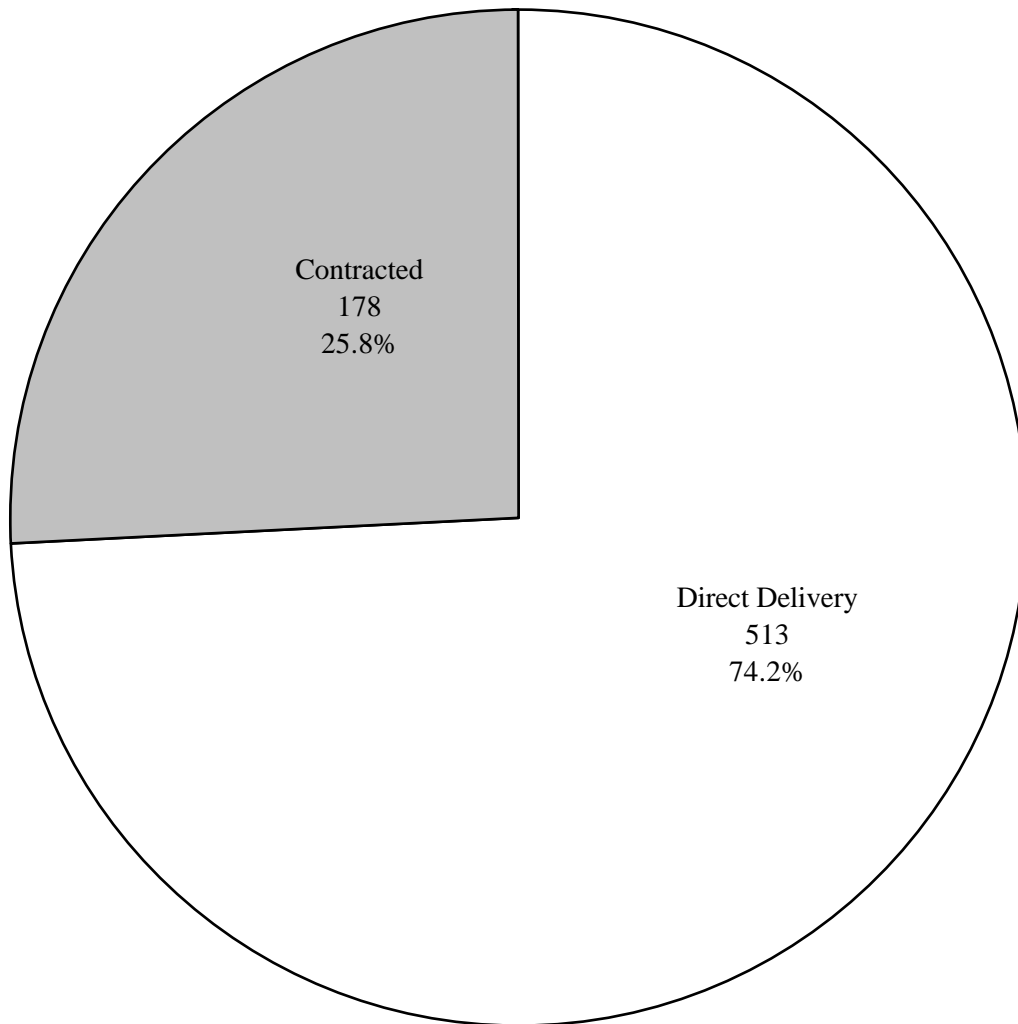

## Recidivism\* of APS In-Home Cases by Region Fiscal Year 2002

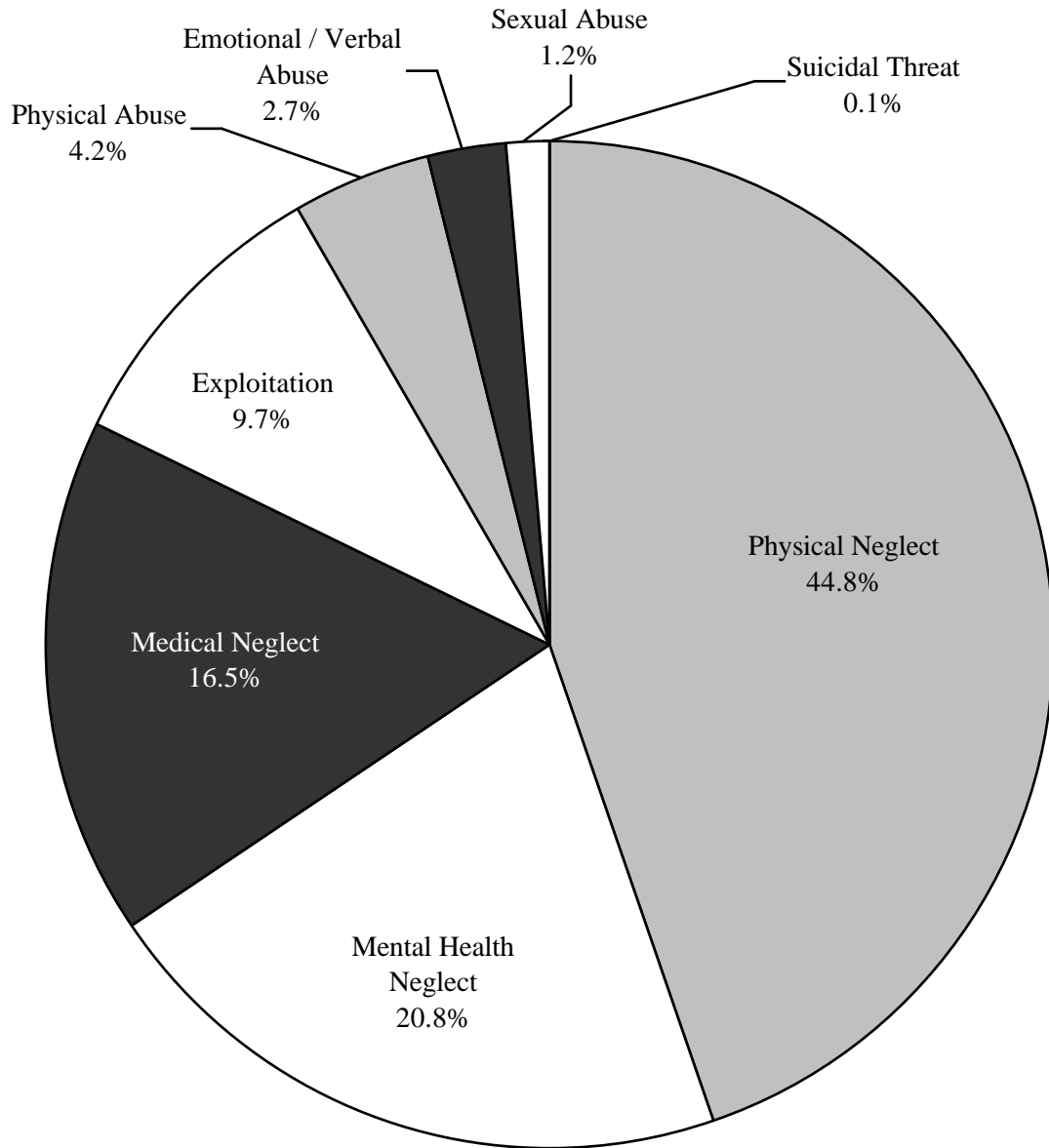

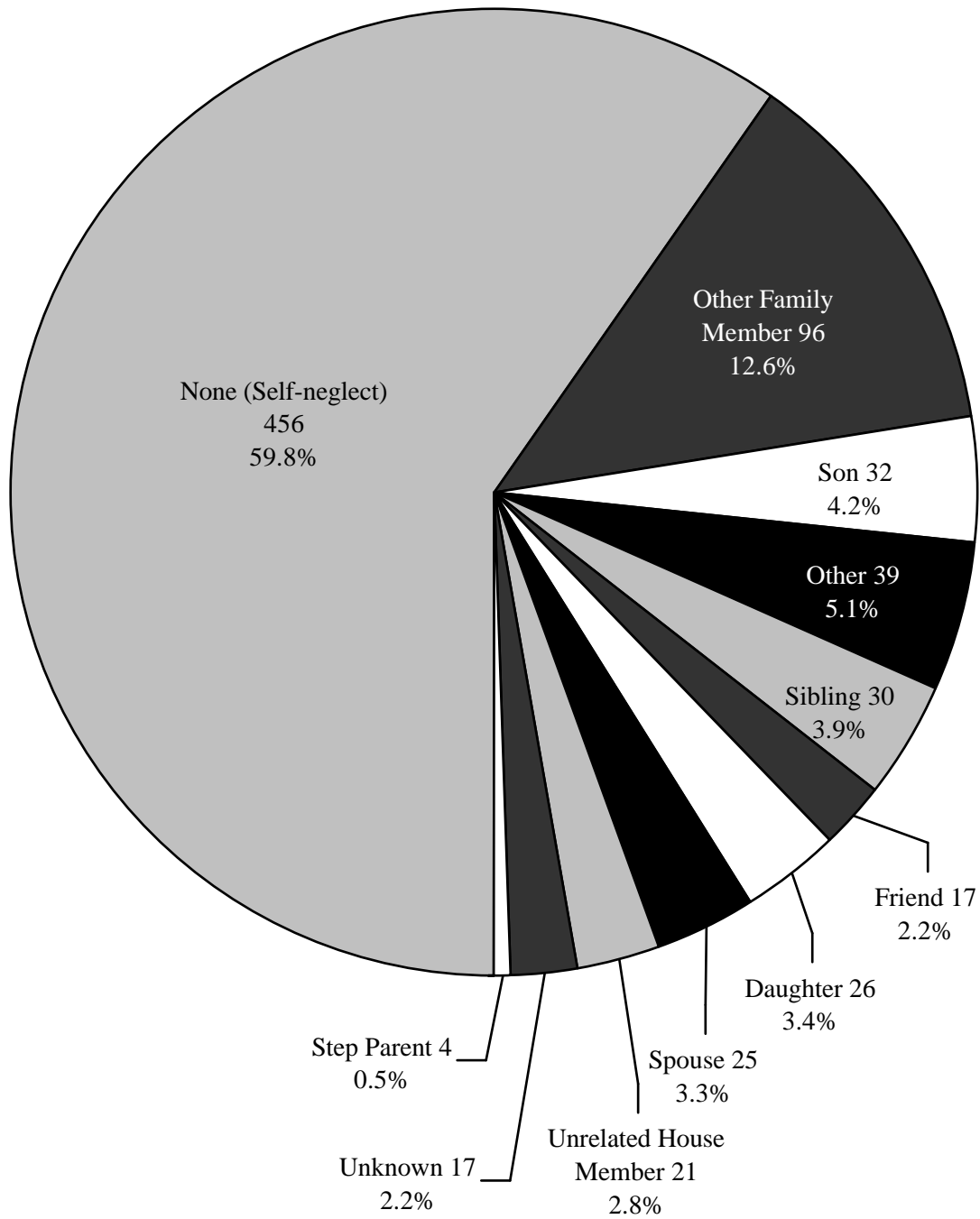

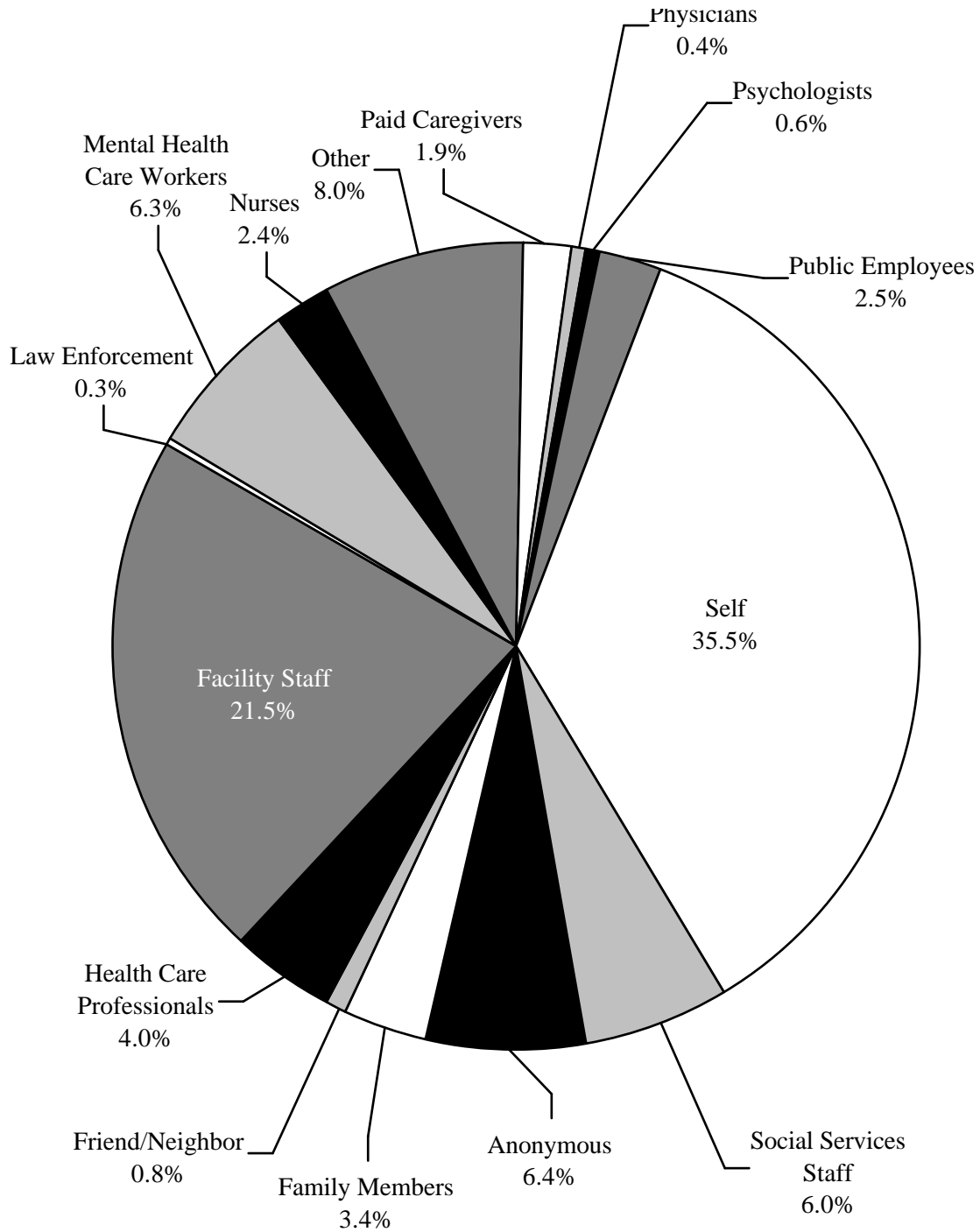

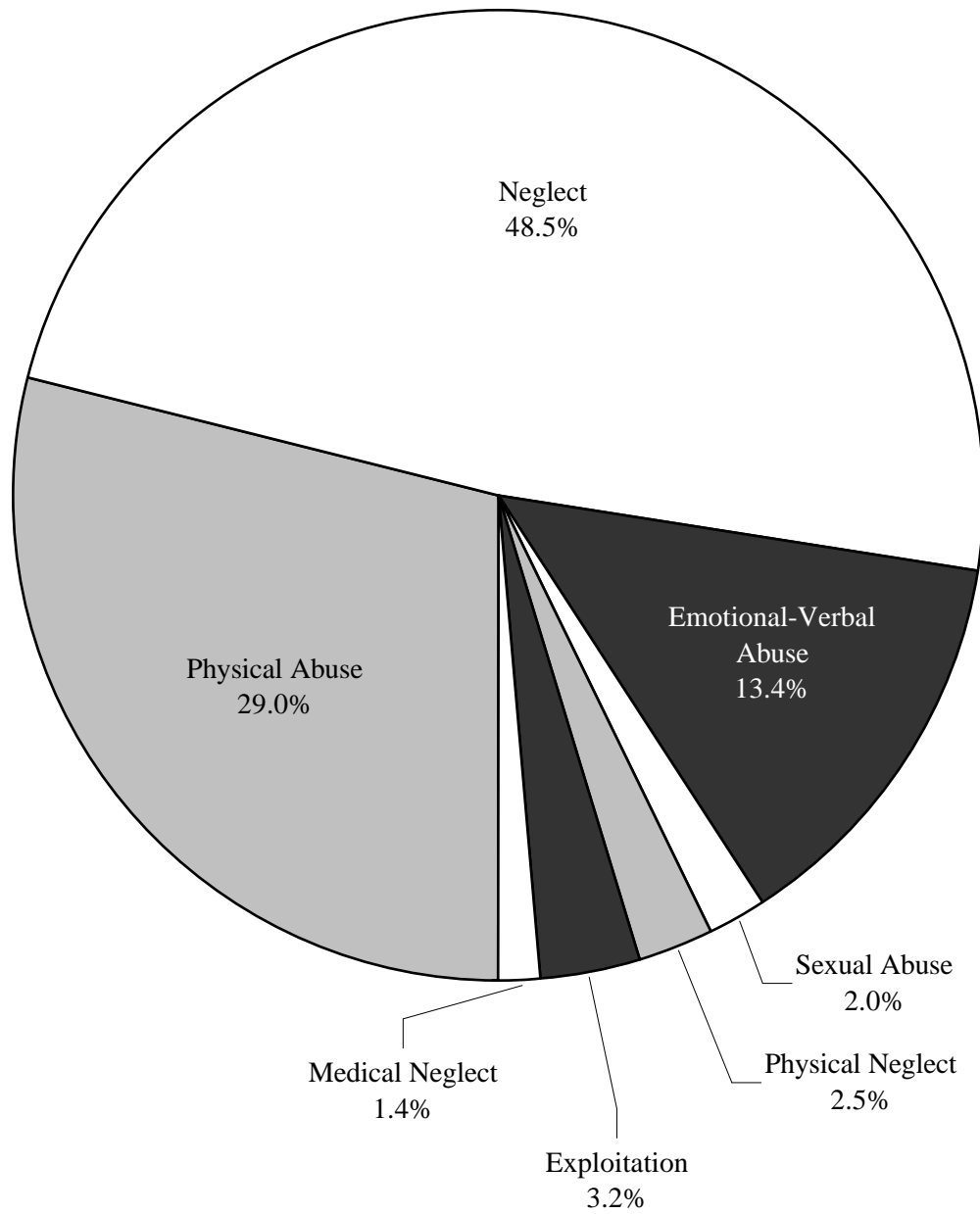
# Perpetrators in Cases that Received Guardianship as of August 31, 2002



