Legal Responsibility for Adult Protective Services

Statutory References:

Federal: Title XX, Social Security Act

State: Human Resources Code, Chapters 40 and 48

Texas Family Code, Title V

Health and Safety Code, Chapter 532 and Chapters 591-596

Major Provisions:

- Mandatory reporting of abuse, neglect, and exploitation of elderly persons and adults with disabilities
- Receipt and investigation of all reports (unless patently false); initiation of investigations within 24 hours of receipt of report
- Responsibility for investigations of abuse and neglect of persons served by or through Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation (TXMHMR) facilities and community MHMR centers, and home and community-based waiver (HCS-W) programs
- Responsibility for other state agencies to investigate
- Provision or arrangement of services needed to prevent or alleviate maltreatment
- Responsibility for provisions or arrangement of guardianship services for incapacitated adult victims of abuse, neglect and/or exploitation
- Responsibility for guardianship of persons with disabilities who age out of Child Protective Services (CPS) conservatorship and are unable to manage their own affairs
- Assessment of the adult's capacity to understand the situation and the degree of danger it presents
- Using the least restrictive alternative in the provision of protective services
- Authority to seek court orders when necessary to gain access to the individual, to prevent interference
 with the provision of voluntary protective services, to provide emergency protective services, to access
 records or documents, and to initiate emergency protective services (e.g., a removal) after hours and on
 holidays without a court order
- Requirement to notify law enforcement if the investigation reveals that an elderly or disabled person has been abused in a manner that constitutes a criminal offense
- Confidentiality of case records

Factors Contributing to Maltreatment and Neglect:

- Aging population
- Growing number of younger persons with disabilities
- Alcohol and drug dependency
- Unemployment
- Lack of affordable housing
- De-institutionalization of persons who are mentally ill and/or mentally retarded when community support is not adequate
- Inadequate access to health care
- Pathological family relationships/violence as a coping mechanism in society
- Physical and mental stress of caregiving in traditionally non-violent, caring households
- Denial of benefits, such as SSI and Medicaid, to elderly and disabled immigrants and to persons with disabilities related to chemical addiction

Challenges:

- Need for revisions to rules, handbooks and operating procedures, as well as close monitoring of changes in processes that occur due to the division of MHMR programs among new state agencies
- Systematic reform of the APS program including the implementation of corrective actions identified by HHSC and anticipated relevant statutory changes that may likely occur during the 79th legislature
- Transition of the operation of the APS guardianship program to DADS that was directed by HHSC and will likely be statutorily mandated by the 79th legislature
- Need for long-term therapeutic and residential services for aging-out CPS clients who will be maintained under guardianship of DFPS as adults
- Resources to meet basic needs of indigent wards
- Affordable means of housing for persons who need supervision of medication only
- Waiting lists and other limitations in the availability of in-home care and home health care
- Shortage of resources to serve persons denied long-term care and other benefits under welfare reform
- Gaps in surrogate decision-making processes for incapacitated persons in hospitals, nursing homes and community-based settings
- Lack of access to affordable health care and prescription drugs
- Inadequate community services for persons discharged from state hospitals and schools
- Lack of statewide access to adult social services for elderly persons and adults with disabilities who are at risk but not yet experiencing abuse, neglect, or exploitation
- Revision of entry-level curriculum, use of distance learning, and on-the-job training opportunities to increase staff knowledge and performance
- Enhance and develop community resources in an effort to increase awareness of abuse, neglect and exploitation and to address increasing needs of APS consumers
- Hiring and maintaining a skilled workforce while the availability of caseworkers and specialized geriatric social work training is not keeping pace with the ever-increasing number of older Americans




Texas Adult Population Ages 65 and Over by County Fiscal Year 2004




Texas Adult Population Ages 18 to 64 by County Fiscal Year 2004





APS In-Home Intakes, Completed Investigations and Confirmed Cases by Fiscal Year



Incidence of Maltreatment per 1,000 Adults in Texas Adult Population by Region Fiscal Year 2004




Perpetrators in Confirmed In-Home Cases Fiscal Year 2004





APS Intake Reports by Priority Fiscal Year 2004






Duration of APS Service Delivery Cases Closed During Fiscal Year 2004






Characteristics of APS In-Home Clients in Completed Investigations Fiscal Year 2004












Recidivism* of APS In-Home Cases by Fiscal Year

Recidivism* of APS In-Home Cases by Region Fiscal Year 2004









Perpetrators in Cases that Received Guardianship as of August 31, 2004




Completed Investigations in MHMR Settings by Source of Report Fiscal Year 2004



Types of Abuse Confirmed in MHMR Settings Fiscal Year 2004




Completed Investigations in MHMR Settings by Fiscal Year
