

DFPS Rider 29 Report for Foster Care Redesign

As required in Sections (c) and (d) of Rider 29 (page II-45) in Article II of The General Appropriations Act, 83rd Texas Legislature, the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS) shall, "Report selected performance measures identified by the Legislative Budget Board (LBB) that will allow for comparative analysis between the legacy foster care and redesigned foster care systems". Additionally DFPS shall, "Provide a report that contains the most recent data for the selected comparative performance measures, an analysis of the data that identifies trends and impact occurring in the redesigned foster care system, identification and analysis of factors negatively impacting any outcomes, recommendations to address problems identified from the data, and any other information necessary to determine the status of the redesigned foster care system". To meet these requirements DFPS is using a report format specified by the LBB. The format is the same as that used to meet the requirements of Rider 25 (page II-44) in Article II of The General Appropriations Act, 82nd Texas Legislature. Accompanying the data report is a narrative that discusses trends, impact, analyses of the factors that affect the outcomes, and recommendations to address problems that have been identified. For the most part, there have been no trends or changes identified in the redesigned system because only three months of data from a single catchment area are available for the initial Rider 29 report.

Limitations for the Initial Rider 29 Report

The initial Single Source Continuum Contract (SSCC) for DFPS Region 2/9 was fully executed on February 1, 2013. This SSCC did not accept its first referral to place a child until August 26, 2013. As such, some SSCC-specific data is either not available at this time, or if available, is scant and provides little, if any, information about performance, trends and change in the redesign catchment area. Data for the first quarter of fiscal year 2014 is included only if the dataset was considered complete by the date this report was prepared.

The SSCC*A percentages for some of the LBB measures appear significantly different from the Region 2/9 and Statewide percentages. It is anticipated that the percentages will continue to be significantly different throughout the first year of performance measurement. The large differences in performance measure results can be attributed to both the relatively small number of clients currently placed with the SSCC, as well as the temporal limitations of those measures where an insufficient amount of time has passed to calculate a percentage that accurately reflects performance. For example, Percent of Children Achieving Legal Resolution Within 12 Months (02-01 OU 08), and for other measures similar to it, the percentage will be 100% for at least the first 12 months since all children achieving legal resolution will be within the first 12 months. In other words the numerators will always be very close, if not the same, as the denominators. The passage of time and an increase in the number of children placed with the SSCC will eventually lead to results that can be directly compared to the Region 2/9 and Statewide results. As that happens, a more accurate picture of the SSCC's performance will emerge.

A contract with a second SSCC was fully executed on January 1, 2014. The catchment area for the second SSCC includes a cluster of seven counties in Region 3. This SSCC is in the midst of a "start-up" period and anticipates accepting initial referrals for placements on July 1, 2014. As such, no data were available for the second catchment area.

Evaluation of Foster Care Redesign

A formal evaluation of Foster Care Redesign is on-going. Both process and outcome components are included in the evaluation plan. DFPS will use evaluation findings, as well as the data provided later in this report, to assist in identifying performance, trends and changes, and any problems and issues in the redesign catchment areas.

Process Component

To date, a process evaluation on the initial implementation of the redesigned system in the first catchment area has been completed by the University of Texas-Austin (UT) Institute for Organizational Excellence (IOE) and the Child and Family Research Institute (Research Institute). The original process evaluation plan included making multiple assessments over several months of implementation. However, delays in procuring and contracting with the first SSCC, together with the funding limitations for the process component of the evaluation, significantly limited the time with which UT had to conduct the initial process evaluation. Rather than evaluate the first 6-9 months of implementation, the process evaluation was limited to assessing the first two months of implementation. Regardless, the evaluation made an early assessment of employee engagement and collaboration among DFPS catchment area staff, SSCC staff and the staff of service providers who were contracting with the SSCC. In addition, the process evaluation made an early assessment of implementation barriers, infrastructure development and challenges that might impact the SSCC's ability to meet performance expectations.

Many of the findings in the process evaluation report, which is in draft form not yet final, will likely corroborate issues identified by DFPS and the SSCC during the "start-up" period and the first few weeks of implementation. Notably, issues related to automation, communication, structure and organization, and some of the original recommendations for the redesign model led DFPS to make recommendations to address and remove barriers when implementing redesign in the subsequent catchment area. Those recommendations were presented at the November 2013 Public Private Partnership (PPP) meeting. Briefly, DFPS recommendations to the PPP included the following:

Automation:

- Increase training and "on-the-ground" support for child protective services (CPS) staff
- Increase testing prior to the start-up phase and allow SSCC early access to automation system
- Expand parameters to search for information in the system
- Require SSCCs to have trained and dedicated resources to manage information technology (IT) issues

Communication:

- Conduct early and frequent information meetings in the catchment area and include foster parents, providers, courts, advocates (CASA) and staff
- Partner with SSCCs in the development of a meaningful communication plan and develop and deliver joint presentations to key stakeholders
- Ensure regular communication with PPP (quarterly meetings at a minimum)

Structure and Organization:

- Ensure that the SSCC staff and the DFPS staff responsible for developing catchment plans and protocols are well informed decision-makers
- Establish very clear communications channels within and between DFPS and the SSCC
- Strengthen Cultural Change Teams
- Implement formal monthly face-to-face meetings between SSCC's and CPS catchment area leadership

Foster Care Redesign Model

- Re-visit the "exceptional care rate" given the difficulties in understanding, tracking and applying
- Re-visit the allocation and billing processes to ensure allocations cover costs and billing processes are simplified

Prior to the November 2013 PPP meeting, DFPS and the SSCC began resolving some issues weeks before the process evaluation was completed. Resolution of those issues may not be reflected in the UT process evaluation report because once identified by DFPS and/or the SSCC a resolution may have

occurred during the time evaluation data were being analyzed or during the time UT was preparing the evaluation report. As of February 28, 2014, UT was working to complete the final draft of the process evaluation report.