# Investigations in MHMR Settings by Source of Report Fiscal Year 2002

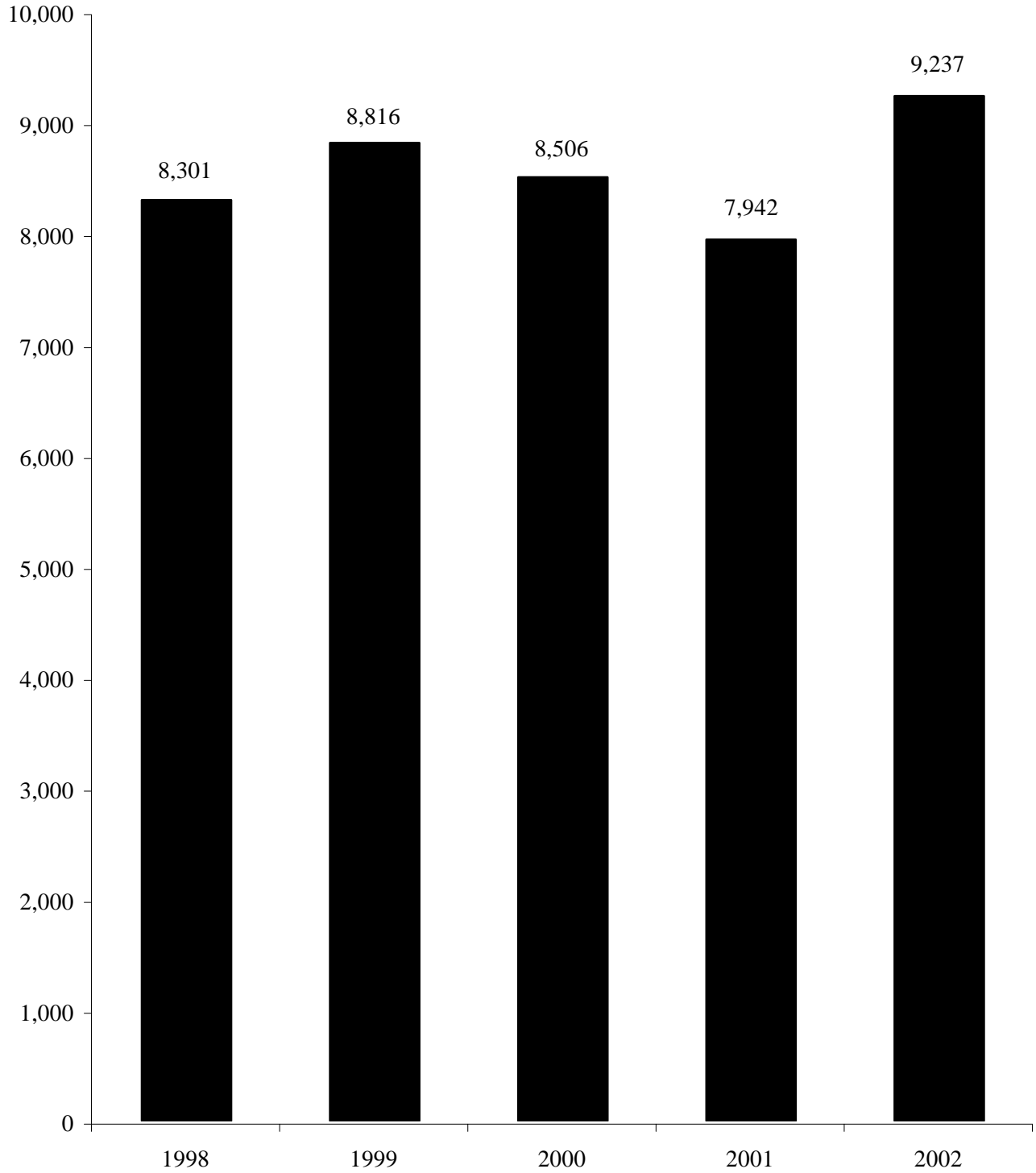


## Types of Abuse Confirmed in MHMR Settings Fiscal Year 2002



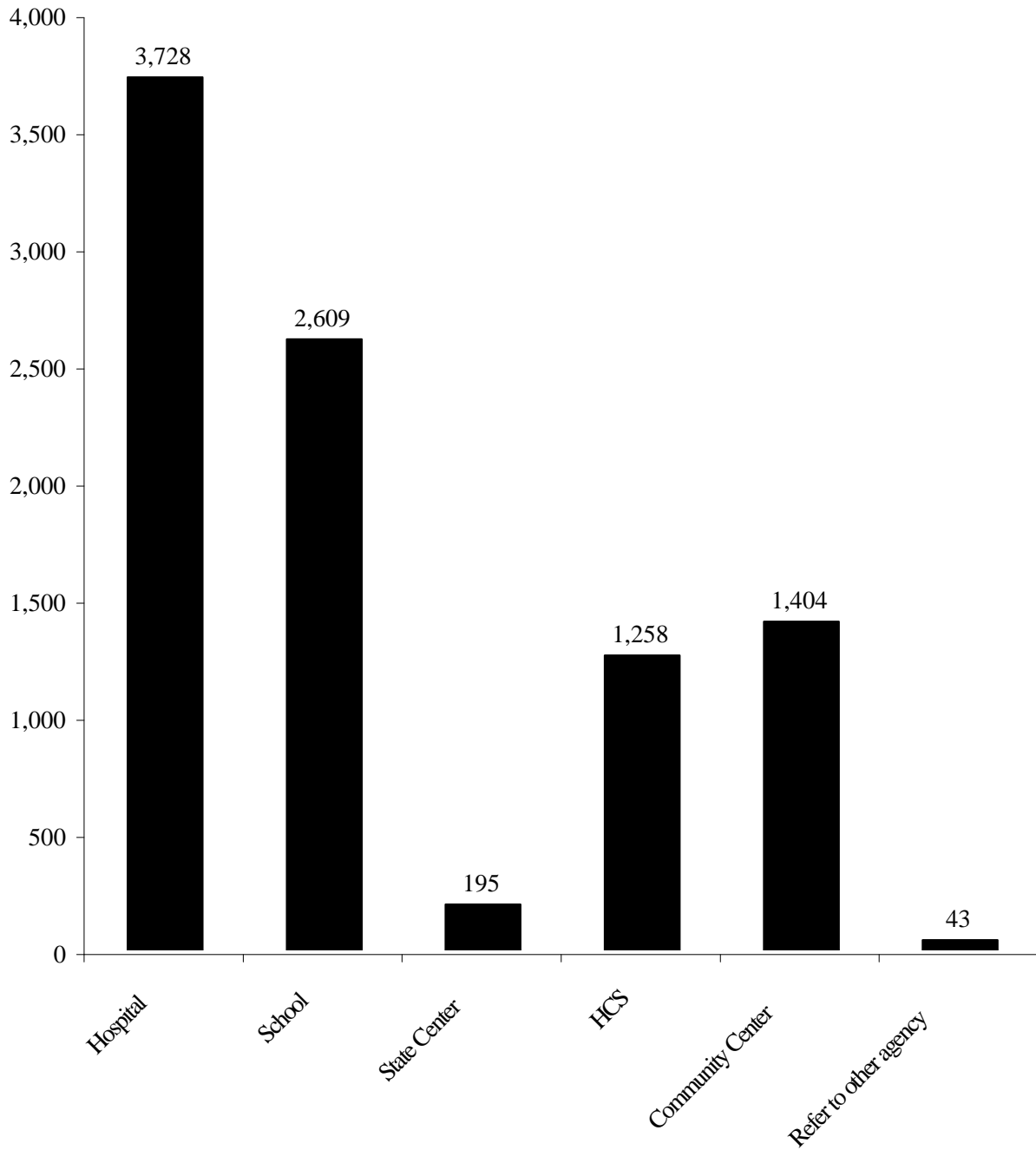


## Completed Investigations in MHMR Settings by Fiscal Year

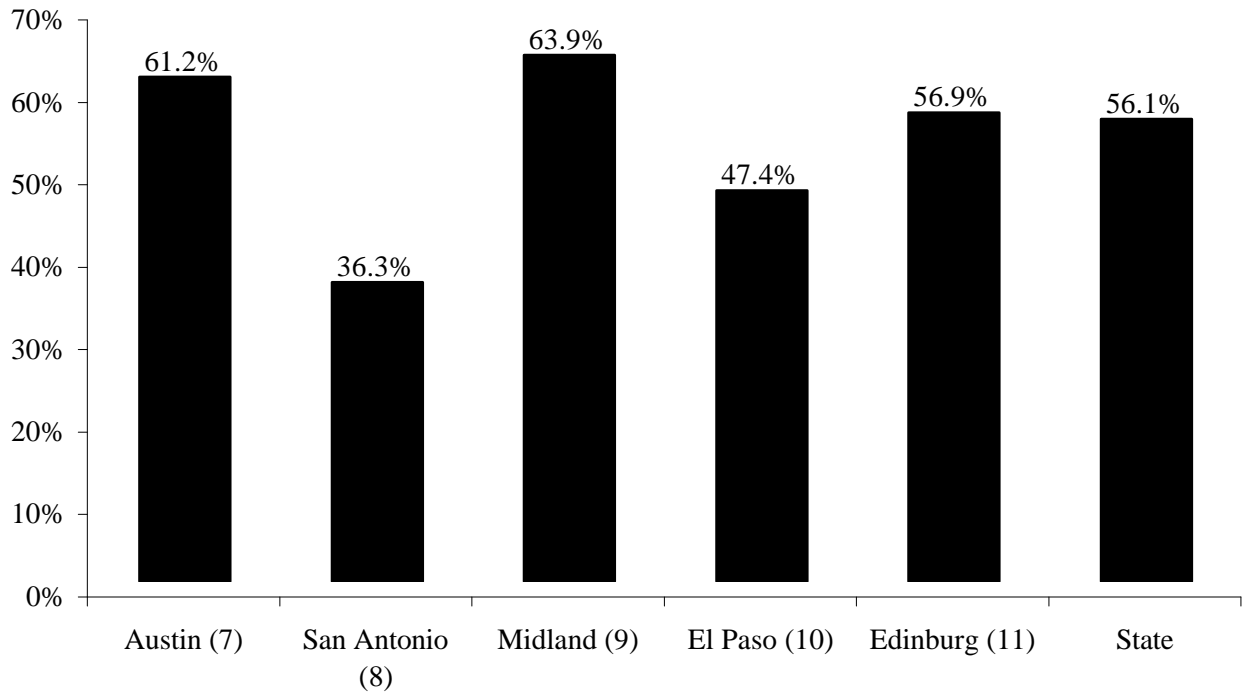
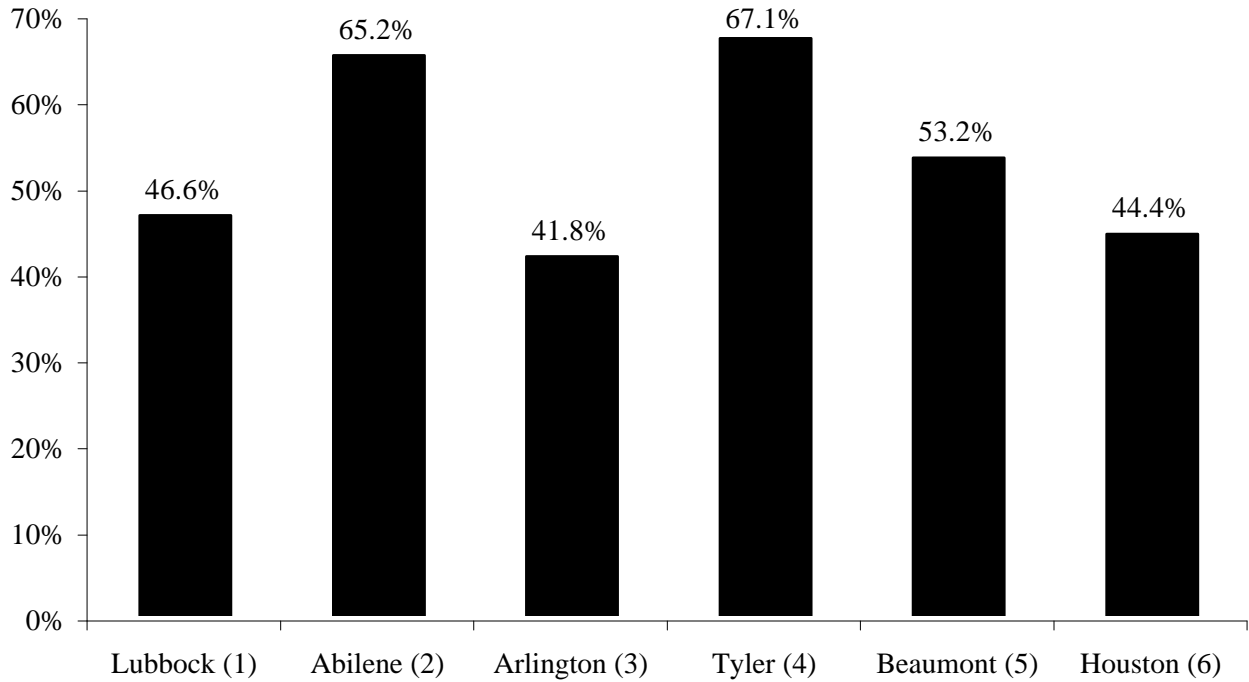

# Legal Responsibility for Child Protective Services

## Statutory References

Social Security Act  
 Texas Family Code  
 Human Resources Code

## Major Provisions

- Definitions of abuse and neglect of children;
- Mandatory reporting of suspected abuse or neglect of children;
- Prepare and disseminate statistics by county relating to CPS in an annual report made available to the legislature and general public;
- Responsibility for receiving reports of suspected abuse or neglect of children;
- Responsibility for thorough investigation of a report of child abuse or neglect allegedly committed by a person responsible for a child's care, custody or welfare;
- Responsibility to assign priorities and prescribe investigative procedures for investigations based on the severity and immediacy of the alleged harm to the child;
- Take action to protect abused and neglected children from further harm;
- Establish review teams to evaluate department casework and decision-making related to investigations of child abuse or neglect.
- Employ a CPS investigations coordinator (Risk Director) to conduct staff reviews and evaluations of cases determined to involve high risk, monitor cases with multiple referrals, and approve decisions and assessments related to investigations which involve a high risk to the health or safety of a child.
- Work with children and their families, providing services to prevent further abuse, help alleviate the effects of the abuse suffered, prevent removal of the child from the home, and provide reunification services when appropriate for the return of the child to the home;
- When necessary, secure appropriate court orders and take possession of a child if there is an immediate danger to the physical health or safety of the child or the child has been a victim of neglect or sexual abuse and that continuation in the home would be contrary to the child's welfare;
- Make reasonable efforts to secure the return of the child;
- Develop a service plan in conference with the child's parents to determine return of the child to the child's parents, termination of parental rights and placement of the child for adoption, or because of the child's special needs or exceptional circumstances continue the child's care out of the child's home;
- Provide substitute care for children until the problems have been sufficiently resolved;
- Provide permanent placement for children who cannot safely return to their home.
- Establish a database of all verified foster homes willing to accept foster care placement of a child in care;
- Recruit potential adoptive parents for children whose parents have had their parental rights terminated.

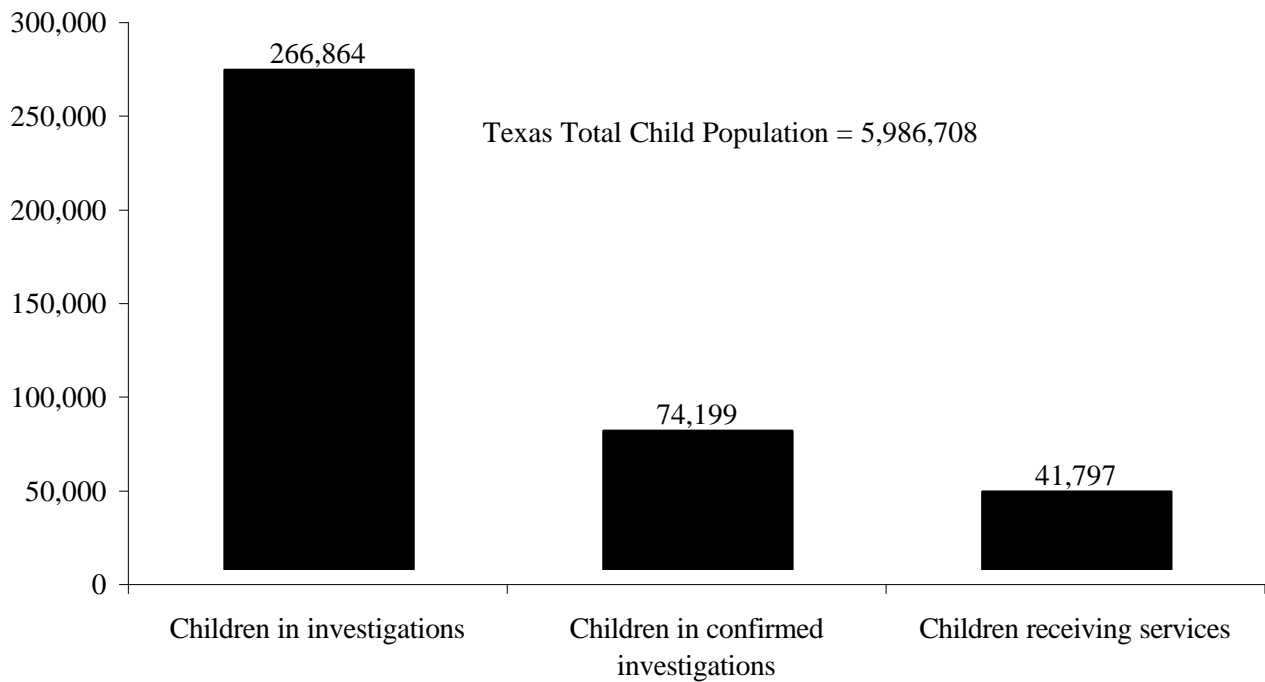

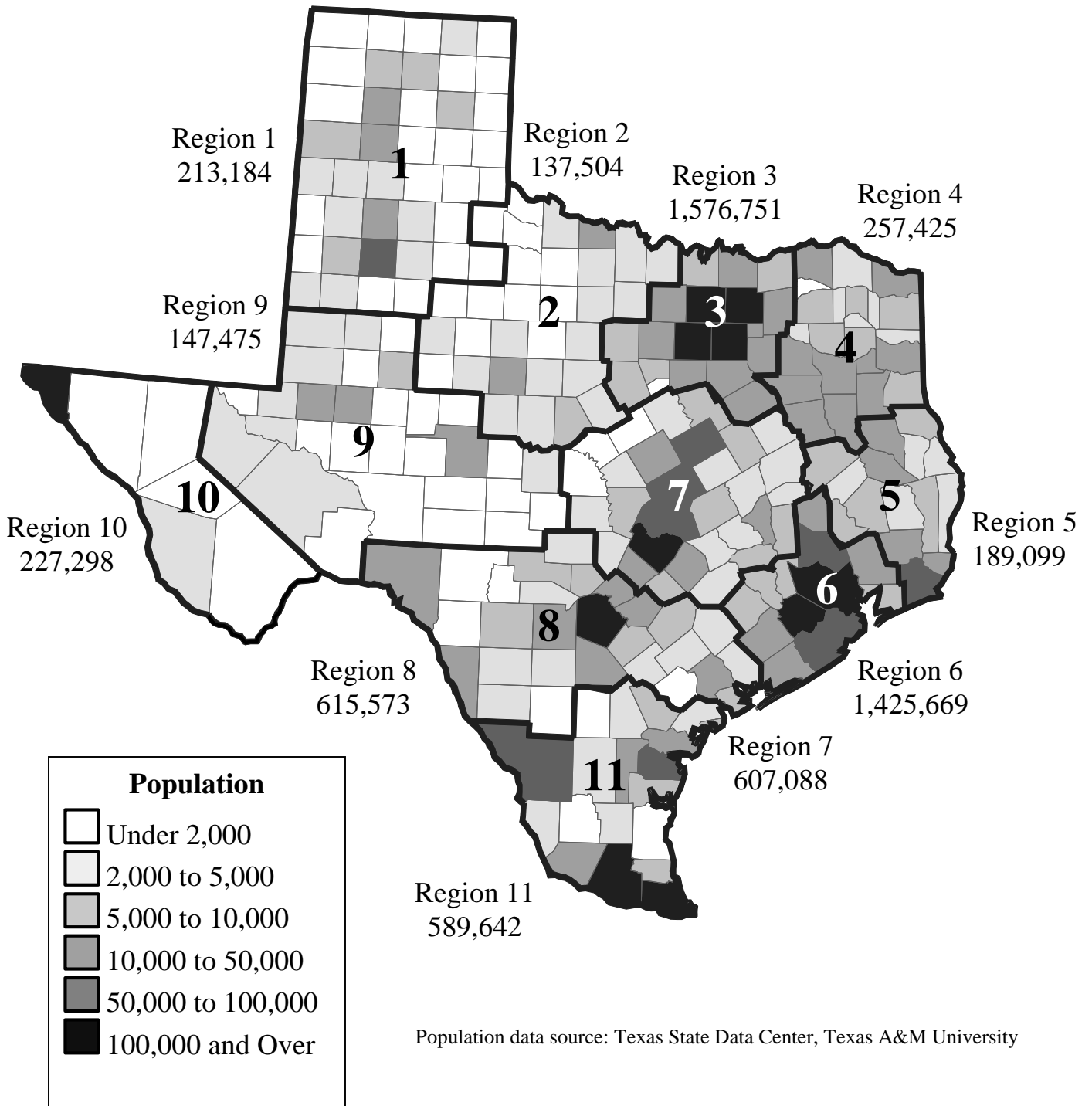

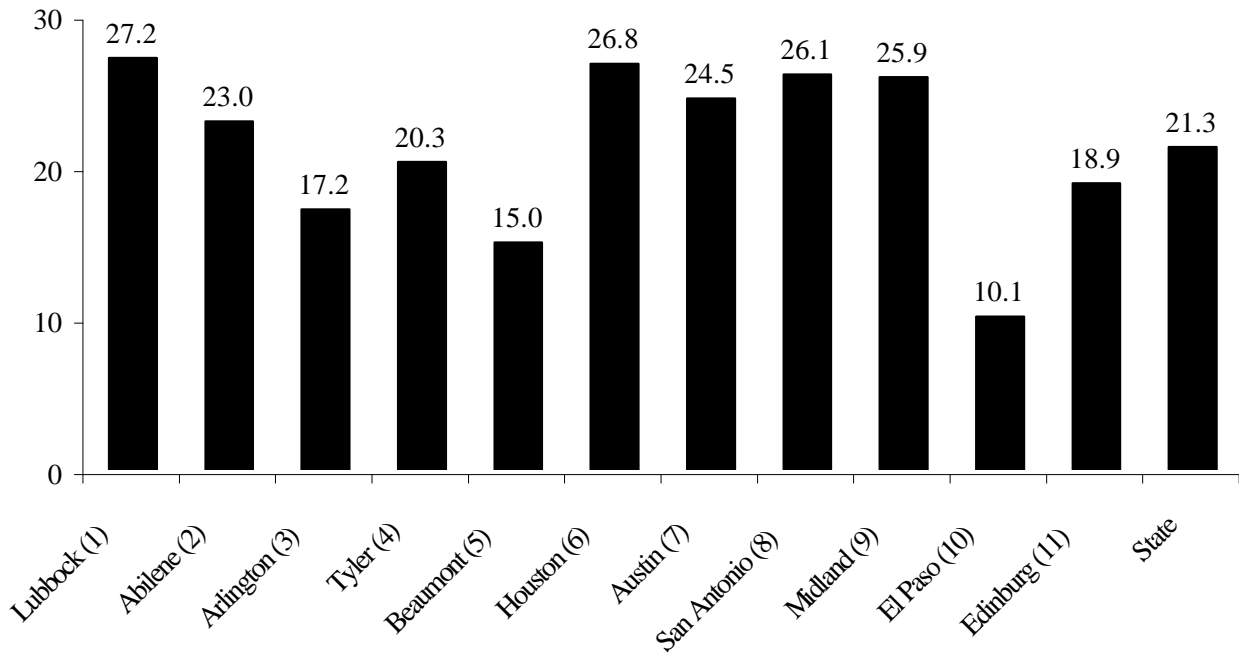

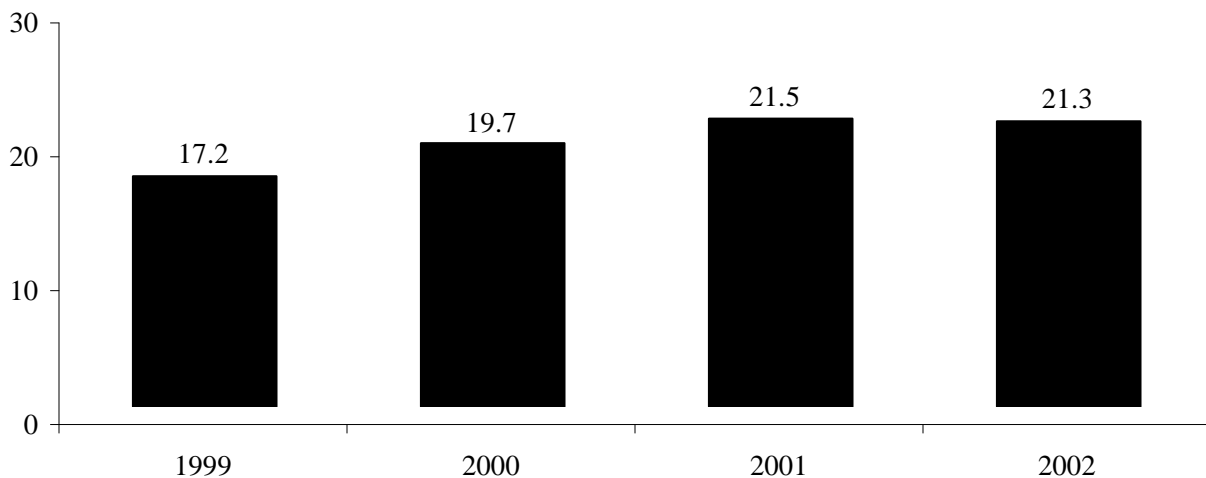

## Average Monthly Weighted CPS Caseload per Worker by Region Fiscal Year 2002

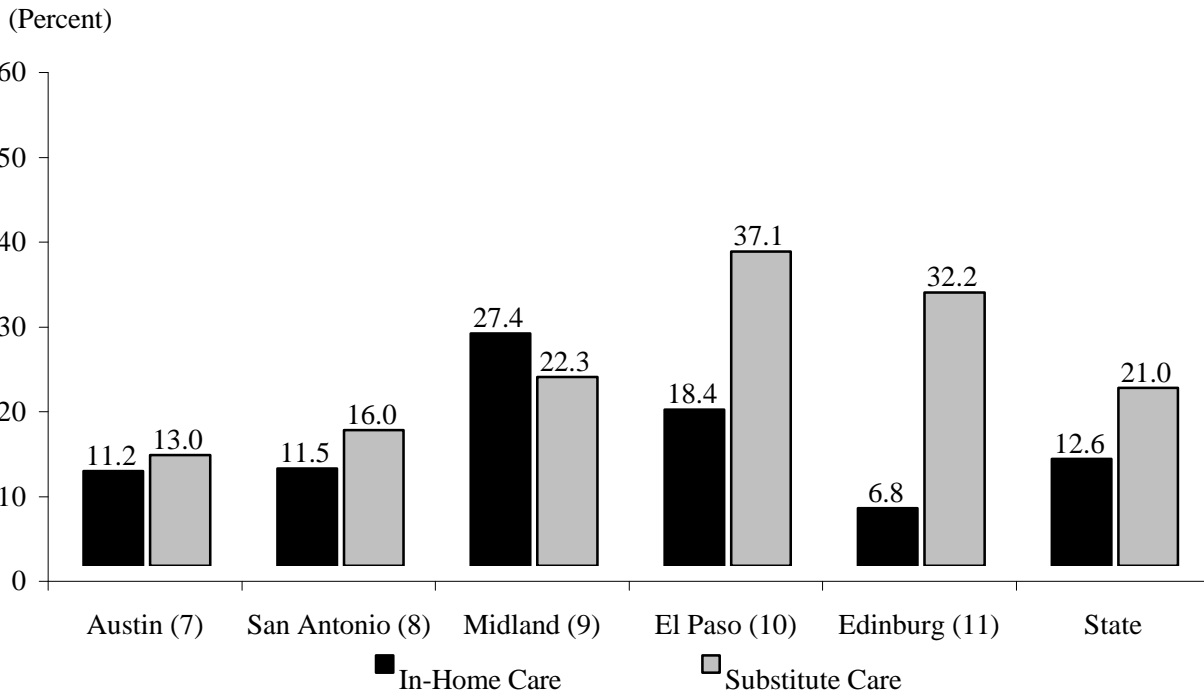
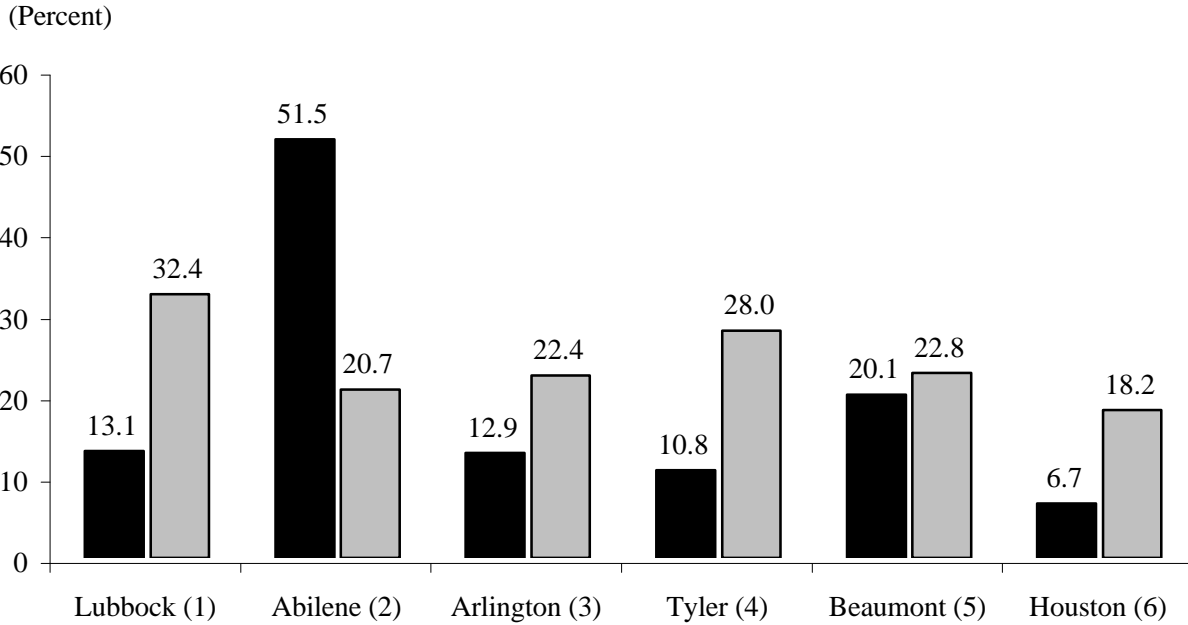

## Average Monthly Percent of Children Receiving CPS Purchased Services by Region Fiscal Year 2002

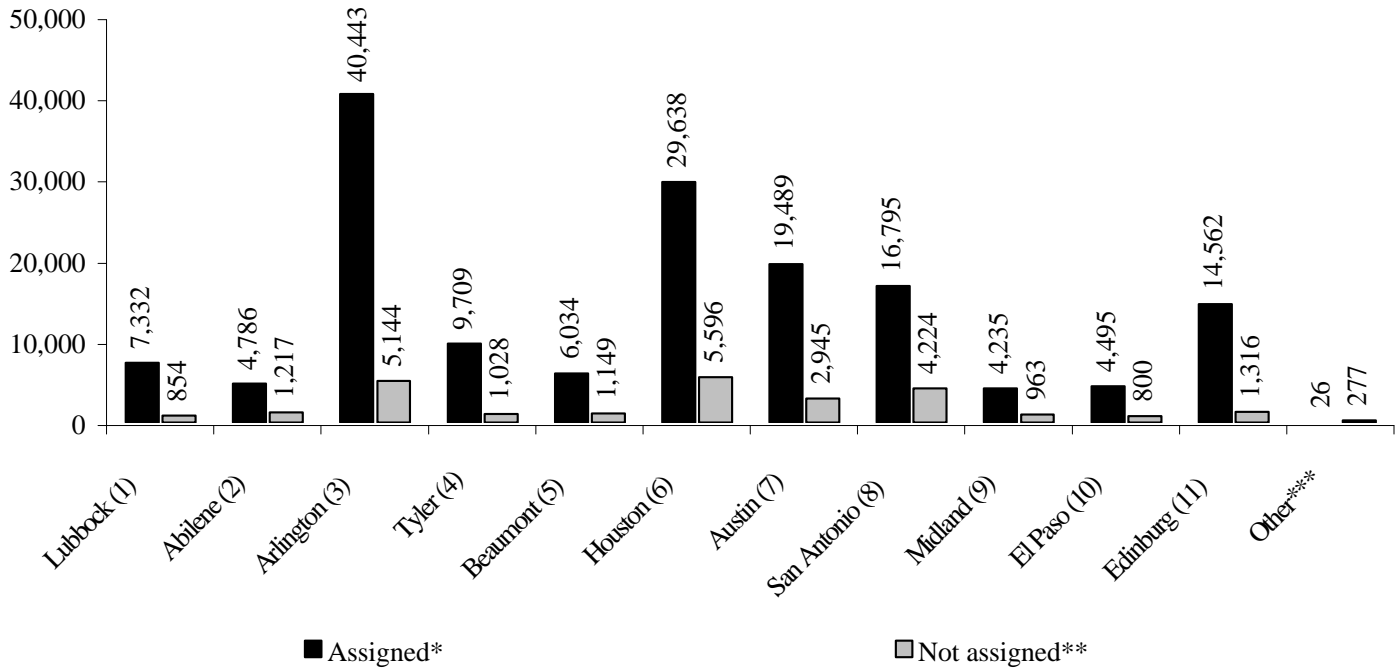

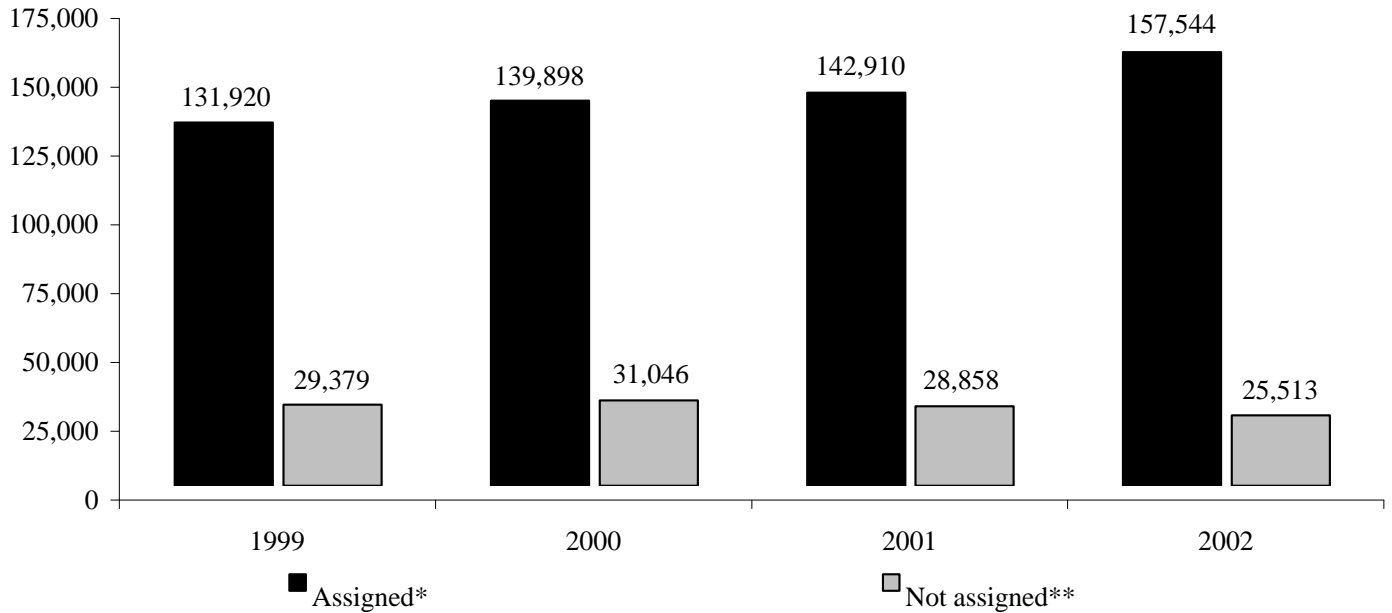

Reason to believe -- Based on a preponderance of evidence, staff concluded that abuse or neglect occurred.

### Unconfirmed Investigations

Ruled out -- Staff determined, based on available information, that it is reasonable to conclude that abuse or neglect has not occurred.

Moved -- Before staff could reach a conclusion, the persons involved in the report moved and could not be located.

Unable-to-determine -- Staff concluded that none of the other dispositions were appropriate.

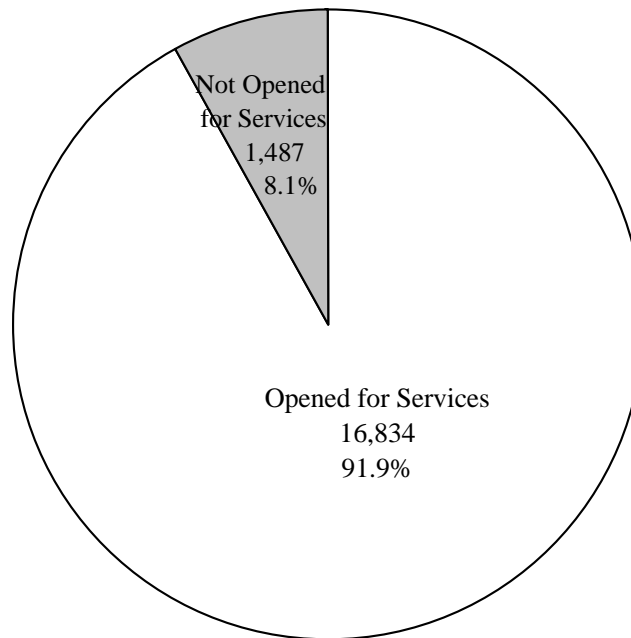

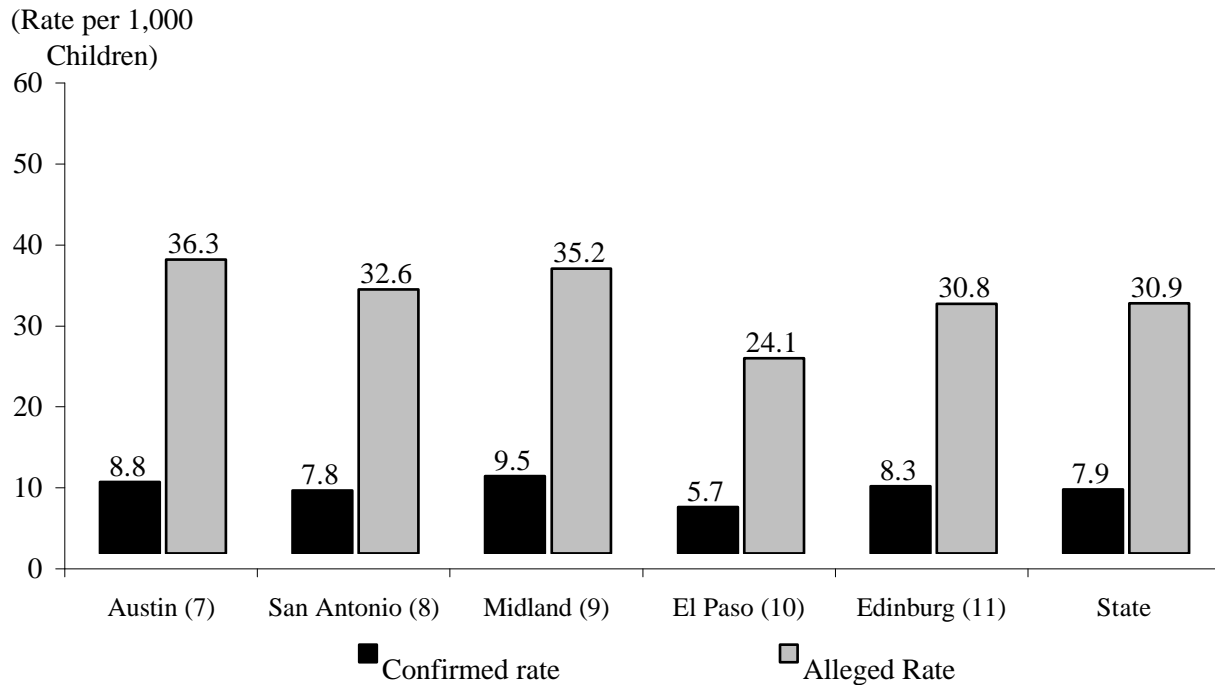
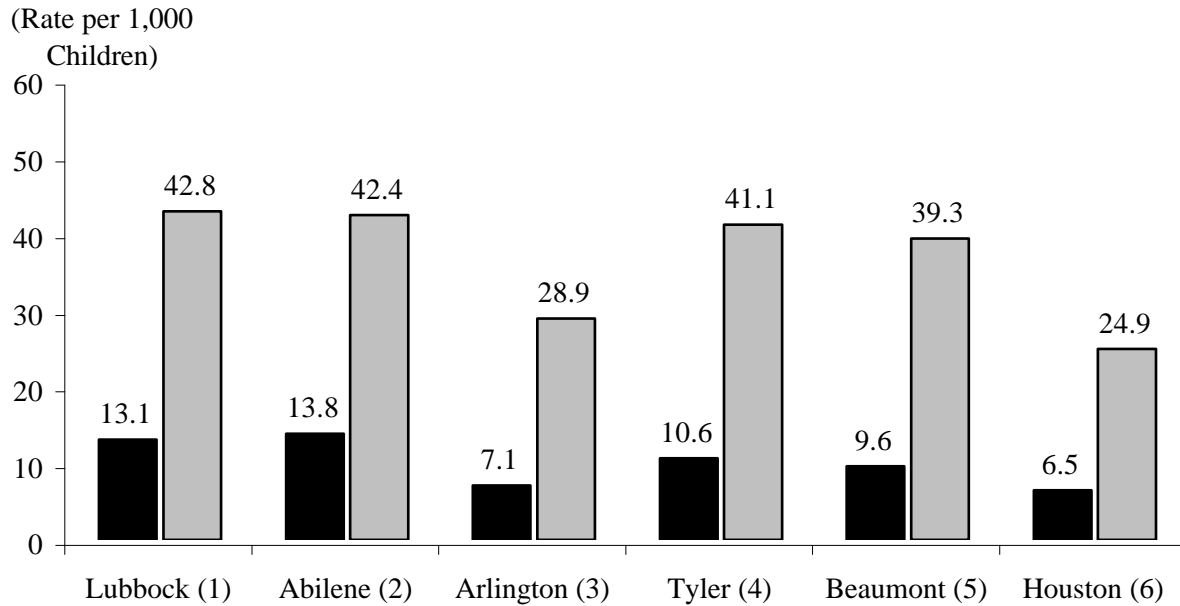