Outcome Component

For the outcome component of the evaluation, DFPS has contracted with the University of Chicago's Chapin Hall. An initial measurement of four key outcomes will be reported after the first six months of service provision by an SSCC and its contracted service providers. Those outcomes include placement proximity (placements in foster care settings that are close to home), placement stability (reduction in the number of placement changes children experience while in foster care), timely achievement of permanency (reduction in the number of days children remain in foster care), and re-entry into the foster care system (no increase in the re-entry rate relative to shorter stays in foster care).

The placement proximity and placement stability measures are SSCC outcomes but not the permanency and re-entry measures, per se. The permanency outcome will be used to assess financial incentives and remedies in the SSCC's last stage of implementation. Until then, the permanency outcome will be measured to ensure the SSCC's performance does not drop below DFPS baseline for this measure. The re-entry outcome will help to ensure that any improvement to the permanency outcome is not offset by an increase in the re-entry rate to foster care.

A unique aspect of Chapin Hall's work is the use of prospective, rather than retrospective, analysis of performance metrics. Historical data was used to establish baselines for the four outcomes noted above. The data is also used to make projections about the numbers of children who will be in care and the number who will be entering care during a 24-month performance period. Those projections are very important because they provide the redesigned system with information about what should be happening to a specific number of children who are in care or have entered care during the performance period. If not on a trajectory to meet performance expectations, systemic or operational changes can occur before the performance period ends. In other words, changes can be made to something as it is happening rather than waiting and not being able to change something that has already happened.

As part of the outcome evaluation, performance findings will contribute to a continuous quality improvement (CQI) process. DFPS anticipates the first report on outcome evaluation data will be available in April of 2014.

Data Report

The remainder of this report provides the data requested by the LBB with a short narrative provided in Section C. As noted above, it is too early to identify trends and changes in the redesigned foster care system. Note however there are a couple of, what appear to be, positive findings for the first quarter of 2014. First, all (100%) children placed with the SSCC remained safe in care. Second, for 71.8% of the siblings groups in the care of the SSCC, all siblings in a sibling group were placed together on November 30, 2013. That is higher than what is reported Statewide (63.4%) and for Region 2/9 (61.6%).

DFPS, together with the SSCC(s), will look closely at changing outcomes to identify relationships between SSCC models and improved performance. As an example, the placement of all siblings together appears to have improved in the system managed by an SSCC. However, the ability to do so may have resulted in the placement of fewer children in a least restrictive setting. As can be seen in Section B of the data report, the percentage of children placed in foster family homes under the SSCC's management was 57.9. For the same time period (1st quarter of FY 2014), 70.3% of children statewide were placed in foster family homes and 70.8% of the children in Regions 2/9 who were not in the care of the SSCC were placed in foster family homes. In the next few months DFPS and the SSCC will determine if this is a trend or simply an early, time-limited consequence of implementing change.

DFPS Rider 29 Foster Care Redesign Data Report

Please note that the initial Single Source Continuum Contractor (SSCC* A) in DFPS Region 2/9 began accepting referrals for placements on August 26, 2013. The fiscal year 2014 columns include only first quarter data unless otherwise specified. If SSCC-specific data were not available at the time the report was prepared, data cells in the report were intentionally left blank. A contract with a second SSCC was executed on January 1, 2014. That SSCC will likely begin accepting referrals to place children on July 1, 2014. The August 2014 Rider 29 report will include Region*B data and no SSCC*B data due to the timing of that report and implementation plan negotiated with SSCC*B.

Report SSCC Performance Measures Statewide and by Region/SSCC*

For performance measures relying on PMET as the data source, many cannot be calculated at this time due to missing or invalid data reported to the SSCC or by the SSCC. Those measures are intentionally left blank in Section B of the initial Rider 29 report. For the performance measure relying on Chapin Hall as the data source, assessments are calculated every six months rather than quarterly. Moreover, this measure will be calculated in a way never reported previously. As such, no first quarter 2014 performance information or data for 2012 and 2013 is available for those measures. The August 2014 Rider 29 report will include the initial assessment for 3a below. Note also that performance measure 2 will continue to be reported as is, but a new placement stability measure will also be included in subsequent reports. The new measure will be prospective and reveal the number and percentage of children and youth who have two or fewer placements during a performance period. Section C.

SSCC Organization, Network and Provider Payments

SSCC*A (Providence Services Corporation of Texas or PSC) is using a collaborative partnership model for service delivery. Under this model, PSC serves as the lead agency, maintaining ongoing oversight of a collaborative, integrated and developing system of care. PSC contracts with an array of providers, both in and out of the catchment area, to provide all paid foster care, Supervised Independent Living (SIL), and Preparation for Adult (PAL) services. As implantation progresses, the system of care will expand to include providers that deliver services to the families of children who in the care of the SSCC, as well as continuing to provide the services currently offered under the SSCC's system of care. The existing provider network primarily includes agencies in Regions 2 and 9 that are also under contract with DFPS.

The PSC organizational structure assumes the IT, intake and placement, utilization management, quality assurance, data management, and contracting and oversight functions for the SSCC's system of care. PSC does not provide services to children and families directly, but rather relies on its subcontractors to do so. For all reimbursable services provided through the PSC network, PSC is paid directly by the state. The contracted service providers in the PSC network are paid by PSC. DFPS understands that the rates PSC pays its providers are similar to the rates DFPS pays its providers in the legacy system. Nonetheless PSC negotiated with its subcontractors the payments they receive. DFPS ensures payments and payment processes meet all statutory requirements, rules, and policies.