## Incidence of Child Abuse/Neglect per 1,000 Children in Texas Child Population by Region Fiscal Year 2002



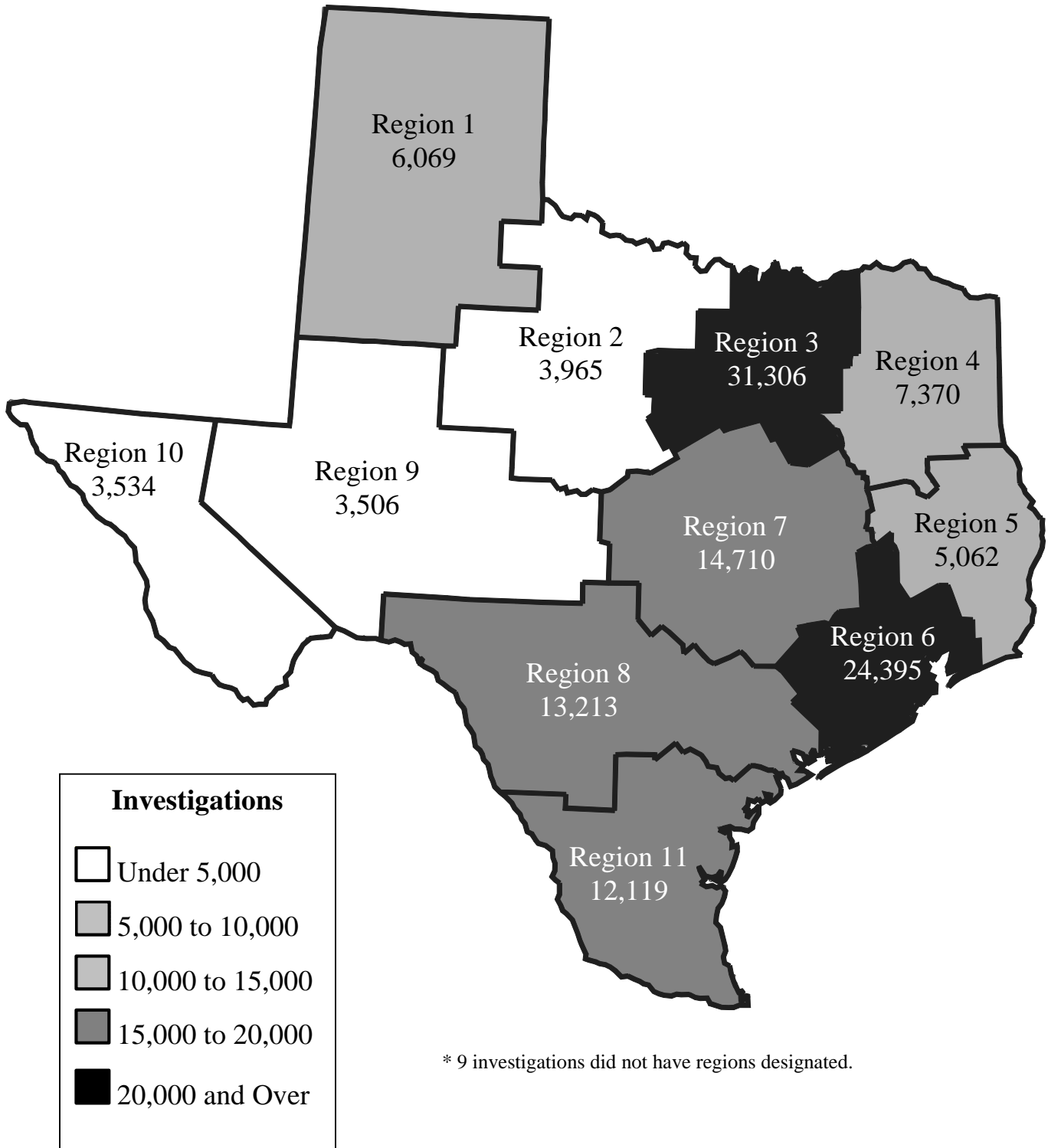

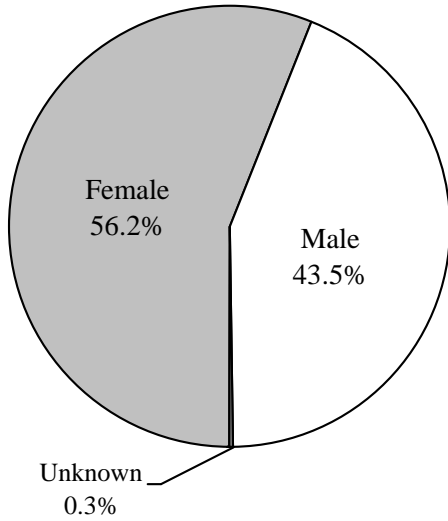

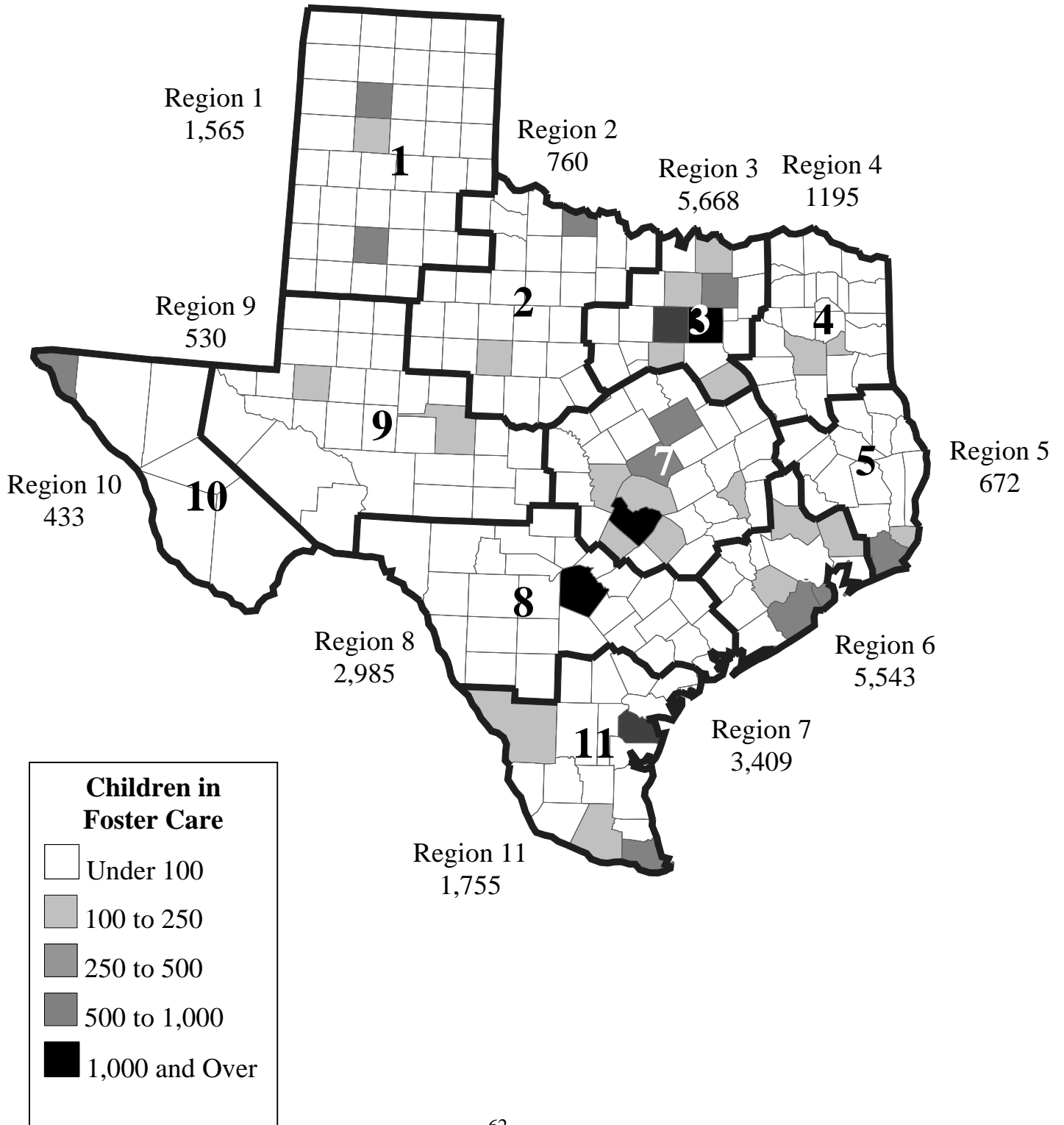

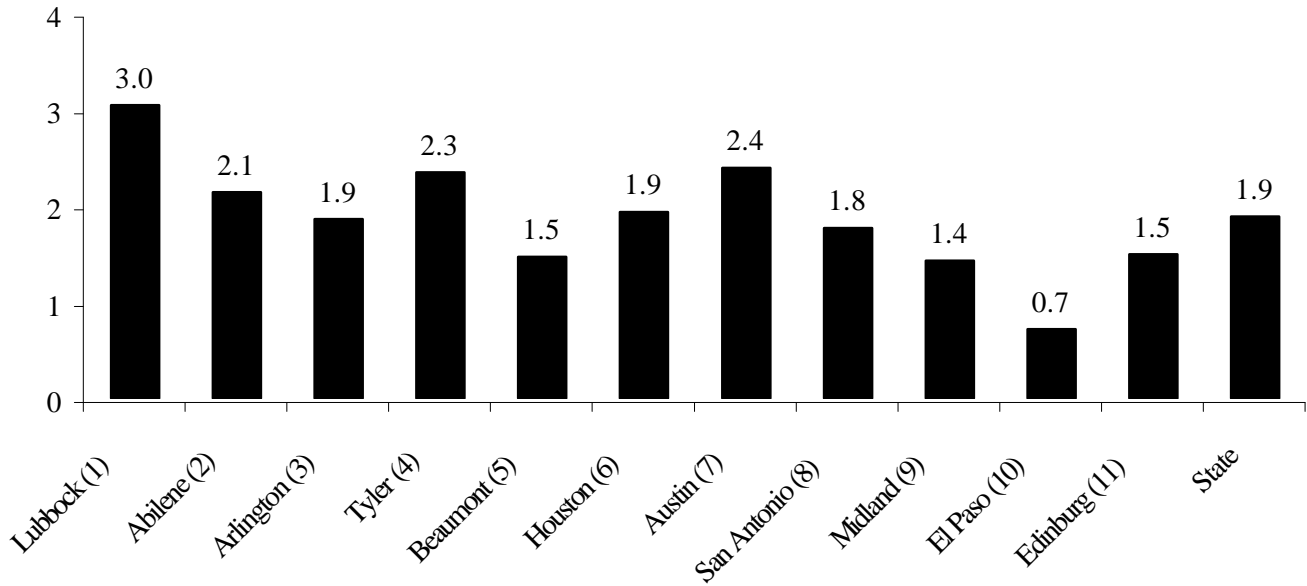
# Annual Number of Children in Foster Care by County Fiscal Year 2002

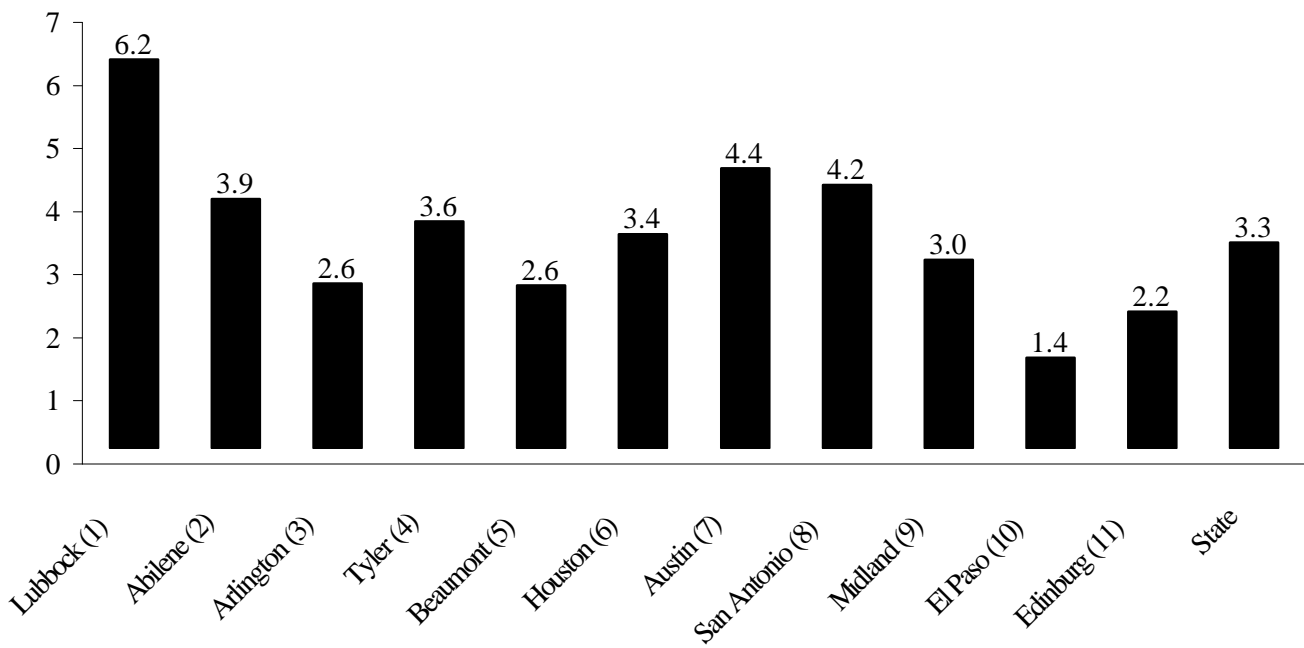


## Point Prevalence Rate\* for Children Entering Substitute Care Fiscal Year 2002

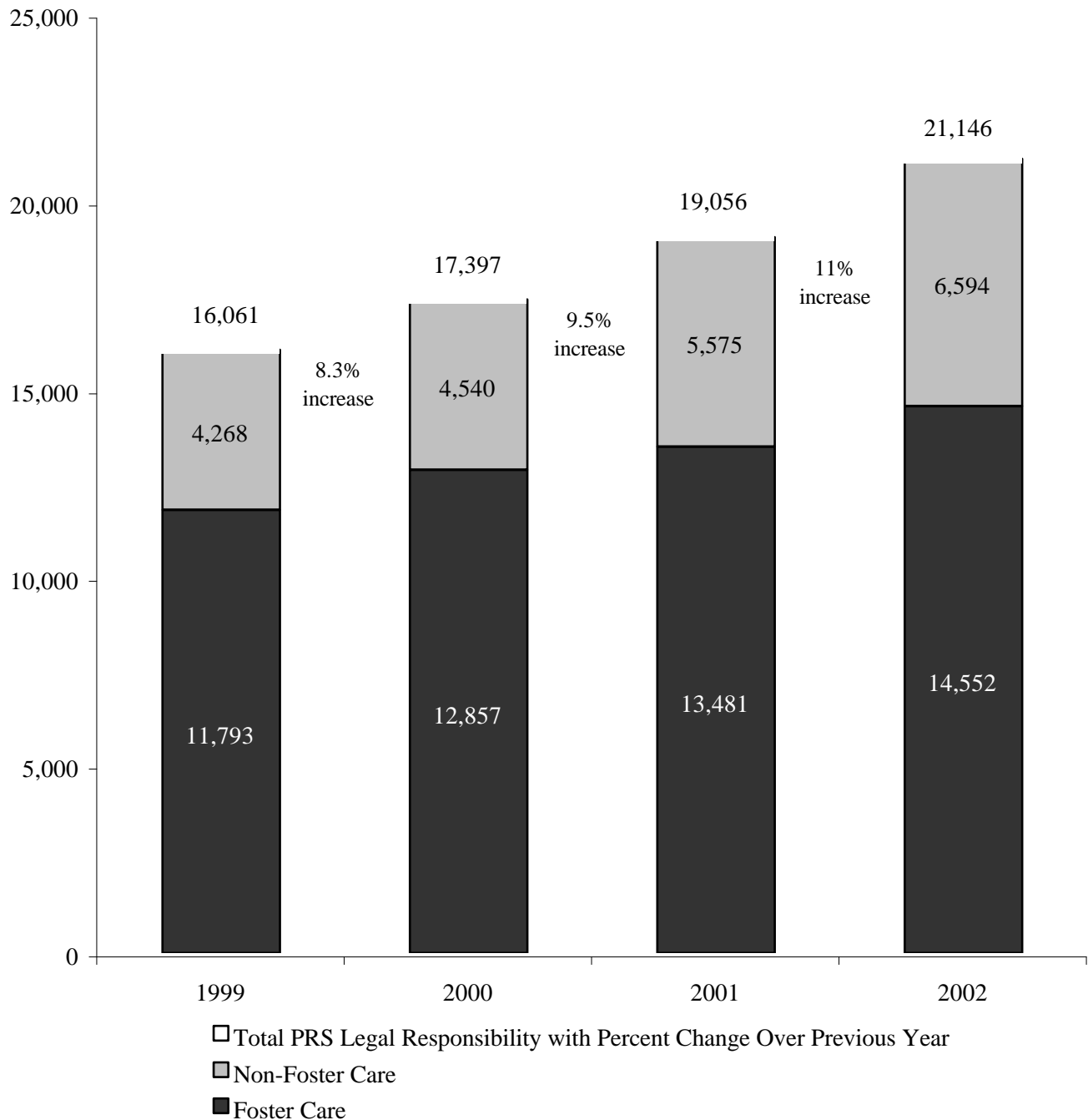

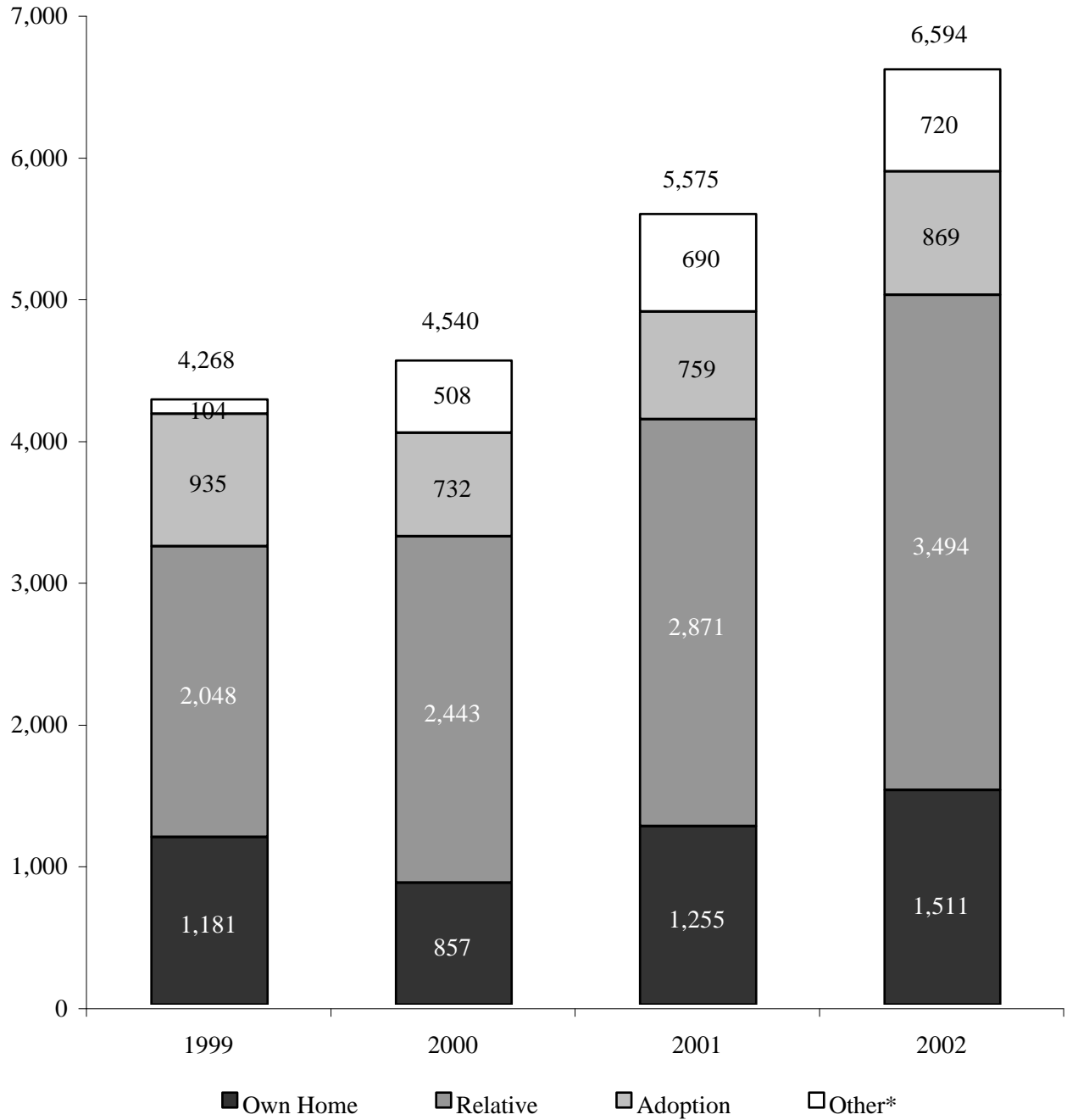

## Children in PRS Legal Responsibility by Living Arrangement End of August Each Fiscal Year



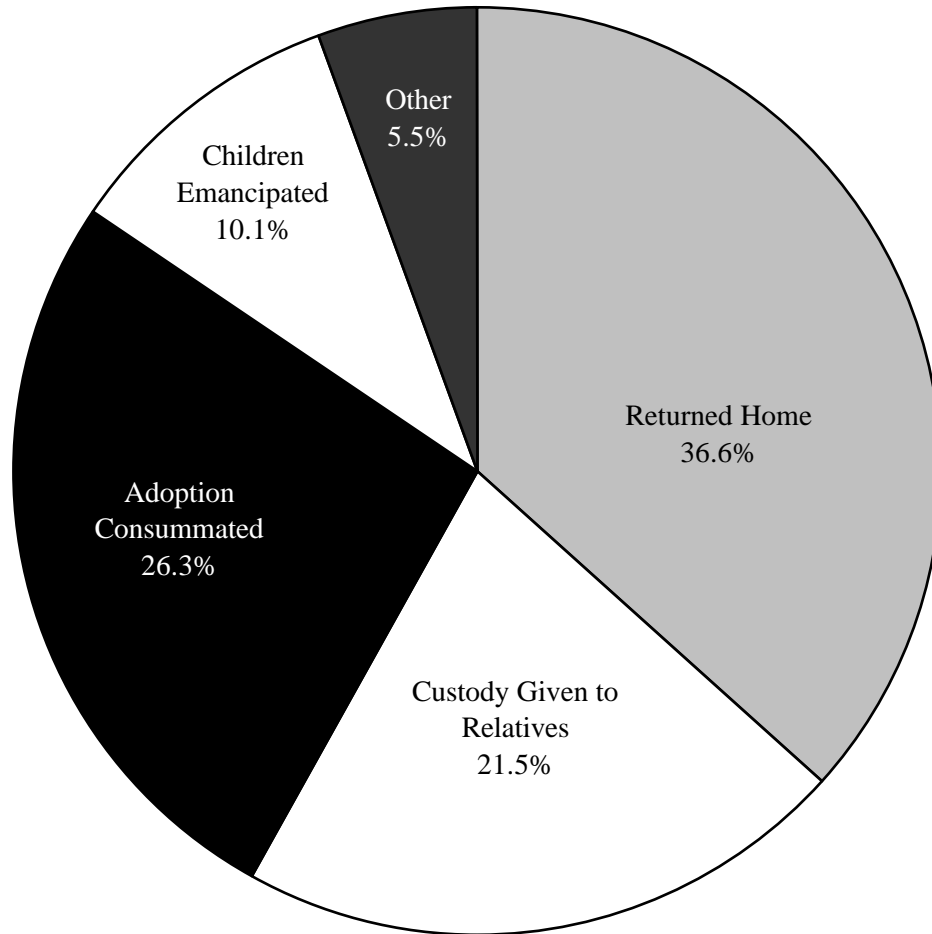

## Children in PRS Legal Responsibility in Non-Foster Care Placements by Fiscal Year



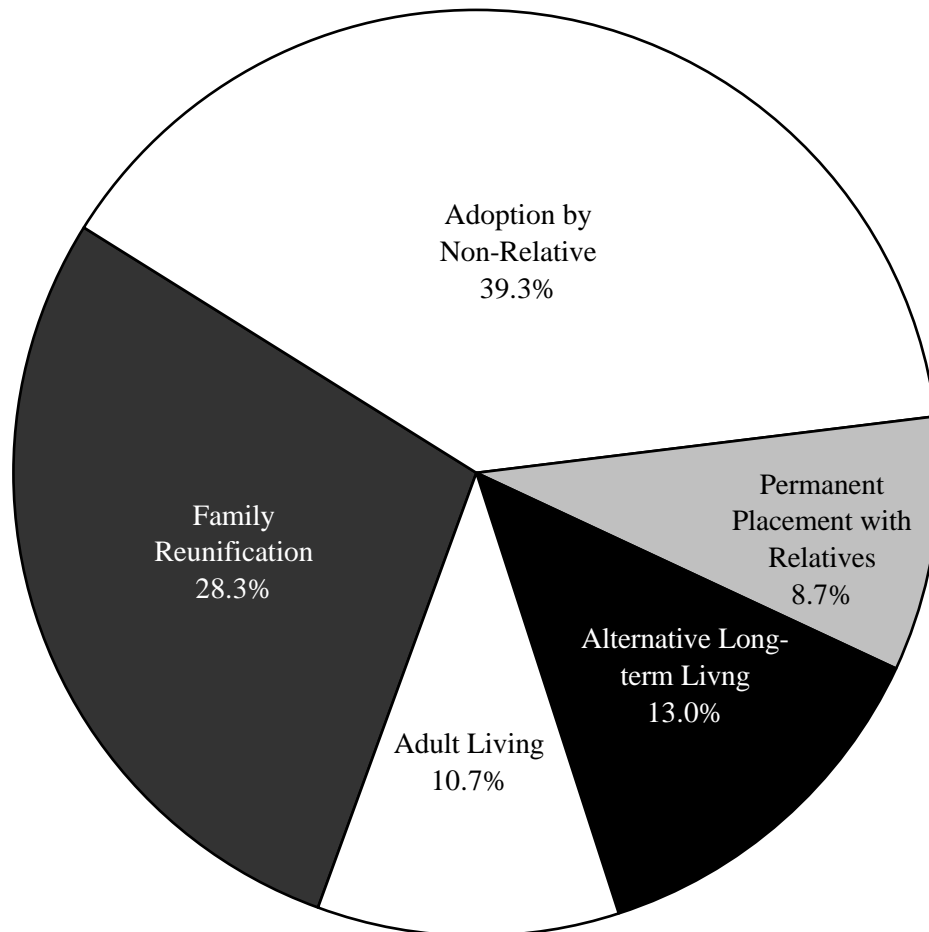

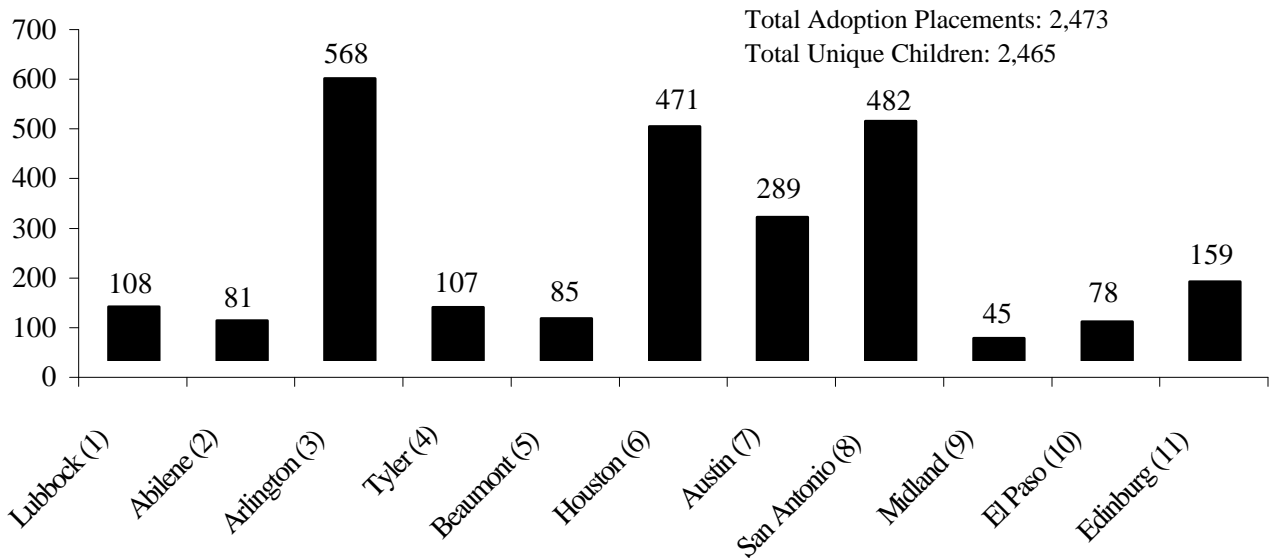

## Children Placed in Adoptive Homes by Region Fiscal Year 2002

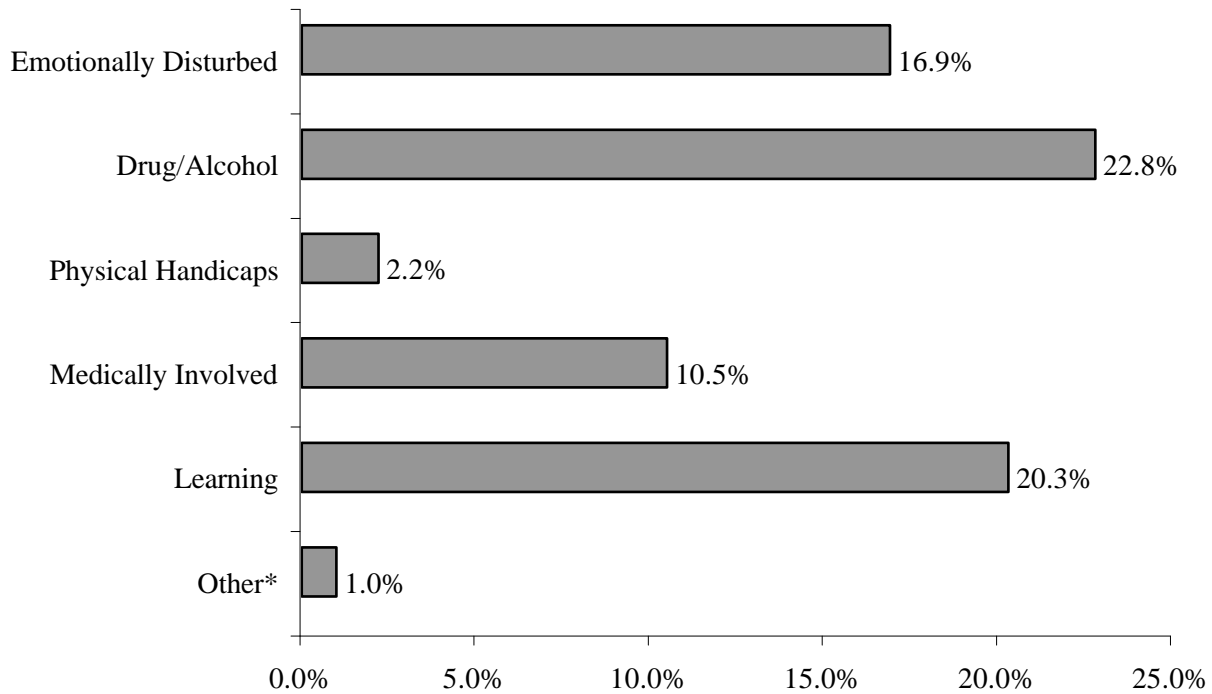


# Demographics of 2,465 Children Placed in Adoptive Homes Fiscal Year 2002

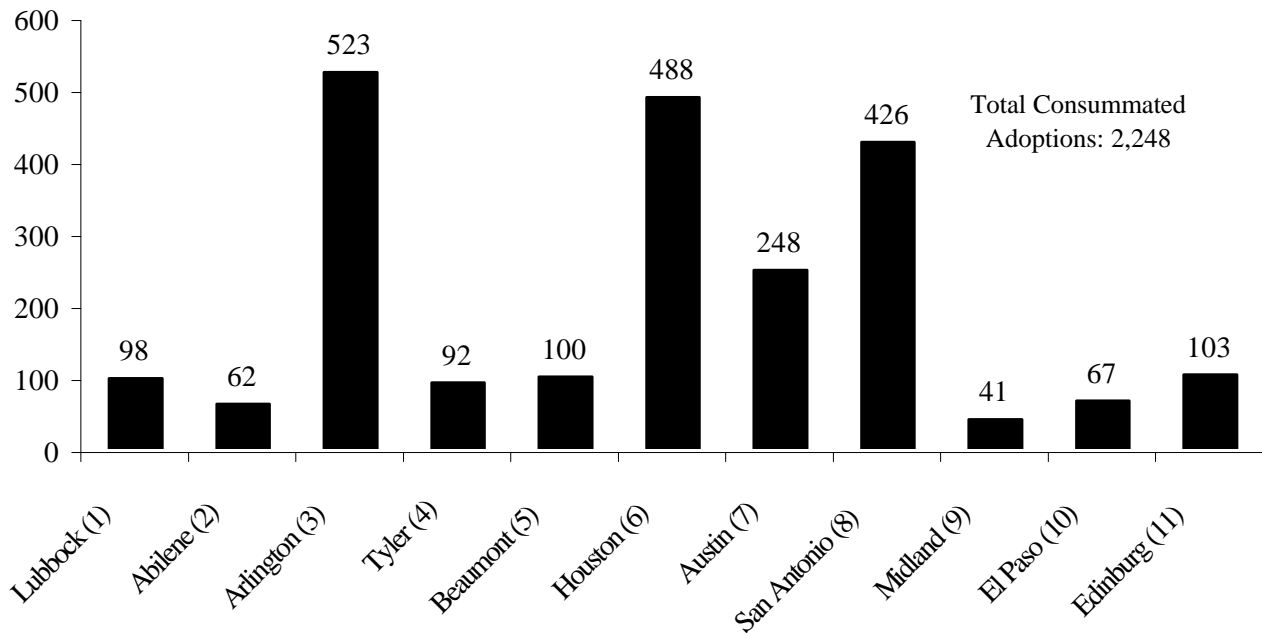

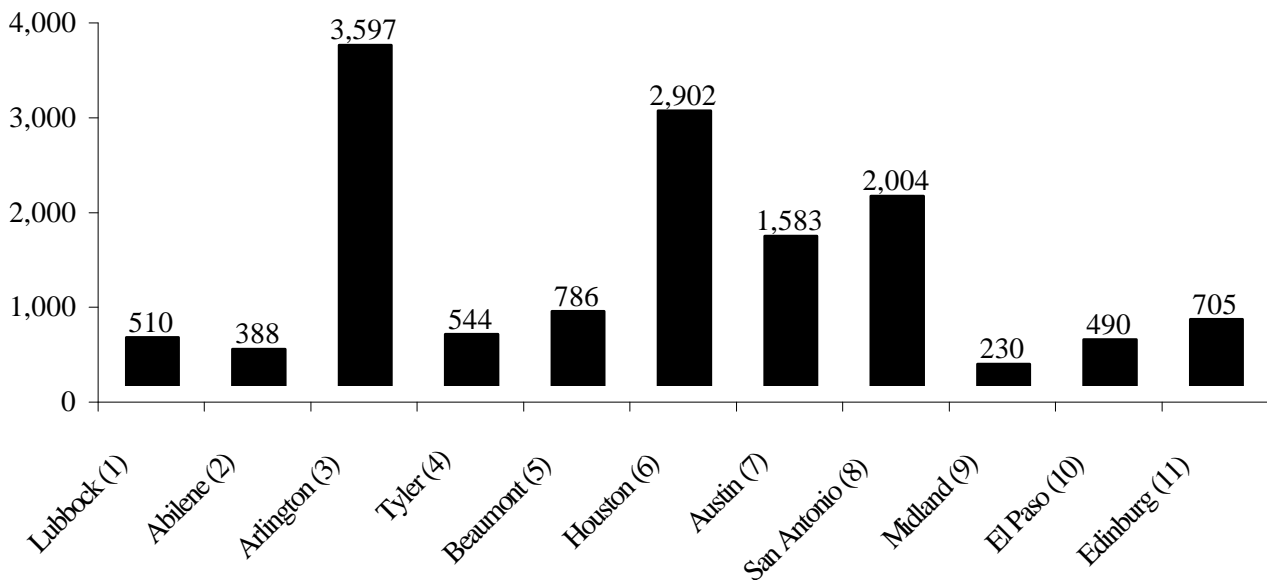

## Average Number of Children Provided Adoption Subsidy Per Month Fiscal Year 2002

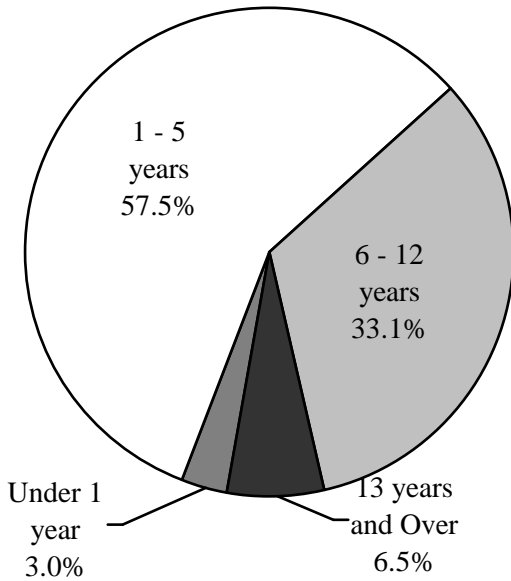

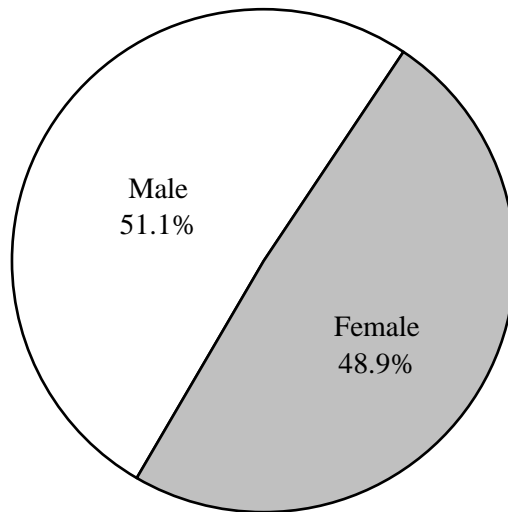

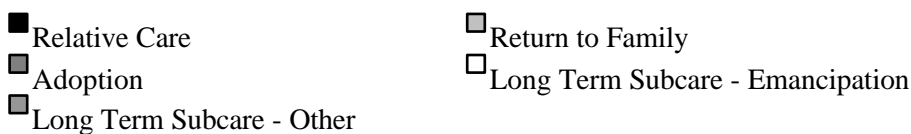

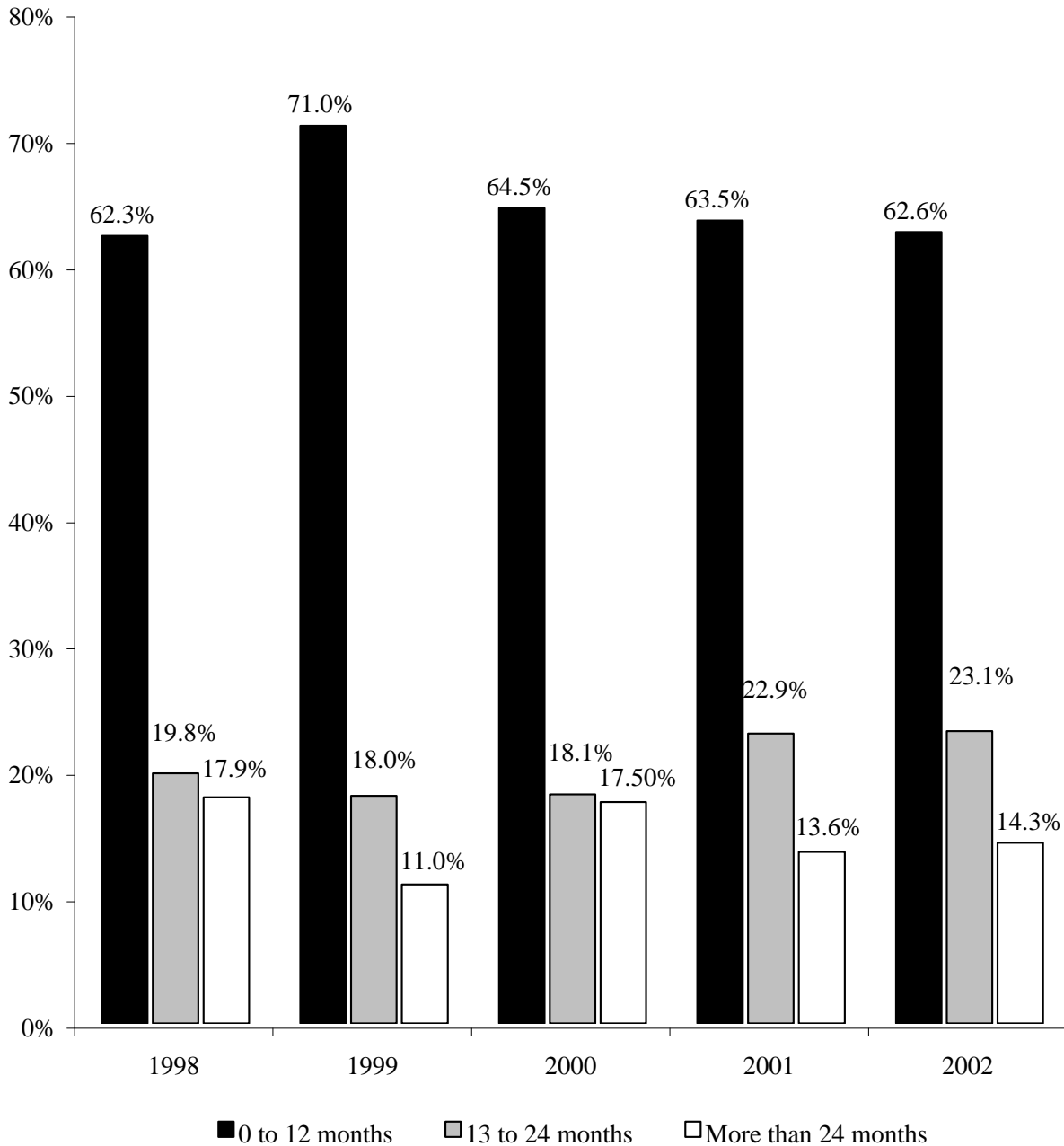

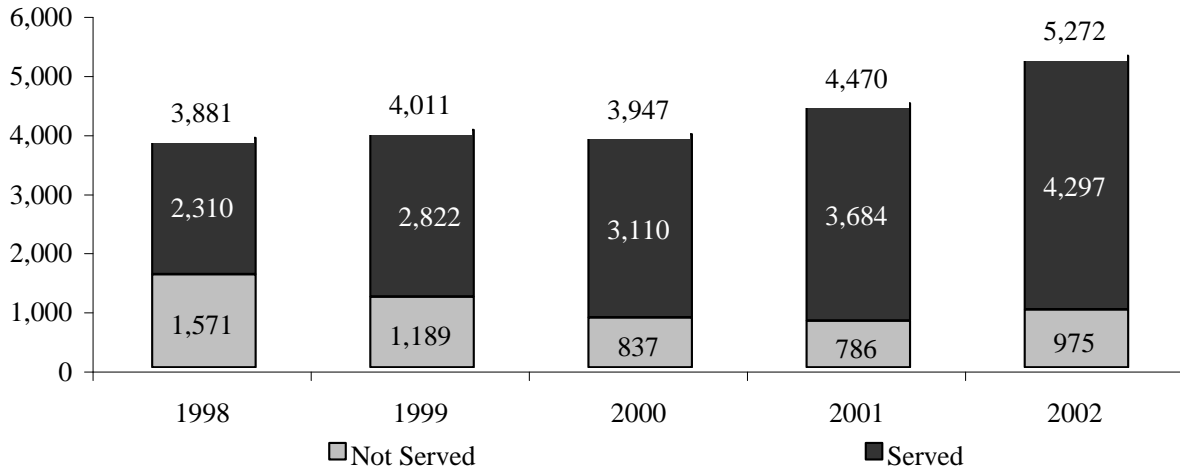

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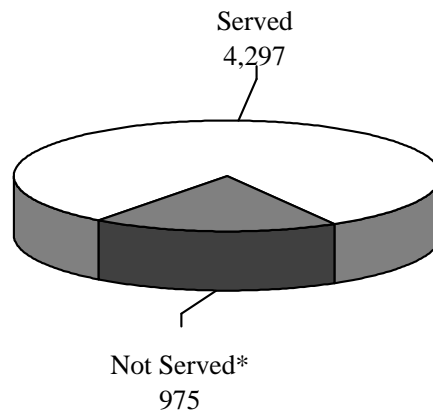

## Preparation for Adult Living (PAL) Services Youth Ages 16 through 20 by Fiscal Year



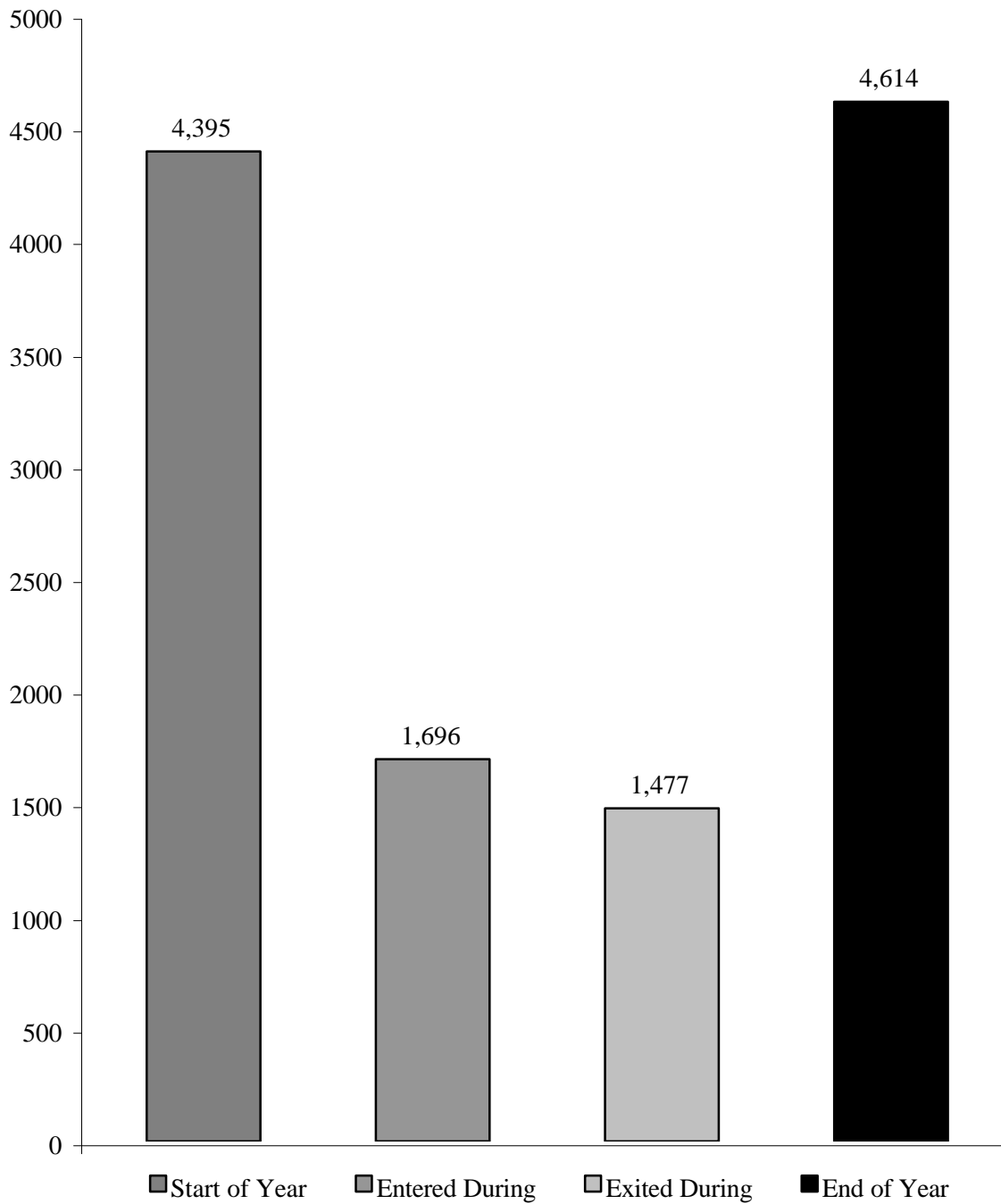

# Legal Responsibility for Child Care Licensing

## Day Care and Residential Care: Statutory References

Social Security Act

## Major Provisions:

- Develop minimum standards that promote the health, safety and well being of children in out-of-home care.
- Issue licenses to facilities meeting minimum standards.
- Inspect facilities to ensure they maintain compliance with the minimum standards.
- Investigate complaints and ensure that corrective or adverse action is taken as appropriate.
- Register and list family homes.
- Conduct criminal background checks and PRS central registry checks on all child care staff, foster parents, adoptive parents, licensed administrators, home care providers and anyone 14 years or older who will regularly or frequently be present at an operation while children are in care.
- Provide technical assistance on meeting and maintaining minimum standards and encourage improvement of child care programs.

## Challenges:

- Meet the growing demand for public information on child care regulation and private adoptions.
- Educate parents to make informed choices when selecting day care for their children
- Meet the growing training and technical assistance needs of the child care community.
- Respond to the increasingly complex needs of facilities serving troubled and abused children in residential care.

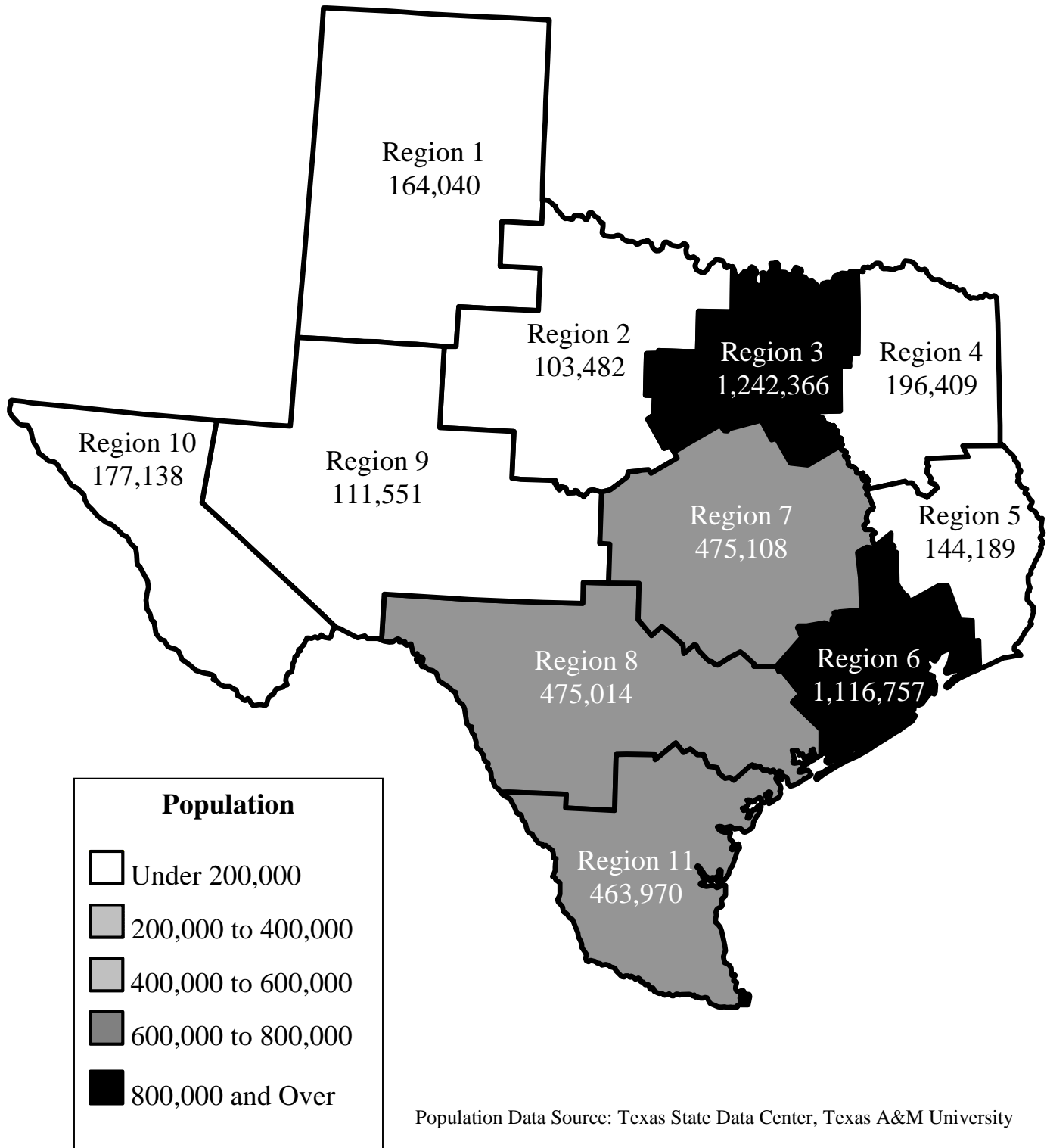

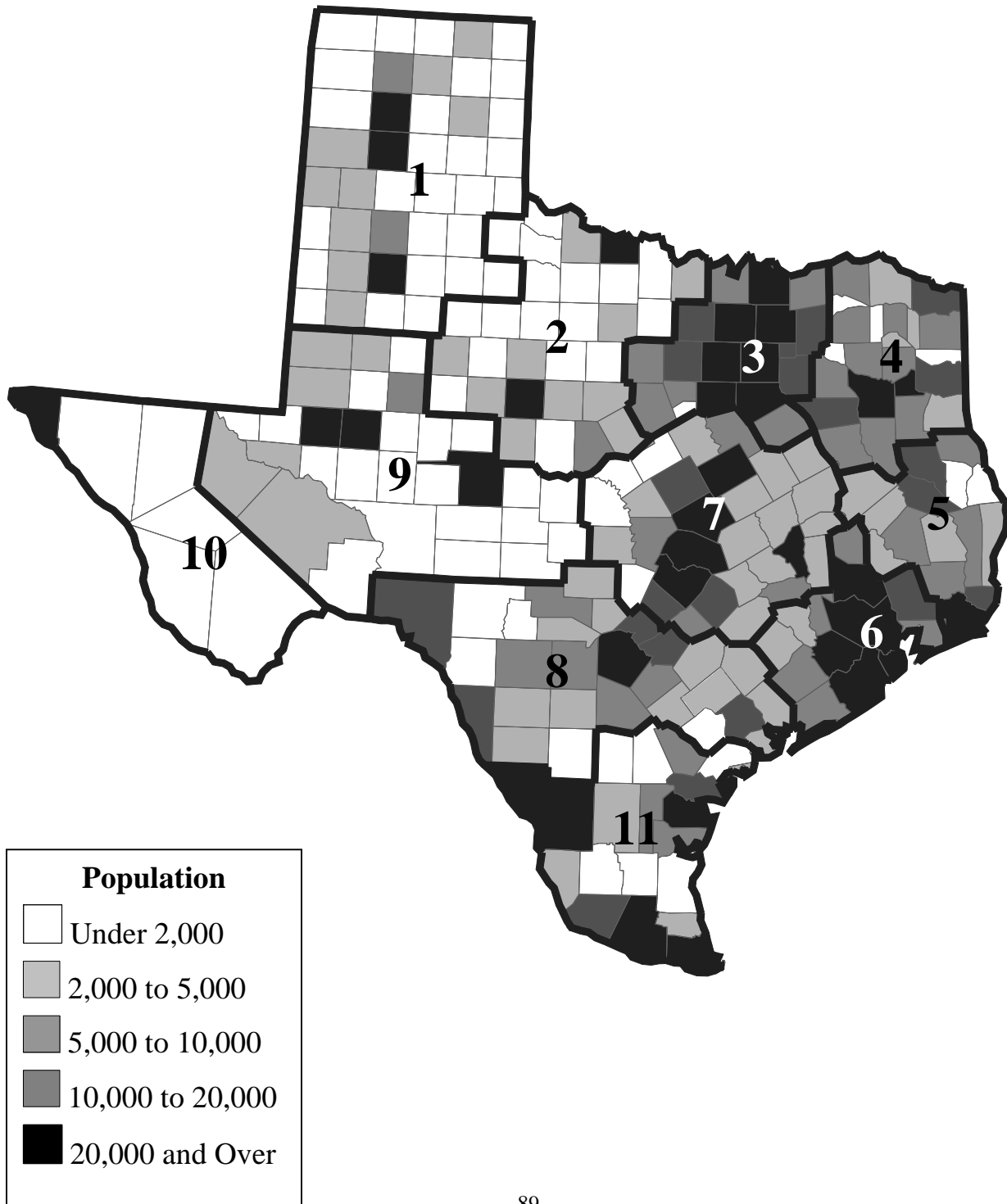
# Texas Child Population Ages Birth to 13 by Region Fiscal Year 2002

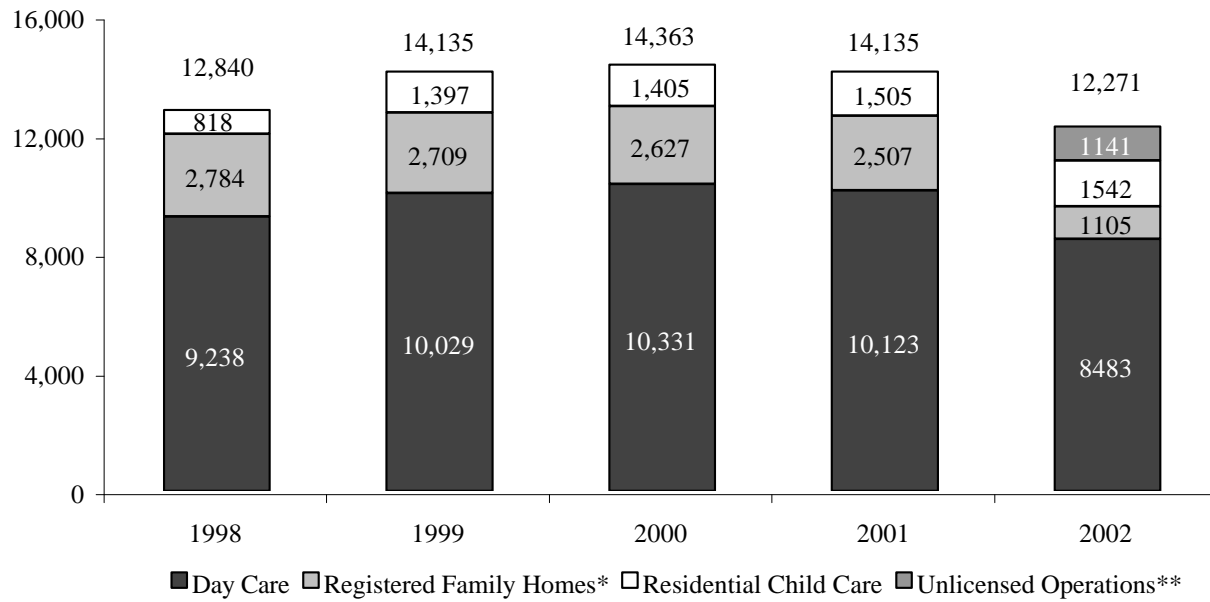

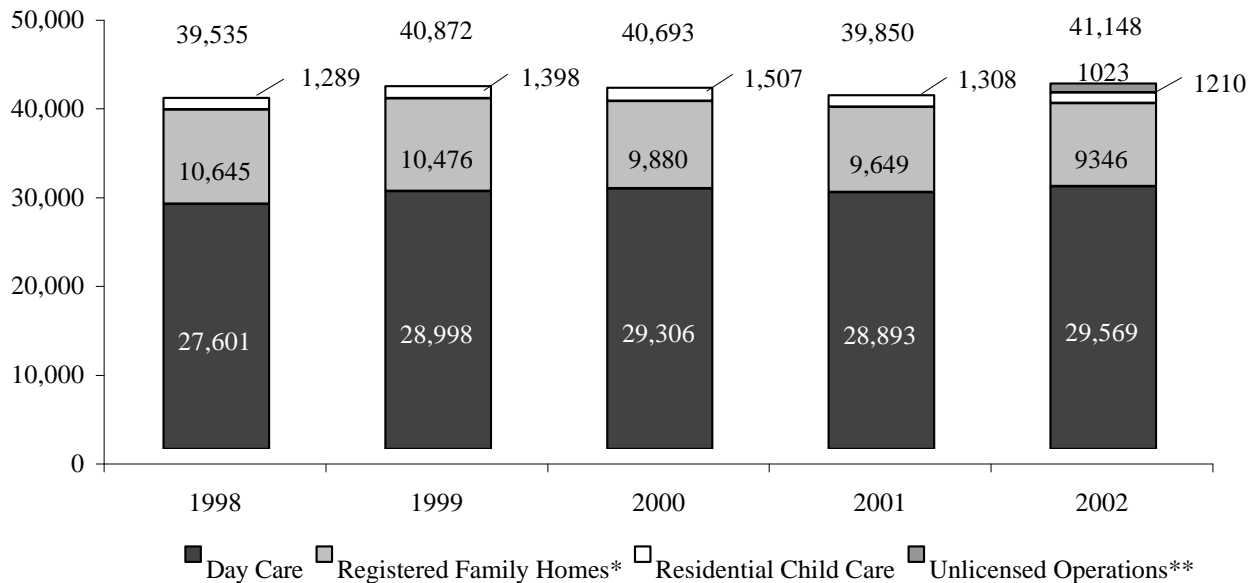

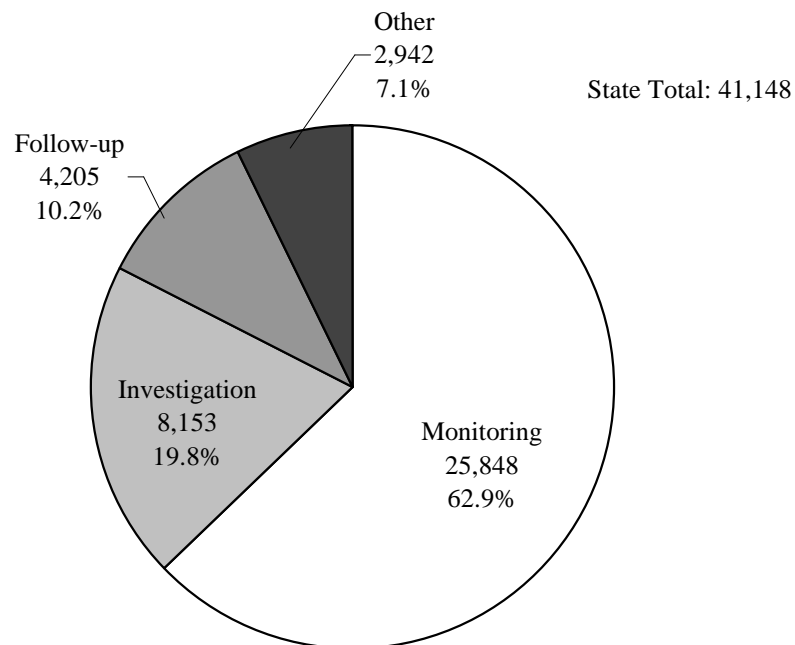

# Legal Responsibilities for the Division of Prevention and Early Intervention

## Statutory References

Federal: Title XX, Social Security Act  
 Federal: Title IV-B, Part 2, Social Security Act  
 State: Texas Family Code, 264.301

The **Division of Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI)** was created to consolidate prevention and early intervention programs within the jurisdiction of a single state agency. Consolidation of these programs is intended to eliminate fragmentation and duplication of contracted prevention and early intervention services for at-risk children, youth, and families.

- **Community Youth Development (CYD) Program** - This program assists communities in designing comprehensive approaches to support families and enhance the positive development of youth. Using legislative appropriations, grants are made available for developing juvenile delinquency prevention approaches in communities with high incidences of juvenile crime. Fifteen communities are being served.
- **Services To At-Risk Youth (STAR) Program** - These services are offered to 7 to 17 year old youths who are runaways and/or truants, 7 to 17 year-olds living in family conflict, 7 to 9 year-olds who have allegedly been involved in, or committed delinquent offenses, and 10 to 16 year-olds who have allegedly committed misdemeanor or state felony offenses but have not been adjudicated delinquent by a court. Contracted community agencies offer family crisis intervention, short-term emergency residential care, individual and family counseling, and other support services.
- **Texas Families: Together and Safe** - Grants are allocated for family support services to community based prevention programs. The services are designed to alleviate stress and promote parental competencies and behaviors that will increase the ability of families to successfully nurture their children; enable families to use other resources and opportunities available in the community; and create support networks that enhance child-rearing abilities of parents.
- **Texas Youth and Runaway Hotlines** - Hotline staff and volunteers work closely with social service agencies and juvenile delinquency prevention programs. Their goal is to provide callers with 24-hour crisis intervention and telephone counseling; information and referral for callers in need of food, shelter and/or transportation home; conference calls to parents and shelters; and a confidential message relay service between runaways and parents.

- **Community Initiatives for Child Protective Services** - Increasing public awareness about child abuse prevention and early intervention through community mobilization is the goal of Community Initiatives for Child Protective Services. One such program, Greater Texas Community Partners represents a successful public-private partnership that serves CPS caseworkers and clients through Rainbow Rooms and the Adopt-A-Caseworker program.
- **Community Initiatives for Prevention and Early Intervention** - Community Initiatives for Prevention and Early Intervention develop and implement special projects and initiatives across all PEI program areas. Projects and programs have been developed that focus on prevention of child abuse, juvenile delinquency, and academic failure. One such project is a Child Abuse Prevention Media Campaign. Public service announcements were developed referring people to a website -- [www.itsuptoyou.org](http://www.itsuptoyou.org) -- dedicated to offering the community resources to help them keep kids safe.
- **Family Outreach** - Family Outreach is an all volunteer organization that recruits successful parents to work with at-risk families under the supervision of a PRS case manager. Trained volunteers provide services to at-risk families, parenting classes, "warm lines" for parents in crisis, and other services as determined by the local center.
- **Healthy Texas Families** - This voluntary, comprehensive and intensive home visitation program focuses on families with children who are assessed to be at risk of abuse, neglect or other poor childhood outcomes. Services begin around the time of the baby's birth and can continue until the child is 5 years old. As a primary prevention program, services are designed to prevent infant mortality, premature birth, disease, developmental delays, child maltreatment, school failure, juvenile delinquency, teen pregnancy, and other negative outcomes for children, youth, and families.
- **Home Instruction Program for Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY)** - The HIPPY program builds on the basic bond between parents and their children. Three to five year old children learn, with their parents, from trained paraprofessionals who make home visits. As such, parents learn to prepare their children for success in school and beyond. The HIPPY program recognizes the role parents play in a child's transition from preschool to kindergarten.
- **Second Chance Teen Parent Program** - In cooperation with the Texas Department of Human Services, the Governor's Office, and the Texas Workforce Commission, PRS manages this program. Services are provided to teen parents who qualify for Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF), their children and pregnant teens eligible for Medicaid. Services include counseling, parenting classes, pregnancy prevention training, mentoring case management, child care, educational assistance, and residential support.
- **Community Based Family Resource and Support (CBFRS)** - Originally managed by the Children's Trust Fund, CBFRS was transferred to PRS at the request of the Governor's Office in September 1999. The program seeks to develop community and state provider networks and involve parents in preventing child abuse and neglect. The CBFRS program also supports respite care programs and the development of a parent education resource network.
- **Parents As Teachers (PAT)** – PAT is a primary prevention program designed to enhance the parent's role as a child's first and most important teacher. Using the national Parents As Teachers model, the program serves expecting parents and parents of 0 to 5 year old children. Parents receive home visits by certified parent educators and attend group meetings and developmental screenings.

- **At-Risk Mentoring (ARM)** –Youths between the ages of 7 and 17 who are at risk of substance abuse, educational failure, dropping out of school, juvenile delinquency, gang activity, running away, or other factors that may lead to any of these at-risk behaviors can receive services from 11 programs across Texas. Funding for this program is used to expand existing or new community-based programs that focus on creating supportive mentoring relationships between youths and adults.
- **Dan Kubiak Buffalo Soldiers Heritage Program** - This program operates in five counties and provides services to develop honor, pride, and dignity in minority and at-risk 10 to 17 year old youths. Service components include mentoring, tutoring, Buffalo Soldier history classes, character development, self-esteem and life skills training, field trips to state parks, encampments, and community service.
- **Communities In Schools (CIS)** - Funded by the State of Texas since 1989, the Communities In Schools program is designed to prevent and reduce school dropout and prepare students for life by coordinating community resources in school settings. The program offers tutoring, individual and group guidance counseling, pre-employment activities, recreational activities, and cultural activities.
- **Facility-Based Youth Enrichment Activities** – Contractors provide after-school, weekend, and summer facility-based enrichment programs for youths, ages 6 to 17. Program services are available at least six days weekly and target youths in at-risk situations.
- **Children’s Trust Fund (CTF)**-CTF provides funding to community-based organizations seeking to prevent child abuse and neglect through primary prevention programs that strengthen parents, children, and families.
- **Tertiary and Secondary Child Abuse Prevention** – This program provides services to families who no longer require the support of Child Protective Services. The program is volunteer-driven and seeks to prevent incidences of child maltreatment by strengthening families.

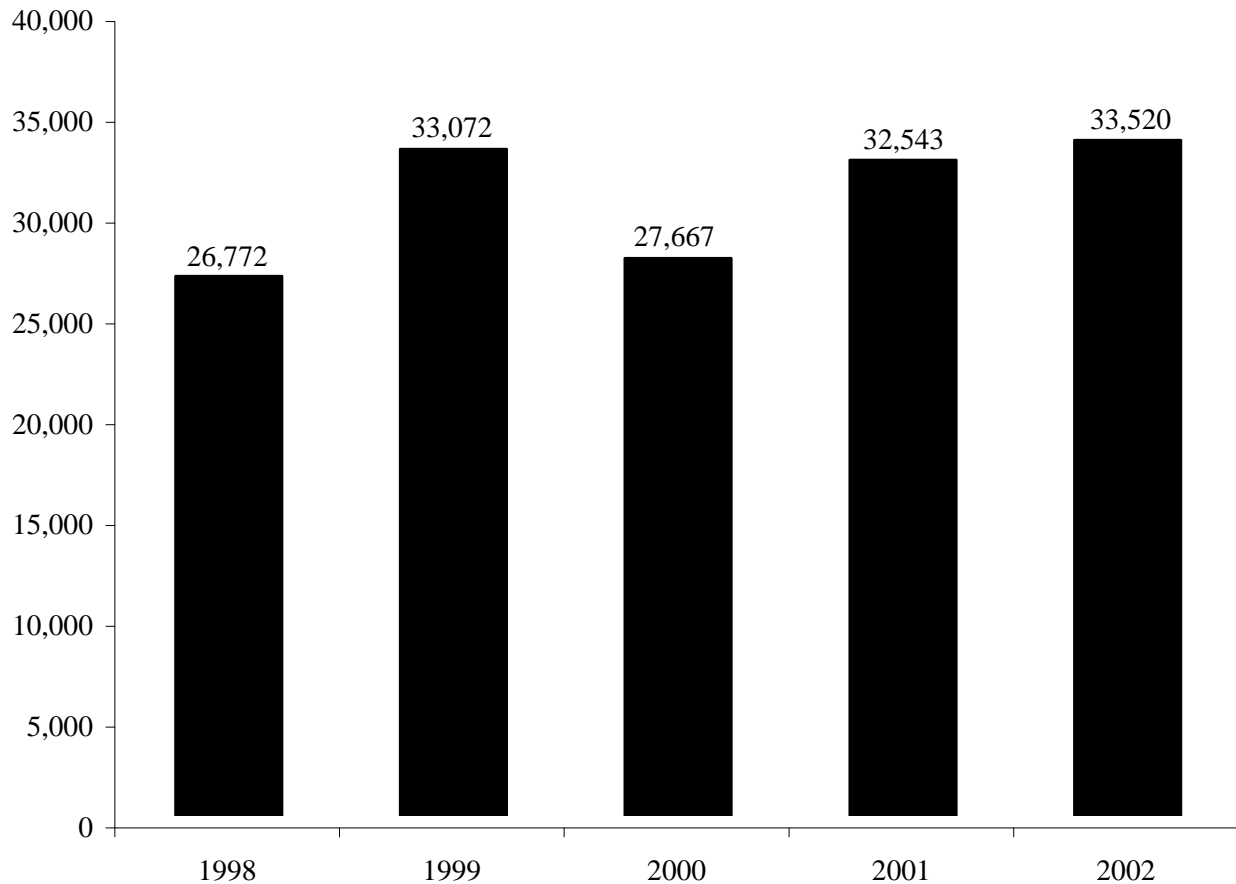

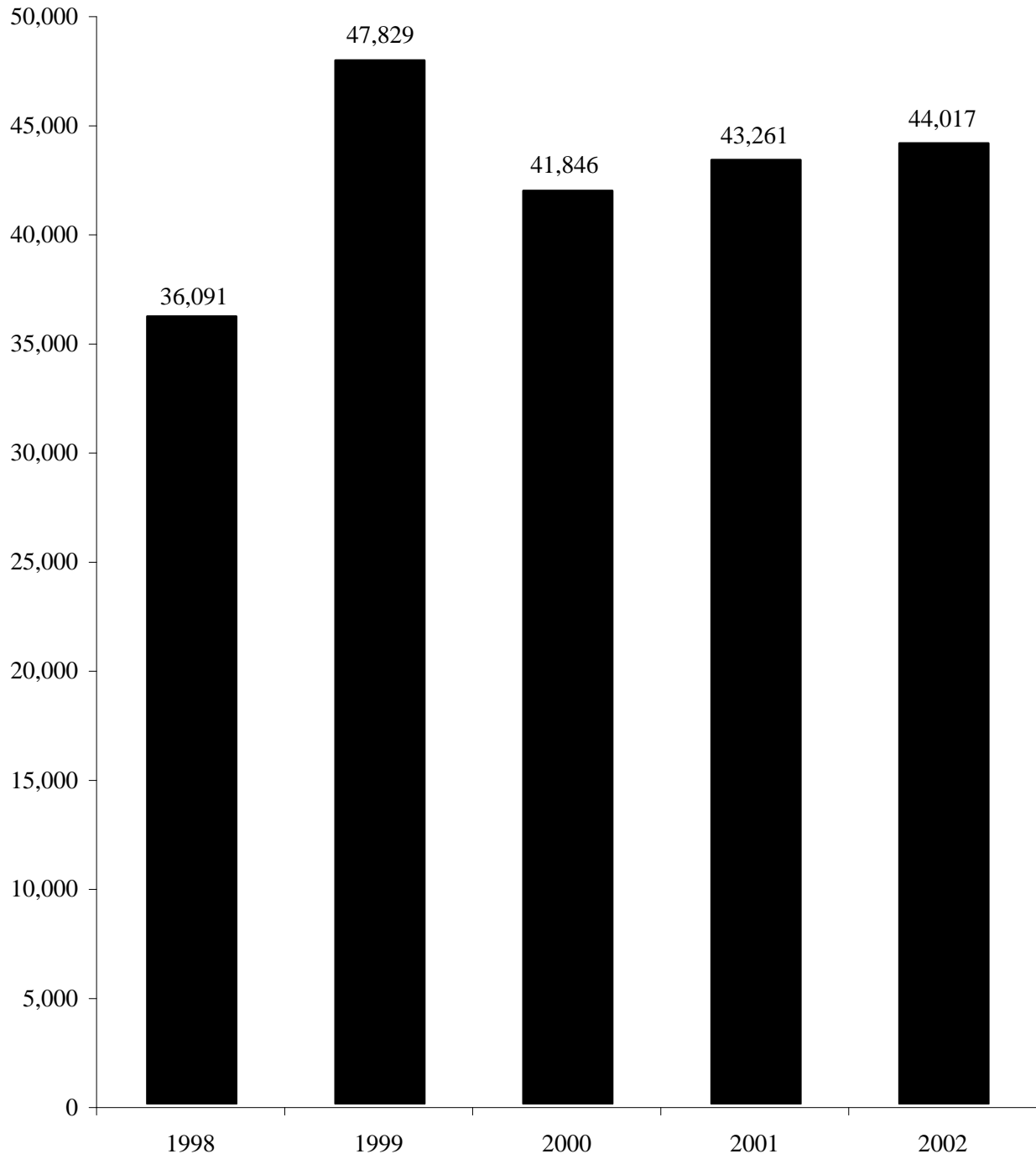
## Services To At-Risk Youth (STAR)

The Services To At-Risk Youth (STAR) program was developed to assist local communities in serving youth who often fall between the cracks of the service delivery system. Their problems are not severe enough to receive services from traditional systems such as Child Protective Services or Juvenile Probation. Therefore, the STAR program has established contracts with local agencies throughout the state that make crisis intervention, emergency short-term residential care, and counseling available to at-risk youths and their families. The STAR program serves all 254 Texas counties.

# Definitions

## ADULT PROTECTIVE SERVICES PROGRAM

**Abuse (In-Home)** – The negligent or willful infliction of injury, unreasonable confinement, intimidation, or cruel punishment with resulting physical or emotional harm or pain by a caretaker, family member, or other individual with whom the person who is elderly or disabled has an ongoing relationship.

**Adult** – A person 18 or older, or an emancipated minor.

**Aged or Elderly Person** – A person 65 or older.

**Allegation (In-Home)** – An assertion that a person who is elderly or who is an adult with a disability is in a state of, or at risk of, harm due to abuse, neglect, or exploitation.

**Allegation (MHMR Investigations)** – A report by an individual that a person served as been or is in a state of abuse, neglect, or exploitation.

**Alleged Perpetrator** – A person who is reported to have abused, neglected or exploited a person who is elderly or who is an adult with a disability.

**Alleged Victim** - An elderly person or an adult with a disability who has been reported to adult protective services staff to be in a state of or at risk of abuse, neglect, or exploitation (by a caretaker).

**APS** – Adult Protective Services

**APS In-Home** – The term used to refer to investigations and service delivery related to abuse, neglect, and exploitation of persons who are elderly and adults with disabilities who generally live in non-institutional settings, that is, private homes, small foster homes, and legally unlicensed room and board facilities. APS in-home caseworkers investigate exploitation in licensed facilities when the alleged perpetrator is not affiliated with the institution. In previous years Adult Protective Services in-home counts have been referred to as “community” cases. To avoid confusion with investigations in community MHMR centers, the title “community” is no longer used when referring to the APS in-home program area.

**APS Investigation of Adult Abuse, Neglect, and Exploitation** – Refers to a completed investigation. Prior to FY 96, “investigations” in APS referred to initiated investigations rather than completed investigations.

**APS Guardianship Services** – Guardianships provided directly or through contract to incapacitated children reaching adulthood in CPS conservatorship; or incapacitated adults in APS in-home investigations in which abuse, neglect, or exploitation has been confirmed and there is no other means of protecting the person.

**Capacity to Consent** – Having the mental and physical ability to understand the current problems and the services offered and to accept or reject those services, knowing the consequences of the decision.

**Caretaker** – A guardian, representative payee, or other person who by act, words, or course of conduct has acted so as to cause a reasonable person to conclude that he has accepted the responsibility for protection, food, shelter, or care for a person who is elderly or an adult with a disability.

**Child and Adult Protective System (CAPS)** – The software application by which Adult Protective Services (APS) and Child Protective Services (CPS) staff document cases.

**Client** – A person who is elderly or an adult with a disability who has been determined in a validated finding to be in need of protective services.

**Confidentiality** - Records relating to the department's protective clients are not open to public inspection.

**Court-Authorized Entry** - To carry out an investigation of reported abuse, neglect, or exploitation, the court may authorize the department to enter the premises of the elderly or disabled person.

**Designated Perpetrator** – A person who has been determined in a validated finding to have abused, neglected or exploited a person who is elderly or who has a disability.

**Designated Victim** - An elderly person or an adult with a disability for which a finding of abuse, neglect, or exploitation by a caretaker has been validated.

**Developmental Disability** - A severe, chronic disability of an individual that:

- results from a mental and/or physical impairment;
- begins before age 22;
- is likely to be life-long;
- results in major limitations in three or more areas of everyday functioning (self-care, receptive and expressive language, learning, mobility, self-direction, capacity for independent living, and economic self-sufficiency); and
- reflects the individual's need for special services that are individually planned and coordinated.

**Disabled Person** – A person with a physical, mental, or developmental disability that substantially impairs the person's ability to provide adequately for the person's care or protection and who is 18 years of age or older or under 18 years of age and who has had the disabilities of minority removed.

**ECS** – Emergency client services provided in accordance with §48.002(5) of the Human Resources Code, including, but not limited to, emergency shelter, medical and psychiatric assessments, in-home care, residential care, heavy housecleaning, minor home repairs, money management, transportation, emergency food, medication, and other supplies. Specific emergency client services are only available in a community if those specific services are not available through other state and local resources. To be eligible for emergency client services, a person who is elderly or an adult with disabilities must be receiving Adult Protective Services from the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services in accordance with §§48.002(5) and 48.021(a) of the Human Resources Code and have a service plan that has been developed by the department under these sections and that indicates that emergency client services are needed to remedy abuse, neglect, or exploitation. All other available resources must be used where feasible before emergency client services are initiated.

**Emancipated Minor** – A person under age 18 who has the power and capacity of an adult. This includes a minor who has had the disabilities of minority removed by a court of law or a minor who, with or without parental consent, has been married.

**Emotional or Verbal Abuse (In-Home)** – Any use of verbal communication or other behavior to humiliate, intimidate, vilify, degrade, or threaten with harm.

**Emotional or Verbal Abuse (MHMR Investigations)** – Any act or use of verbal or other communications, when the alleged perpetrator is an employee, agent, or contractor, including gestures, to:

1. curse, vilify, or degrade a person served; or
2. threaten a person served with physical or emotional harm

**Exploitation (In-Home)** – The illegal or improper act or process of a caretaker, family member, or other individual who has an ongoing relationship with a person who is elderly or disabled using the resources of the person who is elderly or disabled for monetary or personal benefit, profit, or gain without the informed consent of the person who is elderly or disabled.

**Exploitation (MHMR Investigations)** – The illegal or improper act or process of using a person served or the resources of a person served for monetary or personal benefit, profit, or gain when the alleged perpetrator is an employee, agent, or contractor.

**False Reports** – A person commits an offense if the person knowingly or intentionally reports information that the person knows is false or lacks factual foundation. Such an offense is a Class B misdemeanor.

**Guardian** – A court-appointed person or entity who makes decisions on behalf of an incapacitated person.

**Guardian of the Estate** – The personal representative given responsibility and authority for managing the assets of the ward in a temporary or permanent guardianship (e.g., paying bills, selling property, and managing finances).

**Guardian of the Person** – The personal representative given responsibility and authority for the health, well-being, and personal needs of the ward in a temporary or permanent guardianship.

**Guardianship Program** – A local, county, or regional program that provides guardianship and related services to an incapacitated person or other person who needs assistance in making decisions concerning the person's own welfare or financial affairs.

**Immunity** – A person filing a report, participating in an investigation, testifying, or participating in any judicial proceeding arising from a petition, report, or investigation is immune from civil or criminal liability. A person, including an authorized department volunteer, medical personnel, or law enforcement officer, who participates in an investigation or the provision of services is also immune as long as the person is acting in good faith.

**Incapacitated Person** – An adult individual who, because of a physical or mental condition is substantially unable to provide food, clothing, or shelter for himself or herself, to care for the individual's own physical health, or to manage the individual's own financial affairs; a missing person; or a person who must have a guardian appointed to receive funds due the person from any governmental source. (A minor is also a legally incapacitated person.)

**Incidence of Maltreatment** – Ratio of the number of confirmed APS in-home cases in a geographic area to the total population in that area of persons who are elderly and persons who have disabilities.

**Intake Priorities (In-Home)** – In establishing priorities, the department defines the time frames for beginning an investigation and for conducting a face-to-face interview with the alleged victim. Adult protective services priorities are based on the degree of severity and immediacy of the alleged harm to the individual.

**Priority I** – APS reports that allege the victim is in a state of serious harm or is in danger of death from abuse or neglect. The caseworker must attempt a face-to-face visit with the alleged victim within 24 hours of the department's receipt of a Priority I report, which may include, but is not limited to, the following:

1. Serious injuries. Examples: spinal injury, fractured ribs puncturing lung, head injury, severe burns, broken hip, internal injuries.
2. Lack of life-sustaining medication.
3. Serious threats by caretaker to harm or kill alleged victim.
4. Lack of basic physical necessities severe enough to result in freezing, starvation, or dehydration.
5. Need for immediate medical attention to treat conditions that could result in irreversible physical harm, e.g., unconsciousness, acute pain, severe respiratory distress, gangrene, hemorrhaging, severe malnutrition.
6. Suicide threats or attempts unless there is clearly no immediate danger to the alleged victim.
7. Sexual abuse when there is danger of repeated abuse.
8. No caretaker is available; the alleged victim is unable to perform critical personal care activities, and his needs cannot be met by community care services.

**Priority II** – APS reports that allege the victim is abused, neglected, or exploited and, as a result, is at risk of serious harm. The caseworker must attempt a face-to-face visit with the alleged victim within three calendar days of the department's receipt of a Priority II report. For example, if the intake was received on 9-01, the caseworker must attempt a face-to-face visit on or before 9-04. Priority II reports may include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Critical need for mental health or medical treatment. Examples: suicidal but no immediate danger, overly aggressive behavior, open bedsores or other open wounds, malnutrition, sprains, fractures, or disease or illness of an acute nature.
2. Falling or being pushed, hit, or scratched, which is reported to have resulted in bruises, other injuries, or severe mental anguish.
3. Inadequate attention to physical needs. Examples: insufficient food or medicine.
4. Illegal or improper use of alleged victim's income or resources to the degree that alleged victim is unable to meet basic subsistence needs or is threatened with substantial loss of income or resources.
5. Unreasonable confinement.
6. Sexual abuse of the alleged victim by the caretaker, but clearly no immediate danger of repeated abuse.
7. Caretaker has threatened physical violence that would cause harm to the alleged victim.
8. Living conditions that pose a serious health or safety hazard. Examples: fecal contamination, dead animals, major structural damage to shelter.
9. Imminent eviction from a nursing home because the alleged victim's representative has failed to use the alleged victim's income to pay for his care.
10. Threatened loss of caretaker when the alleged victim is dependent for basic needs.

**Priority III** – Consists of all other APS reports that allege the victim is in a state of abuse or neglect. The caseworker must attempt a face-to-face visit with the alleged victim within seven calendar days of the department's receipt of a Priority III report. For example, if the intake was received on September 1, the caseworker must attempt a face-to-face visit on or before September 8. Priority III reports may include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Verbal or emotional abuse. Examples: harassment, cursing, degrading remarks, intimidation.
2. Marginal care or threatened withdrawal of care by caretaker when the alleged victim needs some assistance with his basic activities of daily living.
3. Falling or being pushed, hit, or scratched when such actions are not reported to result in bruises, other injuries, or severe mental anguish.
4. Need for mental health or medical treatment that is not urgent. Examples: mild depression, delusional thinking that is not dangerous to the alleged victim or others, poor nutrition, or disease or illness that is not acute.

**Priority IV** – APS reports that allege exploitation when there is no danger of imminent impoverishment or deprivation of basic needs. The caseworker must attempt a face-to-face visit with the alleged victim within 14 calendar days from the date the department receives a Priority IV report. For example, if the intake was received on September 1, the caseworker must attempt a face-to-face visit on or before September 15. Priority IV reports may include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Lack of appropriate contribution to food and shelter expenses by household members.
2. Misuse of a nursing home resident's personal needs allowance by someone who is not affiliated with the nursing home. (If the alleged perpetrator is an employee of the nursing home, refer to the Texas Department of Human Services.)
3. Improper use of income or resources but the alleged victim's needs are still met.
4. Exploitation that is not ongoing and is not likely to recur.

#### **Intake Priorities for MHMR Investigations –**

**Priority I** – Defined as reports in which the alleged incident occurred seven calendar days or less prior to the date the report was received by the department. The investigator must attempt a face-to-face contact with the alleged victim within 24 hours of receipt of the report by the department.

**Priority II** – Defined as reports in which the alleged incident occurred more than seven but less than 90 calendar days prior to the date the report was received by the department. The investigator must attempt a face-to-face contact with the alleged victim within two calendar days of receipt of the report by the department.

**Priority III** – Defined as reports in which the alleged incident occurred 90 calendar days or more prior to the date the report was received by the department. The investigator must attempt a face-to-face contact with the alleged victim within five calendar days of receipt of the report by the department.

**Institution** – An establishment that furnishes, in one or more facilities, food and shelter to four or more persons who are unrelated to the proprietor of the establishment and provides minor treatment under the direction and supervision of a physician licensed by the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners, or other services that meet some need beyond the basic provision of food, shelter, and laundry.

**Least Restrictive Alternative** – An action or service that protects a client while allowing personal autonomy to the fullest degree possible.

**MHMR Facilities** – State schools, state hospitals, and state centers.

**MHMR Investigations** – Investigations conducted by APS related to abuse, neglect, or exploitation of persons with disabilities served by MHMR facilities, local authorities, community centers, home and community-based services waiver (HCS-W) programs and their contractors.

**Neglect (In-Home)** – The failure to provide for one's self the goods or services, including medical services, which are necessary to avoid physical or emotional harm or pain or the failure of a caretaker to provide the goods or services.

**Neglect (MHMR Investigations)** – When the alleged perpetrator is an employee, agent, or contractor, neglect is defined as a negligent act or omission by any individual responsible for providing services to a person served, which caused or may have caused physical or emotional injury or death to a person served or which placed a person served at risk of physical or emotional injury or death. Neglect includes, but is not limited to, the failure to:

1. establish or carry out an appropriate individual program plan or treatment plan for a person served;
2. provide adequate nutrition, clothing, or health care to a specific person served in a residential or inpatient program; or
3. provide a safe environment for a specific person served, including the failure to maintain adequate numbers of appropriately trained staff.

**Objection to Medical Treatment** - Medical treatment may not be ordered for clients who object to treatment on religious grounds.

**Physical Abuse (MHMR Investigations)** - When the alleged perpetrator is an employee, agent, or contractor, physical abuse is defined as:

1. an act or failure to act performed knowingly, recklessly, or intentionally, including incitement to act, which caused or may have caused physical injury or death to a person served;
2. an act of inappropriate or excessive force or corporal punishment, regardless of whether the act results in a physical injury to a person served; or
3. the use of chemical or bodily restraints on a person served not in compliance with federal and state laws and regulations

**Protective Services** – The services furnished by the department or by a protective services agency to a person who is elderly or who has a disability and has been determined to be in a state of abuse, exploitation, or neglect. These services may include social casework, case management, and arranging for psychiatric and health evaluation, home care, day care, social services, health care, and other services consistent with this chapter.

**Provider Agency (Contractor)** – An agency that has contracted with the department to provide authorized services for adult protective service clients.

**Reporter** – A person who makes a referral to adult protective services staff about a situation of alleged abuse, neglect, or exploitation of a person who is elderly or has a disability.

**Sexual Abuse (In-Home)** – Any involuntary or non-consensual sexual conduct including conduct that would constitute an offense under Section 21.08, Penal Code, or Chapter 22, Penal Code.

**Sexual Abuse (MHMR Investigations)** - any sexual activity, including but not limited to:

1. kissing a person served with sexual intent;
2. hugging a person served with sexual intent;
3. stroking a person served with sexual intent;
4. fondling a person served with sexual intent;
5. engaging in with a person served:
  - sexual conduct as defined in the Texas Penal Code, §43.01; or
  - any activity that is obscene as defined in the Texas Penal Code, §43.21;
6. requesting, soliciting, or compelling a person served to engage in:
  - sexual conduct as defined in the Texas Penal Code, §43.01; or
  - any activity that is obscene as defined in the Texas Penal Code, §43.21;
7. in the presence of a person served:
  - engaging in or displaying any activity that is obscene, as defined in the Texas Penal Code §43.21; or
  - requesting, soliciting, or compelling another person to engage in any activity that is obscene, as defined in the Texas Penal Code §43.21;
8. committing sexual exploitation as defined in §711.15 of this title (relating to “How is sexual exploitation defined?”) against a person served;
9. committing sexual assault as defined in the Texas Penal Code §22.011, against a person served;
10. committing aggravated sexual assault as defined in the Texas Penal Code, §22.021, against a person served; and
11. causing, permitting, encouraging, engaging in, or allowing the photographing, filming, videotaping, or depicting of a person served if the employee, agent, or contractor knew or should have known that the resulting photograph, film, videotape, or depiction of the person served is obscene as defined in the Texas Penal Code, §43.21, or is pornographic.

**Ward** – An adult adjudicated by the court to be mentally or physically incapacitated and for whom a guardian has been appointed.

## CHILD CARE LICENSING PROGRAM

**Child Care Licensing (CCL)** – This program is responsible for protecting the health, safety, and well-being of Texas children who reside in or attend childcare facilities and homes. The program also regulates childcare administrators, child placing agencies, and maternity homes.

## CHILD PROTECTIVE SERVICES PROGRAM

**Children in Foster Care** – All children under PRS’ legal responsibility who are placed in foster homes, foster group homes, institutions, residential treatment facilities, and juvenile facilities who are in a placement paid by PRS or some other public facility. This is a subset of Children in Substitute Care.

**Children in Substitute Care** – Children under age 18 years in PRS’ legal responsibility who are placed outside their own home (home of origin). This includes foster homes, institutions, foster group homes, residential treatment facilities, hospitals, adoptive homes, other juvenile facilities, relative home placements, and independent living arrangements. Also included are the youth who age out of legal responsibility and continue in foster care placements to continue vocational training by age 19 or to graduate from high school before they turn 20 years old.

**Children in the Legal Responsibility of the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services** – All children for whom the courts have given the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services legal responsibility by temporary or permanent managing conservatorship or other court ordered legal basis. These children may be residing in an out of home placement or may have been returned to their own home (home of origin). When a child who has been abused and neglected must be removed from their home, an emergency court order must be obtained. Within 14 days from the emergency court order a Child Protective Services worker must obtain from the court a temporary order for managing conservatorship. By no later than 12 months, the judge must either return the child to the parent and dismiss the suit, or appoint a parent, relative, or PRS as managing conservator on a permanent basis or grant a one time extension of the lawsuit, not to exceed six months, for good cause.

**CPS Investigations of Child Abuse and Neglect** – The agency is required by state law to conduct civil investigations of reports of suspected child abuse or neglect. Upon receipt, initial reports are assigned to priority groups based upon the alleged situations.

**Intake Priorities** – To establish time frames for investigations, Child Protective Services divides reports of child abuse and neglect into two priority groups. Priority group assignments are based on staff’s assessment of the degree of harm or risk to the children. Based on information reported by the complainant and other available information, staff evaluate the immediacy of the risk and the severity of the harm. The evaluation involves a number of factors including information about the alleged perpetrators, the children’s ages and conditions, the specific nature of the harm, and whether the harm has actually occurred.

**Priority I** – Intake reports that concern children who appear to face an immediate threat of serious harm or death as a result of the alleged abuse or neglect.

**Priority II** – Reports that concern allegations of abuse or neglect where there do not appear to be immediate threats of serious harm or death.

Referrals are assigned a priority based upon the information provided by the complainant and other available information. When conducting an investigation, the caseworker may be unable to confirm that abuse or neglect occurred. Additional facts may indicate that the report is unfounded, or the family may have moved and cannot be located so that the investigation cannot be completed. Sometimes a Priority I becomes Priority II when investigation shows that the abuse or neglect is not as serious as originally reported. Likewise, a Priority II referral may be classified as a Priority I when the investigation shows that the abuse or neglect is more serious than originally reported.

**Level of Care** – PRS seeks to place each child in the department’s conservatorship with a foster caregiver who is well qualified to meet the child’s needs. To achieve this, the department participates in a statewide system for classifying the needs of children and the capabilities of foster caregivers in six Levels of Care (LOC)

**a) Level I** – Adequate functioning in all developmental and/or environmental areas. There may be transient difficulties, “everyday” worries, and occasional misbehavior, but would be regarded as a normal child; responds to “normal” discipline. The caregiver provides routine home environment with guidance and supervision to meet the needs of the child.

**b) Level II** – No more than occasional problems in functioning in any area, some acting-out behavior in response to life stresses, but these are brief and transient; minimally disturbing to others, and not considered defiant by those

who know them. The caregiver provides routine home environment with supplemental guidance and discipline to meet the needs of the child.

**c) Level III** – Frequent or repetitive minor problems in one or more areas; may engage in non-violent anti-social acts, but is capable of meaningful interpersonal relationships. Requires supervision in a structured supportive setting with counseling available from professional staff.

**d) Level IV** – Substantial problems; have physical, mental, or social needs and behaviors that may present a moderate risk of causing harm to themselves or others, poor or inappropriate social skills, frequent episodes of aggressive or other anti-social behavior with some preservation of meaningful social relationships. Require treatment program in a structured supportive setting with therapeutic counseling available by professional staff.

**e) Level V** – Severe problems; unable to function in multiple areas. Sometimes willing to cooperate when prompted or instructed, but may lack motivation or ability to participate in personal care or social activities or is severely impaired in reality testing or in communications. May exhibit persistent or unpredictable aggression, be markedly withdrawn and isolated due to either mood or thought disturbance, or make suicidal attempts. Presents a moderate to severe risk of causing harm to self or others. Requires 24-hour supervision by multiple staff in limited access setting.

**f) Level VI** – Very severe impairment(s), disability(s) or need(s); consistently unable or unwilling to cooperate in own care. May be severely aggressive or exhibit self-destructive behavior or grossly impaired in reality testing, communication, cognition, affect, or personal hygiene. May present severe to critical risk of causing serious harm to self or others. Needs constant supervision (24-hour care) with maximum staffing, in a highly structured setting.

**g) Level E2** – Emergency care in a foster group home.

**h) Level E3** – Emergency care in an emergency shelter institution.

**Permanency Goal Definitions** – Permanency goals for children for whom PRS has legal responsibility include:

**a) Family Preservation** – This goal is selected if the child can reside safely in the family environment with supportive services from the Department without the Department having to take legal custody of the child. At some point, the Department will close its case with the family

**b) Family Reunification** – This goal focuses on providing services to the family to deal with the issues of abuse or neglect so that the child who has been removed from the home can be returned. At some point the child is returned to the family with court approval. After a supervisory period, a recommendation is made to the court to dismiss legal custody granted to the Department.

**c) Permanent Placement With Relative or Close Family Friends** – This goal is selected when the plan is to permanently place a child in the legal custody of the Department with a relative or close family friend through either adoption or transfer of conservatorship.

**d) Adoption by Non-Relative** – This goal focuses on placing a child in the custody of the Department with an unrelated family for adoption. Prior to the actual adoptive placement, parental rights must be terminated by the court. After a supervisory period, the adoption is consummated by the court.

**e) Alternative Long-Term Care** – This goal is selected when the child cannot be returned safely to the family, or cannot be placed with relatives or close family friends, and adoption is not a possibility for the child. Under this goal, the Department raises the child unless at some point legal custody can be transferred to a caretaker or another permanency goal becomes available. Formal court approved agreements are made with the foster families who have on-going relationships with these foster children to ensure that the children receive long-term consistent care. The goal is comprised of four sub-sections: 1) Foster care with commitment, 2) Foster care without commitment, 3) Transfer conservatorship to caregiver, 4) Other living arrangement.

**f) Adult Living** – This goal is selected for youth in the custody of the Department who are 16 or older (may start as early as 14) unless another permanency goal is more appropriate. This goal has two subsections: 1) independent living, and 2) long term care in adulthood. The Department will either prepare the youth to live independently as an adult or arrange the long-term care and support the youth will need in adulthood because of a disability.



**Recidivism** – Refers to the re-occurrence of child abuse/neglect involving confirmed victims where the second incidence occurs within one year of the first incidence.

**Reports of Child Abuse and Neglect** – The agency receives many reports of children who are in situations that are not optimal for their growth or development, but do not appear to involve child abuse or neglect as defined by law. Only the reports that appear to meet the statutory definition of abuse or neglect are required by state law to be investigated by the agency.

**Risk Assessment of Child Abuse/Neglect** – Workers in child protective services investigate allegations of abuse and neglect and make assessments of risk. Risk is defined as: The reasonable likelihood that a child will be abused or neglected, as defined in the Texas Family Code, in the foreseeable future. The decision to provide services is based on the assessment of risk, not on the findings of the allegations. Services are provided when it is necessary to protect a child from immediate harm regardless of whether or not abuse or neglect has already occurred. Risk assessment is an analysis of the family's ability to protect a child from abuse or neglect. In conducting a risk assessment, a worker explores risk factors, family strengths and resources, and safety issues in order to make decisions on how to protect children. After evaluating risk in a family, there are three possible conclusions:

- No Significant Risk Factors – No significant risk factors were identified.
- Risk Factors Controlled – Risk factors were identified; however, family strengths and available resources are sufficient to provide for the safety of the child in the foreseeable future.
- Risk Indicated – Risk factors were identified, and there are not sufficient family strengths and available resources to provide for the safety of the child in the foreseeable future.

If the third conclusion is reached, the response can involve any combination of the following:

- Complete a safety plan for the family that controls risk factors during the investigation.
- Provide family based safety services with the child in the home.
- Place the child with a relative or in foster care.

The efforts of Child Protective Services staff are directed at protecting children and maintaining children in their own homes when their safety can be assured. In some CPS investigations the risk assessment process is not applicable. These are investigations that do not involve families, such as abuse or neglect alleged to have been committed by school personnel, or volunteers. CPS also does not complete a risk assessment if the family moves early in the investigation and cannot be located or when the only child in the family has died of abuse or neglect. By using a risk-based system for providing services, CPS is able to identify children in need of protection and direct resources and efforts for those most in need of them.
